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For Your Safety

WARNINGS

Turn off in the Event of Malfunction

Should you notice smoke or an unusual smell coming from the camera or AC adapter, unplug the AC adapter and remove the battery immediately, taking care to avoid burns. Continued operation could result in injury. After removing or disconnecting the power source, take the equipment to a Nikon-authorized service representative for inspection.

Do not Disassemble

Touching the internal parts of the camera or AC adapter could result in injury. Repairs should be performed only by qualified technicians. Should the camera or AC adapter break open as the result of a fall or other accident, take the product to a Nikon-authorized service representative for inspection, after unplugging the product and/or removing the battery.

Do not use the Camera or AC Adapter in the Presence of Flammable Gas

Do not use electronic equipment in the presence of flammable gas, as this could result in explosion or fire.

Handle the Camera Strap with Care

Never place the strap around the neck of an infant or child.

Keep out of Reach of Children

Particular care should be taken to prevent infants from putting the battery or other small parts into their mouths.

Observe caution when handling the battery

The battery may leak or explode if improperly handled. Observe the following precautions when handling the battery for use in this product:

- Before replacing the battery, turn the product off. If you are using the AC adapter, be sure it is unplugged.
- Only use a Rechargeable Li-ion Battery EN-EL8 (supplied). Charge the battery either by inserting it in the camera and connecting the AC Adapter EH-64 (supplied), or by inserting it in a Battery Charger MH-62 (available separately from Nikon).
- When inserting the battery, do not attempt to insert it upside down or backwards.
- Do not short or disassemble the battery or attempt to remove or break the battery insulation or casing.
- Do not expose the battery to flame or to excessive heat.
- Do not immerse in or expose to water.
- Replace the terminal cover when transporting the battery. Do not transport or store with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- The battery is prone to leakage when fully discharged. To avoid damage to the product, be sure

to remove the battery when no charge remains.

- Discontinue use immediately should you notice any change in the battery, such as discoloration or deformation.
- If liquid from the damaged battery comes in contact with clothing or skin, rinse immediately with plenty of water.

Observe the following precautions when handling the battery charger

- Keep dry. Failure to observe this precaution could result in fire or electric shock.

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








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About This Manual

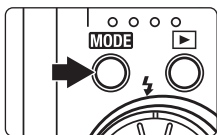
The (shooting/playback) Button





Press  once in shooting mode to enter full-frame playback; press again to switch back to shooting mode. Pressing the shutter-release button halfway in playback mode ( 28) will also activate shooting mode.

If the camera is turned off, hold down  to turn the camera on in playback mode ( 28).

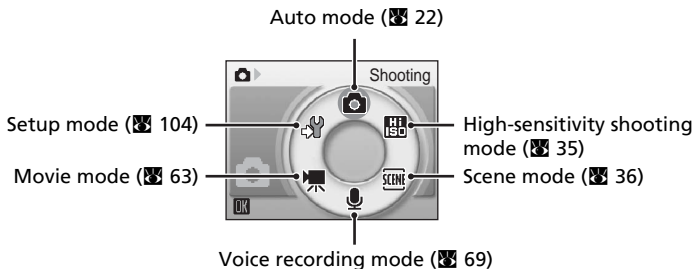
The **MODE** (mode) Button



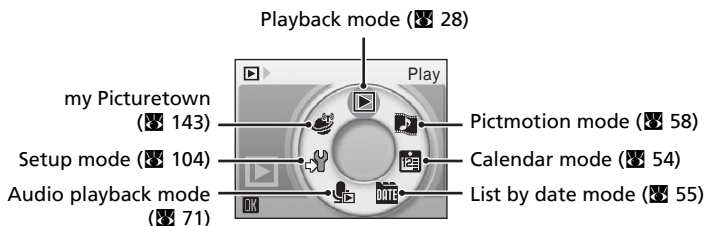
Press **MODE** during shooting to display the shooting-mode selection menu, or during playback to display the playback-mode selection menu. Use the rotary multi selector ( 11) to choose the desired mode.

Playback-mode Selection Menu

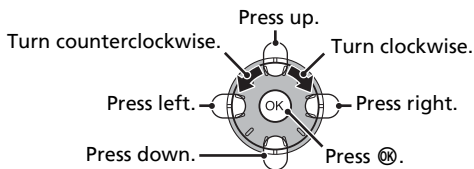


The Rotary Multi Selector

The rotary multi selector is made up of the rotating ring and the **OK** button. When selecting menus or pictures, you can either press the rotating ring up, down, left, or right, or rotate it. When choosing from numerous menu items or pictures, rotating the ring is recommended for easy scrolling and faster operation.

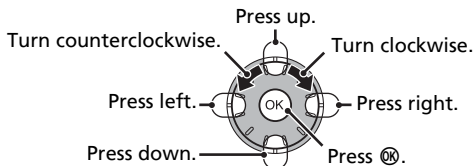
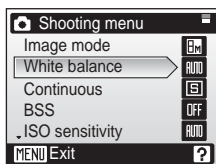
This section describes standard uses of the rotary multi selector to select modes, select menu options, and to apply selection.

For the Shooting-mode/Playback-mode Selection Menu



- To move the highlight clockwise, turn clockwise, press down or right.
- To move the highlight counterclockwise, turn counterclockwise, press up or left.
- To apply selection, press **OK**.

For the Menu Screen



- To move the highlight upward, turn counterclockwise, or press up.
- To move the highlight downward, turn clockwise, or press down.
- To apply selection, press **OK** or right.
- To cancel setting and return to the previous screen, press left.

Notes on the Rotary Multi Selector

- In many cases, you can choose how to use the rotary multi selector to perform an operation. For example, rotating the selector clockwise and pressing the selector right may produce the same results. Since the selector can be used in various ways, concrete descriptions such as "Press the rotary multi selector **▶**" are included only in cases where necessary.
- In the manual, the button indicating up, down, left, and right of the rotary multi selector is shown as **▲**, **▼**, **◀**, and **▶**.

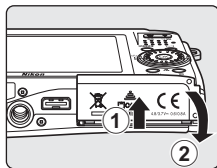


- To return to the original menu, press **T** (🔍) again.

Inserting the Battery

The camera uses a Rechargeable Li-ion Battery EN-EL8 (supplied). Charge the battery before first use or when the battery is running low (▶ 16).

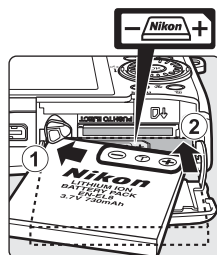
- 1 Open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.



- 2 Insert the battery.

Confirm that the positive (+) and negative (-) terminals are oriented correctly as described on the label at the entrance of the battery chamber, and insert the battery.

Use the side of the battery to push the orange battery latch up ① as the battery is inserted ②. The latch drops back into place when the battery is fully inserted.

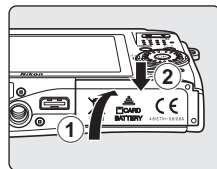


❑ Inserting the Battery

Inserting the battery upside down or backwards could damage the camera. Be sure to check the battery is in the correct orientation.



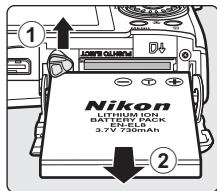
- 3 Close the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.



Removing the Battery

Turn the camera off before removing the battery. To eject the battery, open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover and slide the battery latch in the direction shown ①. The battery can then be removed by hand ②.

- Note that the battery may become hot during use; observe due caution when removing the battery.

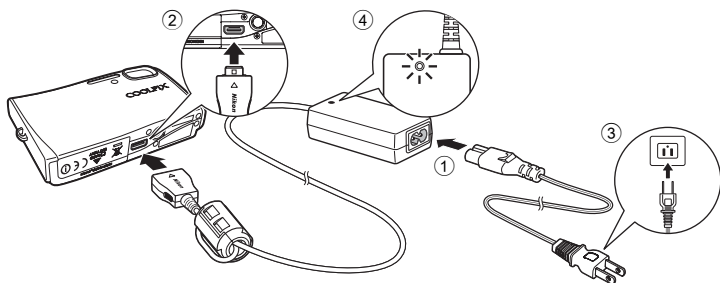


Note on the Battery

Be sure to read and follow the warnings for the battery on page iii and the section, “Caring for the Camera” (📖 153), before using the battery.

Charging the Battery

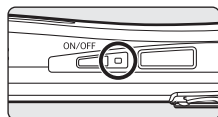
Insert the battery and charge it with the AC Adapter EH-64 (supplied) before first use or when the battery is running low.



1 Connect the power cable and AC adapter ①.

2 Turn off the camera.

If the power-on lamp (green) is lit, press the power switch to turn off the camera. **You cannot charge the battery while the camera is turned on.**



3 Connect the AC adapter to the camera's multi connector ②.

The multi connector should be fully inserted.

4 Plug the power cable into an outlet ③.

The AC adapter power-on lamp will light ④.

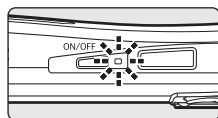


Charging the Battery After Setting the Camera's Clock

When the camera's built-in clock has not been set, the battery begins charging when the AC adapter is connected. Once the clock is set, Picture Bank (📷 144) will start when the AC adapter is connected, and the camera will attempt to upload pictures to the my Picturetown server. Press ⏏ to cancel picture upload and charge the battery. Picture Bank can be set so that it does not start automatically when the AC adapter is connected (📷 145).

5 The battery begins charging.

The power-on lamp next to the power switch will blink orange as the battery charges. If the lamp flickers rapidly, the AC adapter is not correctly inserted or the battery is faulty. Reinsert the AC adapter or replace the battery.



A fully exhausted battery will recharge in about two hours.

6 Charging is complete.

The power-on lamp (orange) stops blinking when charging is complete.



7 Disconnect the camera and AC adapter.

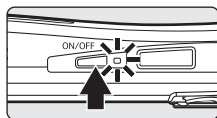
Disconnect the AC adapter from the camera's multi connector.

Be sure to unplug the power cable from the power outlet.

Turning On and Off the Camera

To turn on the camera, press the power switch. The power-on lamp (green) will light and the monitor will turn on. To turn off the camera, press the power switch again.

If the camera is turned off, hold down  to turn the camera on in playback mode ( 28).




Note on the Power Cable Supplied for the Camera (16)

Only use the power cable for the AC Adapter EH-64 (supplied) for the COOLPIX S51c.

Connecting the AC Adapter EH-64


The AC Adapter EH-64 (supplied) can:

- When the camera is turned on, power the camera from a power outlet.
- When the camera is turned off, charge the battery in the camera ( 16).

It can also be used to power the camera for playback, data transfer, or printing (recommended). *Do not, under any circumstances, use another make or model of AC adapter.* Failure to observe this precaution could result in fire or product malfunction.

The AC adapter and the supplied audio video/USB cable cannot be used at the same time.

Charging the Battery with the Battery Charger

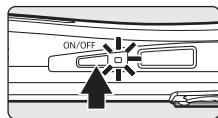
The Rechargeable Li-ion Battery EN-EL8 can also be charged using the Battery Charger MH-62 (available separately from Nikon) ( 150).

Setting Display Language, Date, and Time

A language-selection dialog is displayed the first time the camera is turned on.

- 1 Press the power switch to turn on the camera.

The power-on lamp will light and the monitor will turn on.



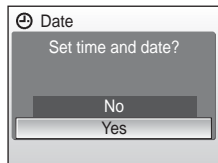

Inserting Memory Cards

Pictures are stored in the camera's internal memory (approx. 13 MB) or on removable Secure Digital (SD) memory cards (available separately) (150).

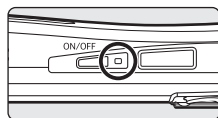
If a memory card is inserted in the camera, pictures are automatically stored on the memory card and pictures recorded to the memory card can be played back, deleted, or transferred. Remove the memory card to store pictures in the internal memory, or play back, delete, or transfer pictures from the internal memory.

First Steps

- 1 Turn the camera off and open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.

If the power-on lamp is lit, press the power switch to turn off the camera.

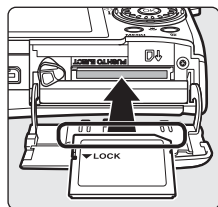

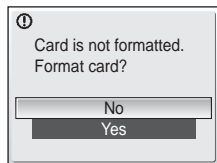
Before removing memory cards, **turn the camera off** and confirm that the power-on lamp is off. Open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover and press the card in ① to partially eject the card ②. The card can then be removed by hand.



Formatting Memory Cards

If the message at right is displayed, the memory card must be formatted before use (☒ 115). Note that **formatting permanently deletes all pictures** and other data on the memory card. Be sure to make copies of any pictures you wish to keep before formatting the memory card.

Use the rotary multi selector to choose [Yes] and press \odot . The confirmation dialog will be displayed. To start formatting, choose [Format] and press \odot .

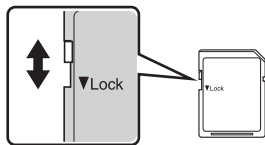


- **Do not turn the camera off or open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover until formatting is complete.**
- The first time you insert the memory cards used in other devices into the COOLPIX S51c, be sure to format them (☒ 115).

The Write Protect Switch

SD memory cards are equipped with a write protect switch. Pictures cannot be recorded or deleted and the memory card cannot be formatted when this switch is in the "lock" position. Unlock by sliding the switch to the "write" position.

Memory Cards


- Use only Secure Digital memory cards.
- Do not perform the following during formatting, while data are being written to or deleted from the memory card, or during data transfer to a computer. Failure to observe this precaution could result in the loss of data or in damage to the camera or memory card.
 - Eject the memory card
 - Remove the battery
 - Turn off the camera
 - Disconnect the AC adapter
- Do not disassemble or modify.
- Do not drop, bend, or expose to water or strong physical shocks.
- Do not touch the metal terminals with your fingers or metal objects.
- Do not affix labels or stickers to the memory card.
- Do not leave in direct sunlight, closed vehicles, or areas exposed to high temperatures.
- Do not expose to humidity or to corrosive gases.

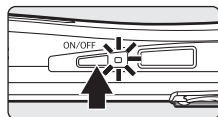

This section describes how to take pictures in  (auto) mode, an automatic, “point-and-shoot” mode recommended for first-time users of digital cameras.

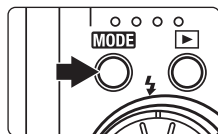

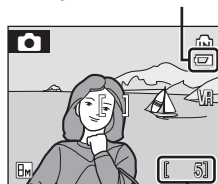

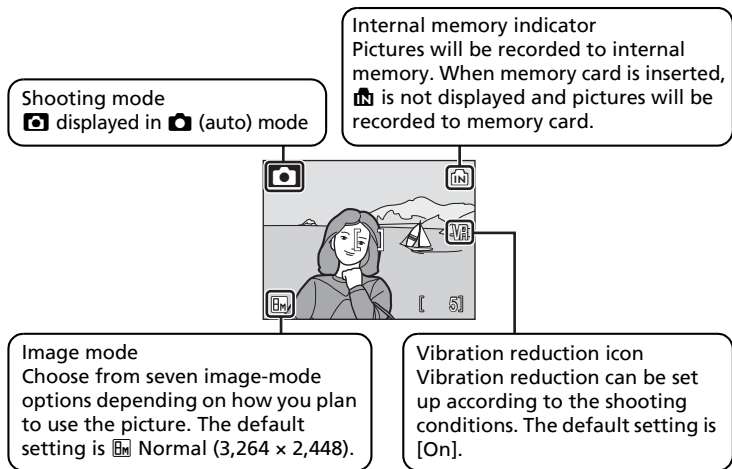

The number of pictures that can be stored depends on the capacity of the memory or memory card and image mode setting.

Available Functions in (Auto) Mode


In  (auto) mode, macro mode ( 33) and exposure compensation ( 34) can be applied and pictures can be taken using the flash mode ( 30) and self-timer ( 32). Pressing **MENU** in  (auto) mode displays the shooting menu. This menu allows you to specify the image mode ( 89), white balance setting ( 91), and to apply continuous shooting ( 93), BSS ( 94), ISO sensitivity ( 95), color options ( 95), and AF area ( 96) to suit shooting conditions or your own preferences.

Vibration Reduction

[Vibration reduction] ( 113), when [On] (default setting) is selected, can be applied to effectively reduce blur, caused by slight hand movement known as camera shake, that commonly occurs when shooting with zoom applied or at slow shutter speeds.

Vibration reduction can be used in all shooting modes.

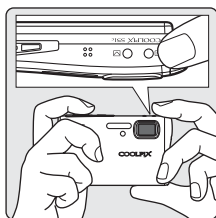
Auto Power Off in (Auto) Mode (Standby Mode)

The monitor will dim to reduce the drain on the battery if no operations are performed for about five seconds. The monitor will brighten when camera controls are used. At default settings, the monitor will turn off altogether if no operations are performed for about a minute during shooting and playback. The camera will turn off automatically if no operations are performed for another three minutes ( 114).

Step 2 Frame a Picture

1 Ready the camera.

Hold the camera steadily in both hands, keeping your fingers and other objects away from the lens, flash, and self-timer lamp.



2 Frame the picture.

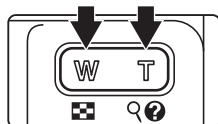
Position the main subject near the center of the monitor.



Using the Zoom

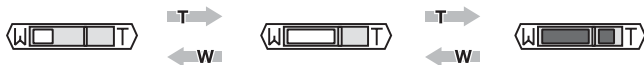
Use the zoom buttons to activate optical zoom. Press **W** (📐) to zoom out, increasing the area visible in the frame, or **T** (🔍) to zoom in so that the subject fills a larger area of the frame.

Zoom out Zoom in



When the camera is zoomed in to the maximum magnification (3 \times), holding down **T** (🔍) triggers digital zoom. The subject is magnified up to 4 \times , for a total magnification of 12 \times .

A monitor indicator shows the current zoom ratio.



Zoom indicator displayed when the zoom buttons are pressed.


Optical zoom (up to 3 \times)

Zoom indicator turns yellow when digital zoom is in effect.

Digital Zoom

Unlike optical zoom, data from the camera's image sensor are processed digitally with digital zoom. Details visible at maximum optical zoom are simply enlarged, producing a slightly "grainy" image.

High-sensitivity Shooting Mode

In high-sensitivity shooting mode ( 35), sensitivity is increased to reduce blurring caused by camera shake or subject movement under low lighting.

Step 3 Focus and Shoot

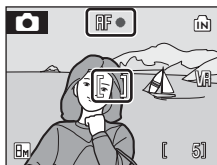
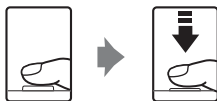
1 Press the shutter-release button halfway.

By default, the camera automatically focuses on the subject in the center focus area.

When the subject is in focus, the focus area and focus indicator (AF●) glow green.

When the camera is unable to focus, the focus area and focus indicator blink red. Change the composition and try again.

When digital zoom is in effect, the focus area is not displayed and focus is acquired on the subject in the center of the monitor.



2 Press the shutter-release button the rest of the way down.

The picture will be recorded to the memory card or internal memory.





Shutter-Release Button

The camera features a two-stage shutter-release button. To set focus and exposure, press the shutter-release button halfway, stopping when you feel resistance. Focus and exposure lock while the shutter-release button is held in this position. To release the shutter and take a picture, press the shutter-release button the rest of the way down. Do not use force when pressing the shutter-release button, as this may result in camera shake and blurred pictures.



✓ During Recording

While pictures are being recorded, the ⏸ (wait) icon will be displayed, and the  (internal memory) or  (memory card) icon will blink. Do not turn the camera off, open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover, or remove or disconnect the power source while these icons are displayed. Cutting power or removing the memory card in these circumstances could result in loss of data or in damage to the camera or card.

🔗 Autofocus

Autofocus may not perform as expected in the following situations. In some rare cases, the subject may not be in focus despite the fact that the focus area and focus indicator glow green:

- Subject is very dark
- Objects of sharply differing brightness are included in the scene (e.g., the sun is behind the subject and is in deep shadow)
- No contrast between the subject and surroundings (e.g., when the subject is standing in front of a white wall, wearing a white shirt)
- Several objects are at different distances from the camera (e.g., the subject is inside a cage)
- Subject is moving rapidly

In the situations noted above, try pressing the shutter-release button halfway to refocus several times, or focus on another subject and use focus lock. When using focus lock, be sure that the distance between the camera and the subject with which focus was locked is the same as that for the actual subject.

🔗 Focus Lock

To focus on off-center subject, use focus lock as described below.

- Be sure that the distance between the camera and the subject does not change while focus is locked.



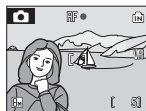
Position the subject in the center focus area.



Press the shutter-release button halfway.



Confirm that the focus indicator (AF ●) is green.



Continue holding down the shutter-release button halfway and recompose the picture.



Press the shutter-release button the rest of the way down.

🔗 AF-assist Illuminator and Flash

If the subject is poorly lit, the AF-assist illuminator may light by pressing the shutter-release button halfway, or the flash may fire by pressing the shutter-release button all the way down.



Quick Playback Zoom




Pressing **T** (Q) during full-frame playback zooms the current picture in 3x, with the center of the picture displayed in the monitor (Quick Playback Zoom)  48). Press  to return to full-frame playback.

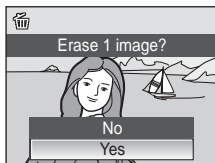


Viewing Pictures

- When the camera is off, holding down  will turn the camera on in full-frame playback mode. If the camera is turned off in voice recording mode  69) or audio playback mode  71), the camera will be turned on in audio playback mode.
- Pictures stored in the internal memory can only be viewed if no memory card is inserted.

Deleting the Last Picture Taken

In shooting mode, press  to delete the last picture taken. When the confirmation dialog shown at right is displayed, use the rotary multi selector to choose [Yes] and press . To exit without deleting the picture, choose [No] and press .



Using the Flash

The flash has a range of about 0.3–6 m (1–19 ft. 8.0 in.) when the camera is zoomed out all the way. With maximum optical zoom applied, the range is about 0.3–4 m (1–13 ft. 1.5 in.) (when [ISO sensitivity] is set to [Auto]). The following flash modes are available.

Auto (default setting for (auto) mode)

Flash fires automatically when lighting is poor.

Auto with red-eye reduction

Reduces “red-eye” in portraits (31).

Off

Flash will not fire even when lighting is poor.

Fill flash

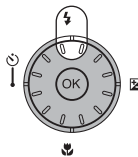
Flash fires when a picture is taken. Use to “fill-in” (illuminate) shadows and back-lit subjects.

Slow sync

Flash illuminates main subject; slow shutter speeds are used to capture background at night or under dim light.

1 Press (flash mode).

The flash mode menu is displayed.



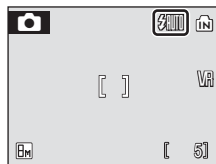
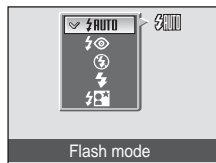
2 Use the rotary multi selector to choose the desired flash mode and press .

The icon for the selected flash mode is displayed at the top of the monitor.

When (auto) is applied, is only displayed for five seconds.

The flash mode applied in (auto) mode and high-sensitivity shooting mode is stored in the camera’s memory even after the camera is turned off.

If a setting is not applied by pressing within a few seconds, the selection will be cancelled.



✓ Shooting When Lighting Is Poor and the Flash Is Disabled (🔋)

- Use of a tripod is recommended to stabilize the camera during shooting and avoid the effects of camera shake. Turn vibration reduction (🔧 113) off when using a tripod.
- The **ISO** icon is displayed when the camera automatically increases sensitivity. Pictures taken when **ISO** is displayed may be slightly mottled.
- When **ISO** is displayed and higher sensitivity is applied, noise reduction may be automatically applied as pictures taken are recorded; results in increased recording times.

✓ Note on Using the Flash

When using the flash at a wide-angle zoom position, reflections from dust particles in the air may appear as bright spots in pictures. To reduce these reflections, set the flash mode to 🚫 (Off) or zoom in on the subject.

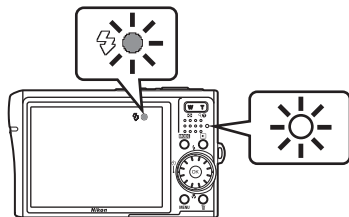
✍ The AF-assist Illuminator

If lighting is poor, the AF-assist illuminator may light to assist the focus operation when the shutter-release button is pressed halfway. The illuminator has a range of about 3.5 m (11 ft. 5.7 in.) at the maximum wide-angle position and about 3 m (9 ft. 10.1 in.) at the maximum telescopic position. The AF-assist illuminator can be set to [Off] manually (🔧 113), although in this case the camera may not focus when lighting is poor.

✍ The Flash Indicator and Flash Lamp

The flash indicator and flash lamp show flash status when the shutter-release button is pressed halfway.

- **On:** Flash will fire when picture is taken.
- **Blinks:** Flash charging. Wait a few seconds and try again.
- **Off:** Flash will not fire when picture is taken.



When pictures are taken using the flash and a low battery, the monitor display will turn off and the flash lamp will blink until the flash is fully charged.

✍ Red-Eye Reduction

The COOLPIX S51c is equipped with an advanced red-eye reduction system. Pre-flashes are fired several times at low intensity before the main flash to reduce “red-eye.” If the camera detects “red-eye” after a picture is taken, Nikon’s own In-Camera Red-Eye Fix processes the image as it is recorded. Therefore, there is a slight delay before the shutter-release button operates normally to take another picture.

- Not recommended for when shutter-release timing is essential.
- Red-eye reduction may not always produce the desired results.
- In some rare cases, other portions of pictures may be affected.

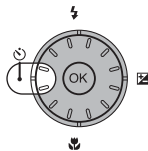
Use flash modes other than auto with red-eye reduction in above cases.

Taking Pictures with the Self-Timer

The camera is equipped with a ten-second and three-second timer for self-portraits. When using the self-timer, use of a tripod is recommended. Turn vibration reduction (📷 113) off when using a tripod.

Macro (Close-up) Mode

Macro mode is used for taking pictures of objects as close as 4 cm (1.6 in.). Note that the flash may be unable to light entire subject at distances of less than 30 cm (11.8 in.).

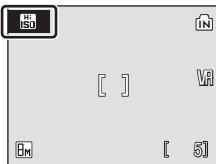
High-sensitivity Shooting Mode

In high-sensitivity shooting mode, sensitivity is increased with shooting under low lighting to reduce blurring caused by camera shake or subject movement, allowing you to capture the atmosphere of the scene. ISO sensitivity will be automatically increased to a maximum of 1600 depending upon the brightness of the subject.

- 1 Enter high-sensitivity shooting mode by pressing **MODE** in shooting mode, selecting **Hi ISO** (use the rotary multi selector), and then pressing **OK**.



- 2 Frame the subject and take the picture.



✓ Notes on High-sensitivity Shooting Mode

- This mode reduces effects of camera shake even for shooting under low lighting; however, when shooting without the flash, use of a tripod is recommended. Turn vibration reduction (vibration reduction) (113) off when using a tripod.
- Pictures taken in this mode may become somewhat grainy.
- Focus may not be precisely fixed in extremely dark places.

🔍 High-sensitivity Shooting Mode

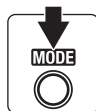
In high-sensitivity shooting mode, pressing **MENU** displays the high-sensitivity menu. The items available from this menu are the same as those available in the **(auto)** mode shooting menu (88), except that [ISO sensitivity] is not available in the high-sensitivity menu. Just as with **(auto)** mode, the flash mode, self-timer, macro mode, and exposure compensation are available.

✓ Panorama Assist

Flash mode (F 30), self-timer (F 32), macro mode (F 33), and exposure compensation (F 34) settings cannot be adjusted after the first picture is taken. Pictures cannot be deleted, nor can zoom or image-mode setting (F 89) be adjusted until the series is finalized.

The panorama series is terminated if the camera enters standby mode with the auto off function (F 114) during shooting. Setting the time allowed to elapse before the auto off function is enabled to a longer setting is recommended.

🔒 Exposure Lock

AE-L or **AF-L** (when macro mode is applied) is displayed to indicate that white balance and exposure have been locked at the values set with the first shot. All pictures taken in a panorama series have the same exposure and white-balance settings.







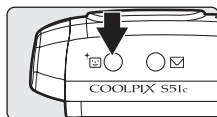

- Portrait: The portrait subject stands out clearly.
- Face-priority AF: The camera automatically detects and focuses on faces.
- Advanced red-eye reduction: Reduces “red-eye” caused by the flash ( 31). Macro mode is not available in one-touch portrait mode.

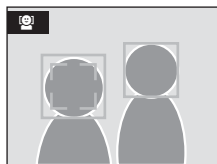

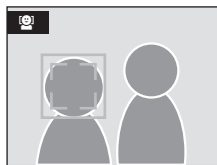
When the camera detects a face, the guide is displayed with a double yellow border.

When the camera detects more than one face, the closest face is framed by a double border and the rest by a single border. The camera focuses on the face framed by the double border and adjusts exposure accordingly. If the camera loses its ability to detect a face (for example, because the subject has looked away from the camera), borders are no longer displayed. Digital zoom cannot be applied.



3 Press the shutter-release button halfway.

Face-Priority AF



- If no face is recognized when the shutter-release button is pressed halfway, the camera focuses on the center of the frame.
- The camera may be unable to detect faces in the following situations:
 - When faces are partially hidden by sunglasses or other obstructions
 - When the subject is not looking directly at the camera
 - When faces take up too much or too little of the frame
- The camera's ability to detect faces depends on a variety of factors, including whether or not the subject is facing the camera.
- If the yellow double border blinks when the shutter-release button is pressed halfway, the camera was unable to focus. Release the button and try again.
- In some rare cases shooting subjects with which autofocus may not perform as expected (📷 27), the subject may not be in focus despite the fact that the double border glows green. Should this occur, switch to 📷 (auto) mode, refocus on another subject positioned at the same distance from the camera as the actual portrait subject, and use focus lock (📷 27).

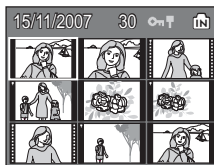








📷 Nikon Transfer (Windows only)

When the Windows version of the supplied Nikon Transfer software (Ⓚ 75) is used to transfer pictures stored on the memory card to a computer, Pictmotion movies created with the camera can be transferred to the computer and converted to movie files.

Up to ten ten-minute user-defined music tracks for use with Pictmotion can also be copied from a computer to the memory card inserted in the camera.

However, when recording to the internal memory, or memory cards with capacities of less than 2 GB, the time remaining display indicates the amount of free space remaining in the internal memory or memory card. When 4-GB memory cards are used, up to 2-GB movies can be recorded, and the time remaining display indicates the amount of time until the maximum 2-GB file size will be recorded.

Stop-Motion Movies

- 1 Use the rotary multi selector to choose [Movie options] > [Stop-motion movie] and press **OK**.

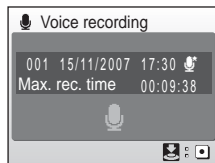
Making Voice Recordings

Audio voice recordings can be recorded over the built-in microphone and played back over the built-in speaker.

Creating a DPOF Print Order: Print Set

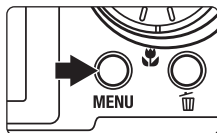
The [Print set] option in the playback menu is used to create digital “print orders” for printing on DPOF-compatible devices (172).

In addition to pictures themselves, shooting date and photo information (shutter speed, aperture, etc.) can also be printed.

When the camera is connected to a PictBridge-compatible printer, pictures can be printed from the printer according to the DPOF print order you have created for pictures on the memory card. Image Mode

The image mode setting can also be applied from the scene and one-touch portrait menus. Changes made to the image mode setting from any of the three menus apply to all shooting modes.


WB White Balance

The color of light reflected from an object varies with the color of the light source. The human brain is able to adapt to changes in the color of the light source, with the result that white objects appear white whether seen in the shade, direct sunlight, or under incandescent lighting. Digital cameras can mimic this adjustment by processing images according to the color of the light source. This is known as “white balance.” For natural coloration, choose a white balance setting that matches the light source before shooting. Although the default setting, [Auto], can be used under most types of lighting, you can apply the white balance setting suited to a particular light source to achieve more accurate results.

Auto (default setting)

White balance automatically adjusted to suit lighting conditions. Best choice in most situations.

Preset manual

Neutral-colored object used as reference to set white balance under unusual lighting conditions ( 92).

Daylight

White balance adjusted for direct sunlight.

Incandescent

Use under incandescent lighting.

Fluorescent


Use under most types of fluorescent lighting.

Cloudy

Use when taking pictures under overcast skies.

Flash

Use with the flash.

The effects of the selected option can be previewed in the monitor. At settings other than [Auto], the icon for the current setting is displayed in the monitor ( 8).

Flash Mode

At white-balance settings other than [Auto] or [Flash], turn the flash off (  30).

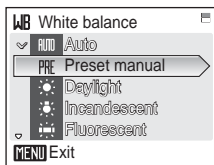
Preset Manual

Preset manual is used with mixed lighting or to compensate for light sources with a strong color cast (for example, to make pictures taken under a lamp with a red shade look as though they had been taken under white light).

1 Place a white or gray reference object under the lighting that will be used during shooting.

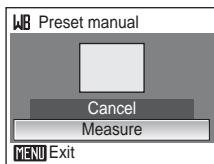

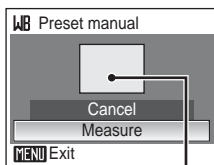

Note on Preset Manual

Regardless of the flash mode selected, the flash will not fire when **OK** is pressed in step 5. Therefore, the camera cannot measure a value for preset manual for when the flash is used.


Continuous

Capture a fleeting expression on a portrait subject, photograph a subject that is moving unpredictably, or capture motion in a series of pictures. Focus, exposure, and white balance are fixed at the values for the first picture in each series.


Single (default setting)

One shot is taken each time shutter-release button is pressed.

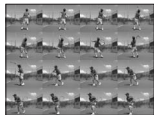
Continuous


While the shutter-release button is held down, pictures are taken at rate of about 0.8 frames per second (fps) when image mode is set to  Normal (3264).

Multi-shot 16

Each time shutter-release button is pressed, camera takes 16 shots at about 0.8 frames per second and arrange them in a single picture ( 3,200 × 2,400 pixels, the compression ratio is approximately 1:8) as shown at right.

Digital zoom cannot be applied.



At settings other than [Single], the indicator for the current setting is displayed in the monitor ( 8).

Note on Continuous Shooting

The maximum frame rate with continuous shooting may vary depending upon the current image mode setting and the memory card used.

Best Shot Selector (BSS)

The “best shot selector” is convenient for shooting in situations where inadvertent camera movement can result in blurred pictures.


At [On] setting, the flash automatically turns off and focus, exposure, and white balance for all pictures are determined by the first picture in each series.

On

Recommended for taking pictures in poorly lit places, or in other situations where camera shake may occur. Camera takes shots while shutter-release button is pressed, to a maximum of ten. These images are then compared and the sharpest picture (picture with highest level of detail) is saved.

Off (default setting)

Only one picture is taken.

The icon for the current setting is displayed in the monitor ( 8).

Note on Best Shot Selector

BSS may not produce the desired results if the subject moves or the composition changes while the shutter-release button is pressed all the way down.

ISO ISO Sensitivity

Sensitivity is a measure of how quickly the camera reacts to light. The higher the sensitivity, the less light needed to make an exposure. Although a high ISO rating is suited for taking pictures of subjects in action or in poor lighting, high sensitivity is often associated with “noise” -randomly spaced, brightly colored pixels concentrated in dark parts of the image.

[Auto] (default setting) is ISO 100 under normal conditions; when lighting is poor and the flash is off, the camera compensates by raising sensitivity to a maximum of ISO 800. Choose from values between ISO 100 and 1600.

At settings other than [Auto], the current setting is displayed in the monitor (📷 8). If [Auto] is selected and the sensitivity is raised above an ISO 100, the ISO icon will be displayed (📷 31).

🎨 Color Options

Make colors more vivid or record pictures in monochrome.

📷 **Standard color (default setting)**
Use for pictures exhibiting natural color.

🎨 **Vivid color**
Use to achieve a vivid, “photoprint” effect.

📷 **Black-and-white**
Record pictures in black-and-white.

📷 **Sepia**
Record pictures in sepia tones.

📷 **Cyanotype**
Record pictures in cyan-blue monochrome.

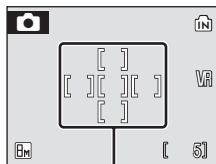
The effects of the selected option can be previewed in the monitor. At settings other than [Standard color], the icon for the current setting is displayed in the monitor (📷 8).

[+] **AF Area Mode**

Use this option to determine where the camera focuses.

[M] **Auto**

Camera automatically selects the focus area (one of five) containing the subject closest to the camera. The selected focus area is displayed when the shutter-release button is pressed halfway.



Focus areas

[C] **Manual**

Press the rotary multi selector ▲, ▼, ◀, or ▶ to select from 99 focus areas in the frame. Pictures can be taken while focus area selection screen is displayed.

To end focus area selection and adjust the flash mode, macro mode, self-timer, and exposure compensation settings, press OK. To return to the focus area selection screen, press OK.

[R] **Center (default setting)**

Camera focuses on subject in center of frame.
Center focus area is used.

Restrictions on Camera Settings

Restrictions apply to the following settings in  (auto) mode.


Flash mode

Flash turns off at [Continuous] settings of [Continuous] or [Multi-shot 16], or when [BSS] is on. Applied setting is restored when [Single] is selected, or [BSS] is turned off.

Self-timer

If self-timer is on, only one shot will be taken when shutter is released, regardless of settings chosen for [Continuous] and [BSS]. Applied [Continuous] and [BSS] settings are restored when picture is taken or self-timer is turned off.

Continuous

Selecting [Continuous] or [Multi-shot 16] turns [BSS] off. Selecting [Multi-shot 16] changes image-mode setting to . Applied [BSS] setting is *not* restored when [Single] is selected.

BSS















[Continuous] is automatically set to [Single] when [On] is selected for [BSS]. Applied setting is *not* restored when [BSS] is turned off.

White balance


White balance is automatically set to [Auto] and cannot be adjusted when [Black-and-white], [Sepia], or [Cyanotype] is selected for [Color options]. Applied white balance setting is restored when [Standard color] or [Vivid color] is selected.

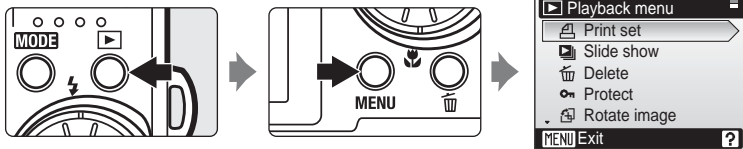

Vibration Reduction

Vibration reduction effectively corrects blur, caused by slight hand movement known as camera shake, that commonly occurs when shooting with zoom applied or at slow shutter speeds. Vibration reduction can be used in all shooting modes.

When [Off] is selected, an icon for the current setting is not displayed in the monitor ( 8).

On (default setting)

Vibration reduction is enabled when taking pictures and recording movies. Camera detects and factors out panning movements when reducing camera shake. When camera is panned horizontally, for example, vibration reduction reduces only vertical shake. If camera is panned vertically, vibration reduction affects only horizontal shake. Set vibration reduction to [Off] when using a tripod.

Off

Vibration reduction is not enabled.

Notes on Vibration Reduction

- Vibration reduction may take a few seconds to activate after the camera recovers from the standby mode or the power is turned on, or the camera enters shooting mode from playback mode. Wait until the display stabilizes before shooting.
- Vibration reduction may be unable to completely eliminate the effects of camera shake in some situations.
- [VR] stands for vibration reduction.

AF Assist

If [Auto] (default setting) is selected, AF-assist illumination will be used to assist the focus operation when the subject is poorly lit.

Note that for some scene modes, AF-assist illumination turns off automatically.

To disable this function, choose [Off]. When set to [Off], the camera may be unable to focus if lighting is poor.

Sound Settings

Adjust the following sound settings.

Button sound

When [On] (default setting) is selected, beep will sound once when operations are completed successfully, twice when the camera acquires focus on the subject, and three times when error is detected.


Shutter sound

Turn shutter sound on or off. The default setting is [On].


Record Orientation

Choose whether or not to record the orientation of pictures taken in “tall” orientation.

Choose [Auto] (default setting) to record the picture’s orientation detected by the camera’s sensor. The taken picture will be automatically rotated in playback mode. When [Off] is selected, the picture will be displayed in the same orientation as it was taken.

Picture Mail/Picture Bank

This section introduces the services, Picture Mail and Picture Bank, using the COOLPIX S51c's wireless features that allow users to take advantage of the my Picturetown server on the Internet.

The COOLPIX S51c is equipped with a wireless LAN function that allows direct picture upload from the camera to the my Picturetown server. The camera's wireless LAN function allows direct connection to the Internet using a wireless LAN access point at home.

- **Picture Mail**

Selected pictures can be uploaded to the my Picturetown server for viewing by your family and friends. E-mail notification of picture upload, along with a link to your pictures, will be sent to the specified recipients automatically, a feature that gives you a convenient way to share pictures recording your children's growth or vacation (📷 122).

- **Picture Bank**

Pictures and movies are uploaded to the my Picturetown server for storage. The my Picturetown server can be used as a personal server for storing pictures and uploaded pictures can be displayed in your web browser and downloaded to a computer. Upload of selected pictures can be initiated, or picture upload can be set to begin automatically when the AC adapter is connected to the camera to charge the battery, making this a convenient service when taking a large number of pictures or for saving the pictures you take on an everyday basis (📷 122).

Home Wireless LAN

- Home wireless LAN refers to wireless LAN environment used at home. my Picturetown is available in infrastructure mode, which supports connection to the Internet via an access point. my Picturetown is not available if the home wireless LAN uses a proxy server to connect to the Internet.
- For more information on home wireless LAN configuration, contact the manufacturer of the wireless LAN adapter or access point, or see other commercially available references on wireless LAN.

Network Profile



- A network profile refers to network information that must be configured with the camera to enable connection to the Internet via an access point. In general, SSID (Service Set Identifier) is referred to as a network name. When specifying SSIDs for the COOLPIX S51c, configure an individual network profile for each SSID. For more information on configuring network profiles, see “Configuring Wireless LAN Settings from the Camera” (📖 126) and “Configuring Wireless LAN Settings from a Computer” (📖 136).
- The first 16 characters of SSIDs (up to 32 alphanumeric characters) are automatically used for corresponding network profiles.
- Network profiles required for home wireless LAN connections can be configured using the camera, or a computer and the supplied my Picturetown Utility. When using the camera, network profiles can be configured from the camera’s setup menu, or after selecting pictures and recipients. Note that connection may not be possible depending on wireless LAN access point settings.

The my Picturetown Utility

- The my Picturetown Utility (hereafter referred to as Utility) is software that can be installed and used to configure network profiles for wireless connection and to edit configuration settings with the camera when the camera is connected to the computer via the supplied audio video/USB cable. Configuration is possible using the camera’s setup menu. However, the Utility may be more convenient for entering text, such as for e-mail addresses.
- Install the Utility from the Software Suite (CD) supplied with the camera (📖 137).

Follow the service requirements and the configuration and operation instructions for the selected service.

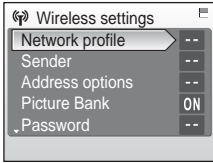

Wireless LAN Settings for the Camera

To take advantage of my Picturetown using the wireless features, network settings including a network profile and sender information, must be configured for the wireless LAN. Refer to the information below for assistance in configuring settings using the [Wireless settings] option in the camera's setup menu or the Utility on a computer.

The camera's setup menu



my Picturetown Utility



Network Profile (mandatory configuration)

“Network profile” refers to the network settings configured for connection via a wireless LAN access point that supports Internet connection. To use my Picturetown services, configure the following network settings to match those used by the desired wireless LAN (access point).

Network name (SSID)

Enter the name of the network (up to 32 characters) to which the access point belongs. If a name is displayed when configuring a network profile using the Utility, use that name. If more than one name is displayed, choose the desired network name.

Authentication

Select an authentication method from [Open system], [Shared key], [WPA-PSK], or [WPA2-PSK] for verifying connection to the desired wireless LAN.

Encryption

Make your wireless LAN connection more secure by encrypting data. The encryption method(s) available to the camera differ depending upon the authentication method selected (see below).

Authentication method	Encryption method(s) available to the camera
[Open system]	[None] or [WEP]
[Shared key]	[WEP]
[WPA-PSK]	[TKIP]
[WPA2-PSK]	[AES]

Encryption key

Enter the encryption key, provided by the network administrator, for the selected authentication method. This is not necessary when [Authentication] is set to [Open system] and [Encryption] is set to [None].

Key index

When [Encryption] is set to [WEP], select the same key index used by the access point (unnecessary when [Encryption] is set to [None], [TKIP], or [AES]). The default setting is [1]. Use the Utility to specify a setting other than [1].

Configuration

Select the method for specifying the camera's IP address from [Auto] (default setting) or [Manual].

IP address

When [Configuration] is set to [Manual], enter an IP address, along with a subnet mask, gateway, primary DNS, and secondary DNS for the camera.

MAC Address Filtering

When MAC address filtering is enabled, only devices with an authorized MAC address can access the wireless LAN. Check the camera's MAC address in [Firmware version] of the setup menu (🔍 119) and add it to the authorized list.

Sender Information (mandatory configuration)

To use my Picturertown, the sender's alias (up to 16 alphanumerical characters) and e-mail address (up to 64 alphanumerical characters; mobile telephone e-mail addresses are not supported) must be configured with the camera to register user information on the my Picturertown server (🔍 148). Once the user information has been registered, user information cannot be edited from the camera or the Utility.

Picture Mail Recipients

With Picture Mail, e-mail notification can be sent automatically to specified recipients whenever pictures are uploaded to the server. Up to 30 recipients can be specified. An alias (up to 16 alphanumerical characters) and e-mail address (up to 64 alphanumerical characters) must be entered for each recipient. E-mail addresses for only certain models of mobile telephones, used in Japan and the United States, are supported (🔍 134). In addition, recipients can be grouped for specification of multiple recipients as a single Picture Mail recipient.

Password

A password (four-digit number) can be applied to prevent unauthorized access to wireless services by third parties and to protect information stored in the camera.

Configuring Wireless LAN Settings from the Camera

Configure necessary information for wireless LAN connection using the camera. This information can also be configured with the camera using a computer and the Utility (☒ 136).

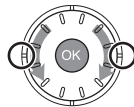

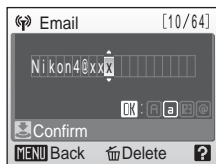

Entering Text with the Camera

Text for information such as aliases, e-mail addresses, and WEP keys can be entered using the camera.



- Press **OK** to change the type of character entered in the following order: uppercase letters → lowercase letters → numbers → symbols → uppercase letters, and so on.
- Rotate the rotary multi selector clockwise, or press the rotary multi selector **▲**, to enter letters (A to Z) in alphabetical order. Rotate the rotary multi selector counterclockwise, or press the rotary multi selector **▼**, to enter letters in reverse order.
- Press the rotary multi selector **▶** to move the cursor to the right. Press the rotary multi selector **◀** to move the cursor to the left.
- Press **⌫** to delete the letters at the cursor position. However, **⌫** cannot be used when entering information for an item that requires a fixed number of characters.
- Press **T** (🔍) to preview the letters that have been entered. Press **T** (🔍) again to return to the text entry screen.
- Press the shutter-release button to apply selection.



More on Configuring Network Profiles

Before wireless connection profiles are configured from the camera's setup menu, network profiles for home wireless LANs, after selecting pictures and recipients, can be configured (🔍 126) when the wireless LAN at home meets the following requirements:

- Connection by any wireless device is allowed.
- MAC address filtering is not enabled.
- Data is encrypted using WEP encryption, or no data encryption is applied.
- IP addresses are acquired automatically (DHCP).

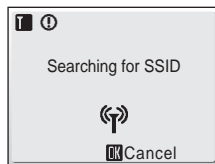
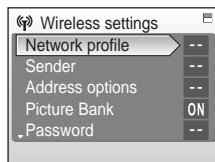

1 Choose [Network profile] from the [Wireless settings] option in the camera’s setup menu.

Press **OK** to apply selection.

If a password has been applied (📖 134), enter the password and press the shutter-release button. For information on entering text, see “Entering Text with the Camera” (📖 127).

The camera will search for available SSIDs.



2 Choose the SSID and press **OK**.

Up to ten SSIDs, with network profiles configured with the camera and those detected by the camera, are listed.

SSIDs with network profiles are listed first regardless of signal strength.

The icon to the left of each SSID indicates signal strength and is displayed in red when out of range.

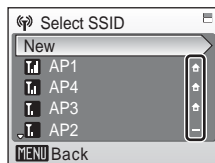
The icon to the right of each SSID shows the status of the camera’s network profiles:

🏠 (home wireless LAN profile configured), -- (no profile configured)

If connection by any wireless device is not allowed with an access point and the desired SSID (up to 32 alphanumerical characters) is not detected, select [New] and enter a network name (SSID) in the SSID screen. Press the shutter-release button.

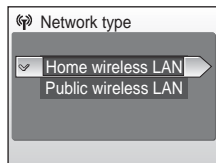
Choose an SSID with a network profile and press **OK**. Profile settings can be edited by following the same procedure used for SSIDs for which network profiles have not been configured. To delete an existing profile of an SSID, select the SSID and press **🗑️**.

You can configure a maximum of ten network profiles in the camera. If ten have already been configured and you want to add a new one, delete an unnecessary profile using the camera or the Utility.



3 Choose [Home wireless LAN] for the network type and press **OK**.

Set up and use of public wireless LANs with the COOLPIX S51c is not available in all countries. For more information on countries where public wireless LAN connection is available, see "Public Wireless LAN" (p. 140).

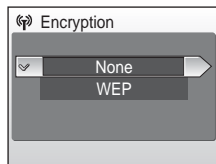
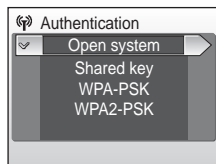

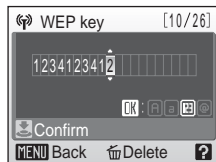

- When [WPA2-PSK] is selected, enter the AES key in the AES screen.



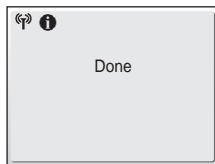
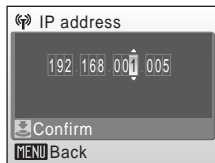
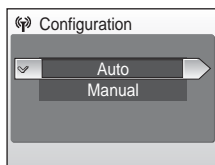
6 Choose the desired method for specifying the camera's IP address and press **OK**.

When [Configuration] is set to [Auto], camera's IP address will be specified automatically.

When [Configuration] is set to [Manual], configure the [IP address], [Subnet mask], [Gateway], [Primary DNS], and [Secondary DNS] settings in order, pressing the shutter-release button to apply each setting.

When configuring [IP address], [Subnet mask], [Gateway], [Primary DNS], and [Secondary DNS] settings, enter each set of numbers so that they are aligned to the right. Numbers must be entered correctly to properly configure the settings.

When all settings have been configured, "Done" will be displayed.

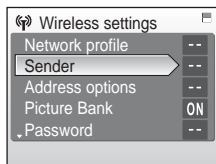

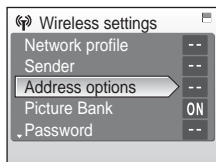
Once user information has been registered with the my Picturetown server, the sender information cannot be edited from the camera or the Utility (🔒 125, 148).

Creating and Editing Groups

Recipient groups can only be created or edited using the [Wireless settings] option in the camera's setup menu. The Utility cannot be used to create or edit groups.

Mobile Telephones Compatible with Picture Mail

The use of mobile telephone e-mail addresses for Picture Mail is only possible in Japan and the United States, and is supported only for mobile telephones with the following specifications.

- Japan: 3G mobile telephones by NTT DoCoMo FOMA, KDDI au WIN, and SoftBank 3G
- U.S.A.: BlackBerry smartphones (version 4.0 or later recommended).

These mobile telephones can receive e-mail notification of picture upload for which mobile telephone e-mail addresses are specified as recipients. However, pictures cannot be viewed with some of these mobile telephones.


Wireless LAN settings for wireless features have been configured. Before using the wireless features, applying a password with the camera is recommended (☒ 134).

Protecting my Pictown Settings Information

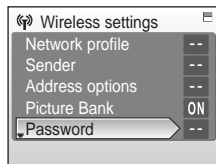
A password can be applied to prevent access to wireless network information entered in the camera, including the network profiles and recipient e-mail addresses, by third parties if the camera should be lost or stolen, or otherwise compromised. In addition, all camera settings can be restored to their default settings and data stored in the camera's internal memory can be deleted before the camera is transferred to another owner or discarded.


Applying a Password

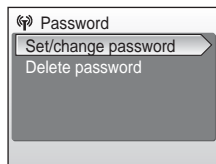
Follow the procedure described below to apply a password with the camera. When a password is applied, the correct password must be entered to use my Pictown services.

- 1 Select [Password] from the [Wireless settings] option in the camera's setup menu and press .

The password screen will be displayed.

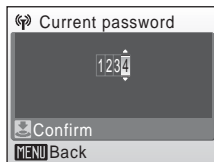

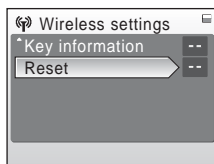


Resetting the Camera

Follow the instructions below to reset all wireless LAN connection settings, including the password, stored in the camera. Use the [Reset] option to delete all user information registered and configured with the camera before transferring it to another owner. This option can also be used to reset the camera if you forget the password.

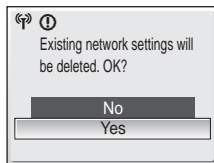

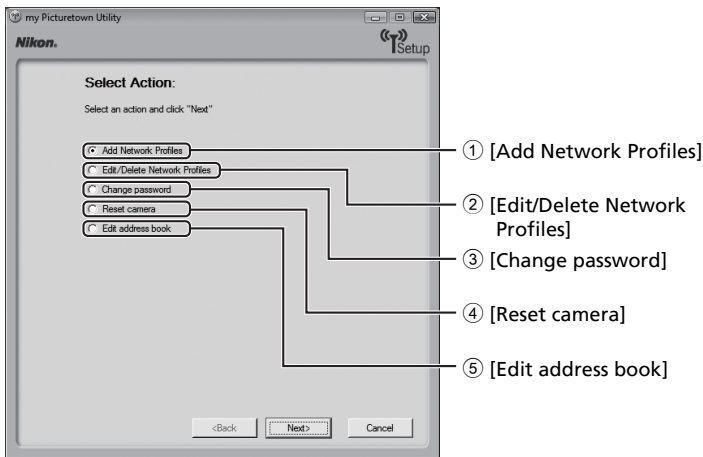


Resetting the Password and Camera

- Avoid using a password that can be easily guessed, such as a birth date. Be sure that you do not forget your password.
- To delete the current password without resetting the camera, select [Delete password] in step 2 of "Applying a Password," and press **OK**. Enter the password to be deleted in the current password screen and press the shutter-release button.
- When the [Reset] option is applied, user information registered with the my Picturetown server will be deleted. Therefore, it is recommended that the information be registered with the server again ( 148).

Configuring Wireless LAN Settings from a Computer

Settings configured using the camera's setup menu can also be configured using a computer and the Utility.



- 1 Configure wireless LAN settings information with the camera.
- 2 Edit or delete network profiles stored in the camera.

Rotate the rotary multi selector to move  (recipients) or  (recipient groups) to the selection area, and press  to select the recipient or group (). Press  again to cancel the selection.

Recipients in a selected group will also be indicated with .



To add a recipient or group, select [New], press , and enter the recipient's e-mail address (up to 64 alphanumeric characters) or create a new group ( 132, 133). Once the information has been entered, press the shutter-release button to return to the queue mail screen. The first 16 characters of e-mail addresses are automatically used for corresponding aliases. Aliases can be edited in the future ( 132, 136). The number displayed at the top right of the monitor indicates the number of recipients specified for a displayed picture.



Selection area

4 Press the shutter-release button to add the Picture Mail to the queue.

To specify recipients for different pictures, repeat steps 2 and 3 before applying the setting. Up to 30 pictures can be selected.

Press **W** () before applying the setting to switch to thumbnail display to preview the pictures, for which recipients are specified, in the queue mail screen. Press **T** () to return to the queue mail screen.



5 Choose whether to upload pictures immediately.

Choose [Yes] and press **OK** to upload all the queued pictures. Check to ensure a wireless LAN access point is available. Proceed to step 6.

Choose [No] and press **OK** to finalize picture selection and recipient specification in the queue. The camera will exit to the last shooting or playback mode selected.



6 Connect to a wireless LAN and upload pictures.

When pictures are uploaded for the first time, or the camera does not detect the SSID with which pictures were uploaded previously, select the desired SSID in the select SSID screen. For more information on choosing the desired SSID, see “Choosing the Desired SSID and Uploading Pictures” (**F** 146).

If the camera detects the SSID with which pictures were uploaded previously, picture upload will be initiated automatically. To cancel upload, press **OK**. When upload is complete, the message, [Transfer complete. Connection terminated.], will be displayed. After upload is complete, press **OK**.

F Sending Picture Mail in the Queue

- When **M** is pressed in shooting or playback mode, the queue mail screen shown in step 3 will be displayed (**F** 141). Confirm the selected pictures and specified recipients, and press the shutter-release button to send Picture Mail in the queue. To cancel the queue, cancel the recipients or groups specified for pictures and press the shutter-release button.
- When a Picture Bank upload is initiated (**F** 143, 144), queued Picture Mails will be sent at the same time. If there is no wish to upload queued Picture Mails at the time of a Picture Bank upload (**F** 143, 144), press **M** before beginning picture upload to cancel the queue in the queue mail screen.

P Picture Size for Picture Mail

If pictures are shot with the image sizes greater than 1,600 × 1,200 pixels, their sizes will be reduced to 1,600 × 1,200 pixels when uploaded to the my Picturetown server. If pictures are shot with image sizes of 1,600 × 1,200 pixels or smaller, their sizes will remain unchanged when uploaded to the my Picturetown server.

P After Sending Picture Mail

When pictures are uploaded using Picture Mail, e-mail notification will be sent automatically to the specified recipients for the intended pictures. Recipients can click the URL included in e-mail notification to view the pictures stored on the my Picturetown server.


M Mobile Telephones Compatible with Picture Mail


E-mail addresses for only certain models of mobile telephones, used in Japan and the United States, are supported (**F** 134).


When pictures are uploaded using Picture Mail for the first time, e-mail notification requesting user registration will be sent to the sender e-mail address registered with the camera. Refer to the instructions included in the e-mail notification received to register user information using a computer as soon as possible (F** 148).**

Using Picture Bank

Uploading Selected Pictures


- 1 Press **MODE** in playback mode and use the rotary multi selector to choose , and press **OK**.

If a password has been applied, enter the password ( 134) and press the shutter-release button.



If the sender information (alias and e-mail address) is not configured with the camera, enter the sender information ( 127).



- 2 Choose pictures.

Use the rotary multi selector to choose pictures and press **OK** to choose a desired picture (). Press **OK** again to cancel a selection.

Up to 30 pictures can be selected.

Press **T** () to switch to full-frame playback; press **W** () to return to thumbnail display.

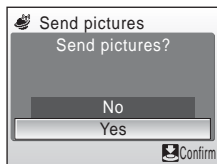

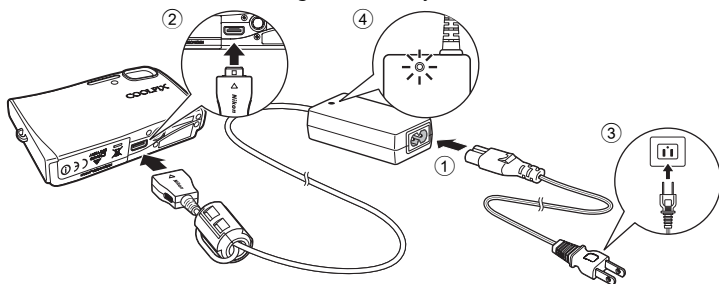

Uploading All Pictures at Once

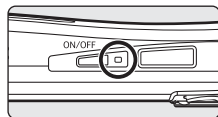
By default, the camera automatically uploads pictures that have not yet been uploaded to the my Picturetown server whenever the AC adapter is connected to the camera to charge the battery.



1 Connect the power cable and AC adapter ①.

2 Turn off the camera.

If the power-on (green) lamp is lit, press the power switch to turn off the camera. **Picture upload cannot be initiated by connecting the AC adapter when the camera is turned on.**



3 Connect the AC adapter to the camera's multi connector ②.

The multi connector should be fully inserted.

4 Plug the power cable into an outlet ③.

The AC adapter power-on lamp will light ④.




When the camera is turned on and the message, [Starting upload to Picture Bank], is displayed, Picture Bank begins uploading pictures.

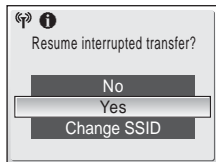
If the sender information (alias and e-mail address) is not configured with the camera, enter the sender information (☒ 127).

When pictures are uploaded for the first time, or the camera does not detect the SSID with which pictures were uploaded previously, select the desired SSID in the select SSID screen. For more information on choosing the desired SSID, see "Choosing the Desired SSID and Uploading Pictures" (☒ 146).


If the camera detects the SSID with which pictures were uploaded previously, picture upload will be initiated automatically. To cancel upload, press Ⓚ. Once upload is complete, the camera turns off, the power-on lamp blinks orange, and the battery begins charging.

When the Transfer is Unsuccessful

When transfer is unsuccessful over a wireless LAN connection, the next time you select  in the playback-mode selection menu and press , the confirmation dialog shown at right will be displayed. If necessary, you can change the SSID from the confirmation dialog. Select [Yes] to resume the interrupted transfer. This confirmation dialog will not be displayed when upload of all pictures using Picture Bank is initiated by connecting the AC adapter ( 144).

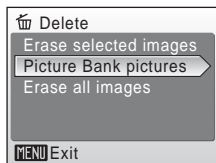


Picture Bank Pictures

Pictures that have been uploaded to the server are referred to as "Picture Bank pictures" and can be recognized by the Picture Bank pictures icon displayed with them in full-frame playback. Once the icon has been displayed with a picture, that picture cannot be uploaded to the server a second time using the automatic upload feature initiated when the AC adapter is connected to the camera. In cases when a picture is deleted from the server and is desired for upload again, the intended picture can be uploaded by selecting the [my Picturetown] item in the playback-mode selection menu ( 143).


Deleting Pictures Bank Pictures

You can select the [Picture Bank pictures] option from the [Delete] items in calendar and list by date menus to delete only those pictures, taken on the specified date, that have already been uploaded to the my Picturetown server.



Modifying the Automatic Picture Bank Setting

Choose [On] (default setting) or [Off] from the camera's setup menu > [Wireless settings] > [Picture Bank]. If [Off] is selected, connecting the AC adapter to the camera starts charging the battery without picture upload.

When pictures are uploaded using Picture Bank for the first time, e-mail notification requesting user registration will be sent to the sender e-mail address registered with the camera. Refer to the instructions included in the e-mail notification received to register user information using a computer as soon as possible ( 148).

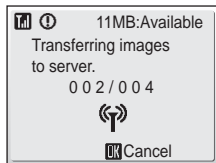
* Once upload of all pictures, which is initiated by connecting the AC adapter, is complete, the camera turns off and the battery begins charging.

3 Register user information with my Picturetown.


When pictures are uploaded using Picture Mail or Picture Bank for the first time, e-mail notification requesting user registration will be sent to the sender e-mail address registered with the camera. Refer to the instructions included in the e-mail notification received to register user information using a computer as soon as possible (🔑 148).

Message Displayed During Transfer

The message shown at right is displayed in the monitor during picture transfer. The antenna icon in the top left corner of the monitor indicates signal strength (5-levels). The icon changes to red when outside the network area. When signal strength is poor, remove any obstacles between the camera antenna and access point. To cancel the current transfer, press **OK**.




Wireless LAN LED

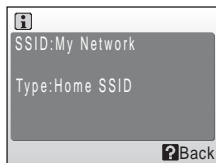
The wireless LAN LED ( 6) is located on the side of the camera (inside the antenna). The camera is searching for profiles when the LED blinks, a wireless connection is established when the LED is lit, and the camera is disconnected from a wireless LAN when the LED is off. If transfer is not performed for a while, the LED may blink to save power.

The Memory Card Write-Protect Switch

When the memory card write-protect switch is in the “lock” position, transfer over a wireless LAN connection cannot be performed.

Checking SSID Contents

Pressing **T** () in the SSID selection screen displays the network name (SSID) and the profile type.



Registering User Information with my Picturetown to View Uploaded Pictures

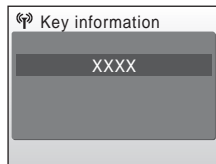
Register user information with the my Picturetown server to view pictures that are uploaded using Picture Mail (📧 141) or Picture Bank (📧 143). This server acts as an archive for protecting and sharing pictures recorded with the camera. Until user registration has been complete, uploaded pictures are stored in a temporary space on the server and cannot be viewed. Once user registration has been complete, private space on the server will be reserved for uploaded pictures, and the pictures can be viewed and downloaded by accessing the server from a computer.

Registering User Information with my Picturetown

When pictures are uploaded using Picture Mail or Picture Bank for the first time, e-mail notification requesting user registration will be sent to the sender e-mail address registered with the camera. Click the link in the e-mail notification to display the user registration webpage.

Enter the following information on the user registration webpage.

Key information: Key information is assigned to each camera. Select the [Key information] option from the [Wireless settings] item in the camera's setup menu and press **OK** to display the key information for your camera.



Password: Create a password to access your private space on the server and be sure that you do not forget it.

- 1 Open the e-mail notification requesting user registration on a computer with an Internet connection and click the link provided.**

The user registration webpage will be displayed in your web browser. Use one of the following compatible web browsers to properly view the webpage:

- Windows: Internet Explorer 6 or later
- Macintosh: Safari 2 or later

The sender alias and e-mail address registered with the camera will be displayed.



- 2 Enter the assigned key information and a password to register your user information.**

User registration is complete once the user information has been entered.


More on User Registration

Refer to the instructions included in the e-mail notification received, as well as those in the user registration webpage itself, for more information.

Notes on User Registration

- After the first picture upload, register user information as soon as possible to protect pictures, along with other personal information, from unsolicited viewing or theft. Until user information is registered, pictures are uploaded to temporary space on the server with no security measures applied.
- Until user information is registered, e-mail notification requesting user registration will be sent whenever pictures are uploaded. If you do not receive the e-mail notification, sender information registered with the camera may be incorrect. Correct sender information and upload pictures again.
- Once user information has been registered, information including the sender's alias and e-mail address cannot be edited from the camera or the Utility. Access the my Picturetown server from a computer to edit user information.
- If you forget the password and reset all wireless settings after you have applied the password, e-mail notification requesting user registration will be sent to the sender's e-mail address the next time pictures are uploaded. Click the link provided in the e-mail notification to access the user registration webpage.
- Before discarding the camera or transferring it to another owner, confirm whether or not pictures have been uploaded once. If pictures have ever been uploaded, be sure to register user information with the server, and then reset all wireless settings ( 135).
- If this camera was given to you by a previous owner, reset all wireless settings ( 135) before using the camera and taking advantage of wireless services.

Note on Protecting Personal Information

Once a wireless service has been used, personal information is saved in the camera and on the my Picturetown server. To protect personal information from unsolicited viewing or theft, apply a password to protect data stored in the camera ( 134), and register user information with the server to protect uploaded data. It is highly recommended that these protection measures be applied.

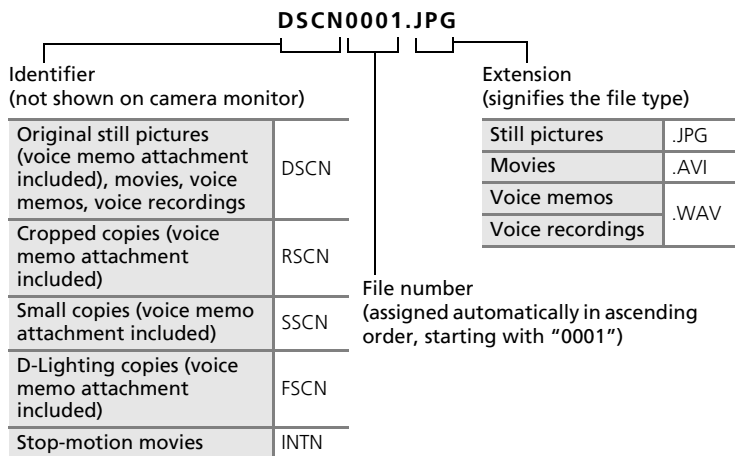

Image/Sound File and Folder Names

Pictures, movies, voice memos, and voice recordings are assigned file names as follows.



- Files are stored in folders named with a folder number followed by a five-character identifier: "P_" plus a three-digit sequence number for pictures taken using panorama assist (e.g., "101P_001"; 42), "SOUND" (normal quality sound) or "SOUNE" (high quality sound) for voice recordings (e.g., "101SOUND"; 69), and "NIKON" for all other pictures (e.g., "100NIKON"). When the number of files within a folder reaches 9999, a new folder will be created. File numbers will be assigned automatically starting with "0001".
- Files copied using [Copy] > [Selected images] or [Copy sound files] > [Selected files] are copied to the current folder, where they are assigned new file numbers in ascending order starting from the largest file number in memory. [Copy] > [All images] and [Copy sound files] > [Copy all files] copy all folders from the source medium; file names do not change but new folder numbers are assigned in ascending order starting from the largest folder number on the destination medium (73, 102).

Image/Sound File and Folder Names

- Pictmotion movies (📷 58) are stored under the “NKST” folder in folders named with a three-digit folder number followed by “PRJCT” (e.g., “101PRJCT”). Each folder contains the picture and sound files for a single Pictmotion movie.
- Folders can hold up to 200 pictures; if a picture is taken when the current folder contains 200 pictures, a new folder will be created by adding one to the current folder number. If a picture is taken when the current folder is numbered 999 and contains 200 pictures or a picture numbered 9999, no further pictures can be taken until the medium is formatted (📷 115) or a new memory card inserted.

Caring for the Camera

To ensure continued enjoyment of this Nikon product, observe the following precautions when using or storing the device.

✔ Keep Dry

The device will be damaged if immersed in water or subjected to high humidity.

✔ Do Not Drop

The product may malfunction if subjected to strong shock or vibration.

✔ Handle the Lens and all Moving Parts with Care

Do not apply force to the lens, lens cover, monitor, memory card slot or battery chamber. These parts are easily damaged. Applying force to the lens cover could result in camera malfunction or damage to the lens. Should the monitor break, care should be taken to avoid injury caused by broken glass and to prevent the liquid crystal from the display touching the skin or entering the eyes or mouth.

✔ Do Not Point the Lens at Strong Light Sources for Extended Periods

Avoid pointing the lens at the sun or other strong light sources for extended periods when using or storing the camera. Intense light may cause deterioration of the CCD image sensor, producing a white blur effect in photographs.

✔ Keep Away from Strong Magnetic Fields

Do not use or store this device in the vicinity of equipment that generates strong electromagnetic radiation or magnetic fields. Strong static charges or the magnetic fields produced by equipment such as radio transmitters could interfere with the monitor, damage data stored on the memory card, or affect the product's internal circuitry.

✔ Avoid Sudden Changes in Temperature


Sudden changes in temperature, such as when entering or leaving a heated building on a cold day, can cause condensation to form inside the device. To prevent condensation, place the device in a carrying case or a plastic bag before exposing it to sudden changes in temperature.

✔ Turn the Product Off Before Removing or Disconnecting the Power Source

Do not remove the battery while the product is on, or while images are being recorded or deleted. Forcibly cutting power in these circumstances could result in loss of data or in damage to product memory or internal circuitry.

Caring for the Camera


✔ The Self-timer Lamp/AF-assist Illuminator LED

The light-emitting diode (LED;  6, 32, 113) used in the self-timer lamp/AF-assist illuminator conforms to the following IEC standard:

The Battery

- Check the battery level when taking the camera out, and charge the battery if necessary ( 16). Do not continue charging once the battery is fully charged, as this will result in reduced battery performance. If possible, carry a fully-charged spare battery when taking pictures on important occasions.
- Do not use the battery at ambient temperatures below 0 °C (32 °F) or above 40 °C (104 °F). During charging, the temperature should be in the vicinity of 5 to 35 °C (41 to 95 °F). Note that the battery may become hot during use; wait for the battery to cool before charging. Failure to observe these precautions could damage the battery, impair its performance or prevent it from charging normally.
- On cold days, the capacity of batteries tends to decrease. Be sure that the battery is fully charged before heading outside to take pictures in cold weather. Keep spare batteries in a warm place and exchange as necessary. Once warmed, a cold battery may recover some of its charge.
- Dirt on the battery terminals can prevent the camera from functioning.
- When the battery is not in use, remove it from the camera or battery charger and replace the terminal cover. The camera and battery charger draw minute amounts of current even when off; if left in place, the battery could be drained to the point that it no longer functions. Turning the camera on or off while the battery is exhausted can result in reduced battery life. If the battery will not be used for an extended period, store it in a cool (15 to 25 °C / 59 to 77 °F), dry place. Recharge it at least once a year and run it flat before returning it to storage.
- Replace the battery when it no longer holds a charge. Used batteries are a valuable resource. Please recycle used batteries in accordance with local regulations.

Cleaning

Lens	Avoid touching glass parts with your fingers. Remove dust or lint with a blower (typically a small device with a rubber bulb attached to one end that is pumped to produce a stream of air out the other end). To remove fingerprints or other stains that cannot be removed with a blower, wipe the lens with a soft cloth, using a spiral motion that starts at the center of the lens and working toward the edges. If this fails, clean the lens using a cloth lightly dampened with commercial lens cleaner.
Monitor	Remove dust or lint with a blower. To remove fingerprints and other stains, clean the monitor with a soft, dry cloth, being careful not to apply pressure.
Body	Use a blower to remove dust, dirt or sand then wipe gently with a soft, dry cloth. After using the camera at the beach or seaside, wipe off any sand or salt with a dry cloth lightly dampened with fresh water, then dry thoroughly. Note that foreign matter inside the camera could cause damage not covered by the warranty.

Do not use alcohol, thinner, or other volatile chemicals.

Storage

Turn the camera off when not in use. Check that the power-on lamp is off before putting the camera away. Remove the battery if the camera will not be used for an extended period. Do not store the camera with naphtha or camphor moth balls, or in any of the following locations:

- Next to equipment that produces strong electromagnetic fields, such as televisions or radios
- Exposed to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 50°C (122°F)
- Poorly ventilated or subject to humidities of over 60 %

To prevent mold or mildew, take the camera out of storage at least once a month. Turn the camera on and release the shutter a few times before putting the camera away again.















Notes on the Monitor

- The monitor may contain a few pixels that are always lit or that do not light. This is a characteristic common to all TFT LCD displays, and does not indicate a malfunction. Images recorded using the product will not be affected.
- When framing bright subjects, vertical comet-like streaks that whiten toward either end may appear in the display. This phenomenon, known as “smear,” does not appear in the final photograph and does not indicate a malfunction. Some smear may appear in movies.
- Images in the monitor may be difficult to see under bright lighting.
- The monitor is lit by an LED backlight. Should the monitor begin to dim or flicker, contact your Nikon-authorized service representative.





Electronically Controlled Cameras

In extremely rare instances, unusual characters may appear in the monitor and the camera may stop functioning. In most cases, this phenomenon is caused by a strong external static charge. Turn the camera off, remove and replace the battery, and then turn the camera on again. In the event of continued malfunction, contact your retailer or Nikon representative. Note that disconnecting the power source as described above may result in the loss of any data not recorded to internal memory or the memory card at the time the problem occurred. Data already recorded will not be affected.
