The upcoming General Election will be held on Tuesday, November 3, 2020. The Utah County Clerk's office will be conducting the general election using Vote by Mail (VBM). As long as your voter registration is up to date,

you'll be mailed a ballot for the general election during the week of October 12th. Visit <u>vote.utah.gov</u> to register or to check your voter information. The post office won't forward ballots, so make sure your mailing address is current. A drive-up ballot Drop-Box is available at the Lindon City Center to drop your ballot off if you don't want to mail it (located at the lower level parking lot next to the US Mailbox and Utility Payment box).

What voters need to know: (from the county elections office)

- Ballots will be mailed the week of October 12, we anticipate ballots being delivered in mailboxes as soon as Tuesday, October 13. If a voter does not have a ballot by October 16, they should contact our office at 801-851-8128.
- Information relating to dropbox locations, ballot pick-up locations, early voting, who/what is on the ballot, etc. can all be found on the county website at UtahCounty.Vote
- Our office is encouraging voters to return their voted ballot at any of the secured drop boxes located throughout the county. <u>Dropbox locations can be</u> found here.
- The deadline to postmark your ballot is November 2, the day **before** Election Day. If a voter returns their ballot at a post office, they need to confirm that their ballot will be postmarked before Election Day.
- Early Voting is available on October 28 30, and November 2, at the Elections Office. <u>Information</u> about Early Voting can be found here.
- Ballot pick-up locations will be available on Election Day. Locations will be open from 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM on Election Day and Utah laws permitting sameday registration via provisional ballots will be in effect on Election Day. Locations can be found here.
- Our office provides voters with disabilities accessible options to cast their ballot. A voter with a disability can contact our office at <u>Elections@UtahCounty.Gov</u> or call our office at 801-851-8128 for more information.

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Judicial Retention

The Judicial Performance Evaluation Commission (JPEC) is an independent government commission that evaluates the performance of judges for voters. Across Utah, 59 judges will be on the ballot in November. JPEC has a media packet (attached) to help cities and towns to educate voters about the judges on their ballots. Emergency Drill

2020 marked 12 years of practicing our citywide Block Captain system.

The Lindon City Drill is designed to engage every Lindon City resident simultaneously one night a year in preparedness and communications training. This year marked a significant departure from past methodology by purposely doing all communications without meeting in



person, primarily by text. We saw a lot of success and also found some gaps and areas to improve. Pinpointing these gaps before a disaster is one of several important purposes of the drill. To improve we must practice, assess our strengths and weaknesses, plan ahead based on the assessment, retrain, and then practice again... and again... and again! Your investment in this process is so valuable and makes Lindon City a great place to live.

For a first-time test of concept, Lindon City had excellent participation and excellent results. Residents as well as Captains at all levels are to be commended for their cooperation, support, willingness to pivot, and training efforts as well as for taking part in high numbers.

- We reached 3,811 cell phones and tested our Everbridge Notification System.
- Roughly two-thirds of Lindon households report having a 72-hour emergency kit.

WAY TO GO, LINDON!

Please consider your role in these areas of personal and family preparedness—

- We continue to encourage 100% of Lindon City households to 1. maintain a 72-hour emergency kit, 2. learn about local hazards, and 3. make a written emergency plan specific to you and your life. These personal efforts allow you to prepare for the unexpected, have personal resources and contacts ready to go, know what to do and why, and maintain your independence to the degree possible in an emergency.

- Please register for the Everbridge Notification System. This remains the city's first and primary method of emergency notification.

SECONDARY WATER SYSTEM TO SHUT DOWN FOR THE WINTER



The pressurized irrigation system will be shut off on or around the first couple weeks of October. Please plan your watering schedules accordingly. When the system is shut down please be

sure to:

- Turn off your sprinkler system
- Open any manual drains and
- Close the main valve in your PI box.

This will prevent unintended flooding in the spring, and may help avoid frozen and broken pipes this winter. In order to close your main valve, open the green PI box located somewhere in the yard, typically near the sidewalk or street. When you open the lid be sure to look for spiders that like to hide in these types of spaces! To close the valve, turn the valve handle or key so it is perpendicular to the pipe. Then replace the lid making sure it is securely in place. Every season there are a handful of residents who forget to do these very important steps and suffer unnecessary flooding in the spring. Please don't be the one affected next spring and take the time now to completely turn off your sprinkling system. Thanks in advance for your cooperation!





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State law requires cities to notify homeowners about the public vs. private ownership of water and sewer lines. Any necessary repairs to the water line that runs between the home and the water meter are the responsibility of the homeowner and any necessary repairs to the sewer main are the responsibility of the homeowner, as show above. These responsibilities may be different for homeowners in an HOA or on private roads.

FALL CITY-WIDE CLEAN UP!
