BUSINESS SPOTLIGHT

THE WILD, WILD WEST

Tucked off Highway 1804, about 21 miles southwest of Williston, ND, history buffs and casual weekend visitors alike can step back in time with a visit to Fort Buford. The fort is operated by the State Historical Society of North Dakota (SHSND). Built in 1866 near the confluence of the Missouri and Yellowstone rivers, it was acquired by the state agency in 1924 in order to preserve a vital part of area history. It was named after the late Major General John Buford, hero of Gettysburg.

The army stationed at the fort protected frontier settlers, railroad survey crews and trade routes from outlaws and hostile Sioux for over 30 years. Its tale encompasses events at the heart of Wild West history, including the Sioux Wars of 1876-1879, the defeat of Custer at the Battle of Little Bighorn in modernday southern Montana, the great Sioux chief Sitting Bull's return from Canada, and the construction of the Great Northern Railroad. In 1895, Fort Buford was in need of extensive repairs. With its useful life at an end, the site was abandoned.

Today, visitors can see three original buildings: the stone powder magazine, the officer of the guard building, and the officers' quarters, which houses an interpretive exhibit of the fort's story. Another point of interest is the cemetery, just southwest of the fort. All buried military personnel were moved to Little Bighorn Battlefield National Monument in Montana, however, civilian graves were left undisturbed and likely still contain the remains of

early settlers. Wooden grave markers were recreated and placed over the graves where soldiers were once buried.

Despite being located more than 20 miles from Williston, the historic site boasts modern communication facilities, including high-speed Internet. "Nemont provides us with the communication services we need for visitors and employees," commented SHSND Administrative Officer Ron Warner. "We are always looking for ways to save North Dakota taxpayers money. Nemont helped us choose the right services."

The Fort Buford area offers a scenic and historic destination for families to picnic and camp. Complementing the fort, the Missouri-Yellowstone Confluence Interpretive Center is within easy walking distance. More than 200 items are housed in a



Section 4.4 of Nemont Telephone Cooperative's Bylaws: Qualifications To Be Nominated, Elected, And Remain A Director:

Any member is eligible to be nominated, elected and remain a director of the Cooperative if said member:

- is a bona fide resident within the district of the Cooperative for which said member is nominated or elected, and purchases communications service from the Cooperative in that same district; or
- is an officer or participant of a member that is not a natural person, if
 - -such office or participant of a member is a bona fide resident within the district for which such person is or may become a direct; and
 - -such entity member actually purchases communications service from the Cooperative in that same district;
 - -has not been an employee of the Cooperative or any of its subsidiaries within five years prior to the date of the election or appointment as director; and, -is not in any material way financially interested in a competing enterprise or a business engaged in selling communication services, communication supplies or maintaining communication facilities. The Board may, by policy or in particular circumstances, determine which interests in a competing enterprise are material.



CATERING BIDS SOUGHT FOR ANNUAL MEETING

Nemont Telephone Cooperative's Annual Membership Meeting will be held Saturday, October 3, 2009 at the Culbertson High School. Licensed catering bids are being sought for the event. Bids are requested for 500 adults' meals and 50 children's box meals. The catering bid should include a beef dinner for the adults, a box meal for children and the serving of a Nemont-supplied continental breakfast.

Bid specifications include:

- Serving of the beef dinner will start at approximately noon, with the adjournment of the Annual Meeting.
- The adults' dinner menu shall consist of roast beef; real mashed potatoes; gravy; a vegetable, coleslaw or other salad; buns and dessert.
- The children's menu shall consist of a box meal to include a meat main dish (ex. hotdog, hamburger, corndog or sandwich), cookie and cut vegetable or fruit side.
- Licensed caterer will be responsible for preparing meals and clean up of kitchen and serving area.
- Licensed caterer will provide chafing pans, sterno, serving containers and serving utensils for four serving lines.
- Licensed caterer will provide food carts to move food from preparation area to gymnasium area for serving.

Nemont will provide:

- Beverages for the adults' and children's meals.
- Table coverings, plates, cups, napkins, meal utensils and box container for children's meal.
- Continental breakfast food, butter, sweeteners, cinnamon, salt and pepper.
- Set up of tables and chairs.
- Staff for four serving lines.

Culbertson High School may allow the preparation of meals in the school kitchen. For information on availability, equipment and usage, please call the Culbertson High School at 787-6241.

A 10% penalty, plus any expenses incurred, will be assessed against the caterer for failure to meet contractual specifications. Breakfast will begin at 8 a.m. and conclude at approximately 9:30 a.m. Written, sealed bids will be accepted until 5:00 p.m. on Friday, August 7, 2009. A copy of the caterer's license is required with the written bid. Nemont reserves the right to refuse any or all bids. Bids should be delivered or mailed to Nemont Telephone Cooperative, P.O. SEE YOU AT CROW FAIR

Visitors descend annually on Crow Agency from all over the United States, Canada, and from around the world to attend one of the largest gatherings of the year for the Apsáalooke Nation. Crow Fair is an annual celebration; this year's event is scheduled for August 13-17, 2009. With thousands of attendees setting up as many as 1500 teepees, Crow Fair is considered the largest modern day American Indian encampment in the United States, and has been coined the "Teepee Capital of the World."

Nemont is pleased to be a sponsor of Crow Fair. Among the many heritage activities scheduled for this year's celebration are the evening pow-wow grand entries, showcasing different dance styles; daily parades in the mornings displaying each family's best traditional beadwork, buckskin and leather; and an INFR sanctioned all-Indian rodeo and relay horse races. The traditional Dance-Through-Camp, a prayer based on the spiritual beliefs of the Apsáalooke people for good things in the future, wraps up the event.

THE SCOOP ON **SPOOFING**

O. What is a spoof card? How do spoof cards work?

A. Spoof cards allow the user (the caller) to change how their information shows on your caller ID display. So when Joe Smith calls your home using a spoof card, your caller ID display will instead read Mary Dean, or whatever name (and number) Joe chooses to replace his correct information with. Sound dishonest? A number of websites offer spoof card services: interested parties can even opt to be spoof card wholesale agents. Many spoof card services also allow the user to disguise their voice and offer recording services.

Providers of spoof card services are careful to disclose that the capabilities of their products are legal in the United States but the way they are used may be illegal. Some states have passed laws making it illegal "to mislead, defraud or deceive the recipient of a telephone call." In other states, it is illegal to record a telephone call without informing the other party.

With a surge in Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) use worldwide, false caller ID information can

be transmitted to any phone in the world. Since the Internet is international, VoIP calls can be generated in a different country from the receiver. This means it can be very difficult to have a legal framework when victims are targeted by international fraud using spoofing. There are several ways to spot a spoofer and protect yourself.

- Keep in mind that your bank already knows your personal information and would not be asking for it. Be wary of callers who ask for "confirmation" of personal information, such as social security numbers and credit card security codes.
- Ask the caller if you may phone them back with the information they requested, then call the institution directly to confirm. Do not use the number the caller gave you. Look it up in the phone book or off your billing statement.
- If you gave sensitive information to someone over the phone, contact the real company directly right away to alert them that you may have been scammed.
- Run your credit report periodically and review your bank and credit card statements monthly to be aware of any suspicious activity.

Voice over Internet Protocol, or VoIP, is a general term describing delivery of voice communications over IP networks such as the Internet.
