Introduction

The DWA-182 Wireless AC1200 Dual Band USB Adapter is a convenient wireless connectivity solution for desktop or notebook PCs. Instead of stringing Ethernet cables to your PC or dismantling your desktop computer case, the DWA-182 can enable 802.11n wireless connectivity by simply utilizing your desktop or notebook PC's USB port.

Powered by Wireless AC1200 Dual Band technology, the DWA-182 provides a faster wireless connection and superior reception than 802.11n*. The DWA-182 is designed for use in bigger homes and for those that demand higher networking, and its 5GHz Mediband helps avoid interference by providing a clearer wireless band for signals than existing 802.11n, 802.11g and 802.11a products. Maximize wireless performance by connecting this USB Adapter to a Wireless AC Dual Band Media router and stay connected from virtually anywhere in the home. This USB Adapter supports WPA™ and WPA2™ encryption to prevent outside intrusion and protect your personal information from being exposed.

Hardware Overview



1	LED	This LED will blink slowly when installed properly. If this light is off, the drivers are not installed. During the WPS process, this light will blink fast.
2	USB Connector	Used to connect the DWA-182 to your computer.
3	WPS Button	Press the WPS (Wi-Fi Protected Setup) button to automatically connect to a WPS-enabled wireless router or access point and establish connectivity. Refer to page 19.

Installation

This section will walk you through the installation process. If you have a built-in wireless adapter, please disable it in device manager before installing your D-Link adapter. Also, if you have previously installed another wireless adapter, please make sure any software is uninstalled.

Getting Started

Before installing your new D-Link wireless adapter, please verify the following:

- Remove any previous installations of wireless adapters.
- Disable any built-in wireless and Ethernet adapters.
- Verify the settings such as the SSID and security settings of the network(s) you want to connect to.

Remove Existing Installations

If you've installed a different manufacturer's adapter or a different model D-Link adapter, make sure the software is uninstalled before installing the new software. Some utilities may cause a conflict with the new software. If you plan to use multiple adapters at different times, make sure the utilities are not set to load when your computer boots up. Windows® users may use the built-in wireless utility for all adapters.

To remove any old software:

Windows® 8 users: Press **Windows Key + Q** > **Control Panel** > **Uninstall Programs**.

Windows® 7 users: Click **Start** > **Control Panel** > **Uninstall Programs**.

Windows Vista® users: Click **Start** > **Control Panel** > **Add or Remove Programs**.

Windows® XP users: Click **Start** > **Control Panel** > **Add or Remove Programs**.

Disable Other Adapters

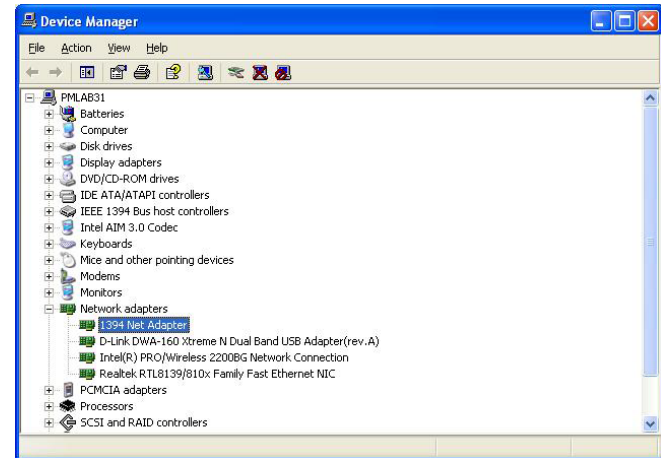
Most newer laptops may include a built-in wireless adapter. To prevent any conflicts with the D-Link wireless adapter, it is recommended to disable the wireless adapter (as well as any unused Ethernet adapters).

Windows® XP - Go to **Start > My Computer > Properties > Hardware > Device Manager**.

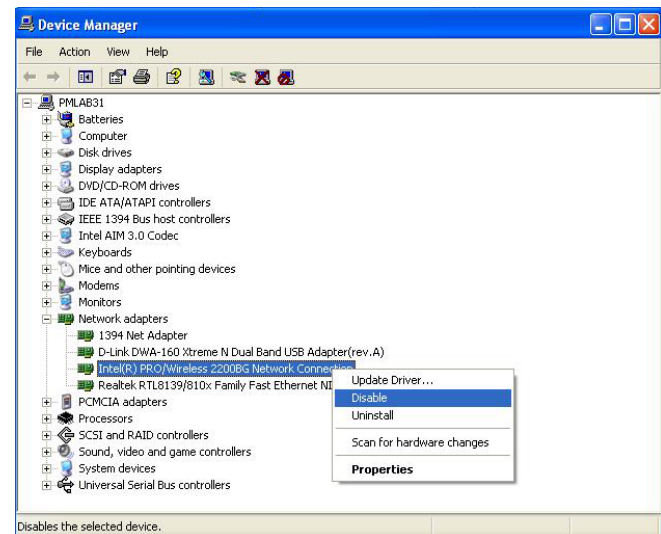
Windows® 7/Vista® - Go to **Start > Device Manager**.

Windows® 8 - Press the **Windows key** and **X** together and then click **Device Manager**.

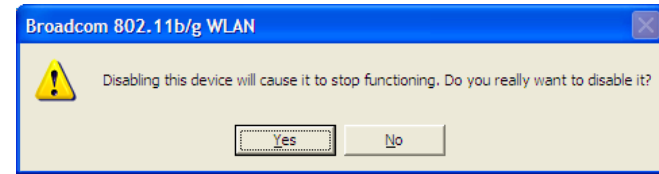
Click the **Hardware** tab and then click **Device Manager**. Scroll down the list and click the + sign to the left of **Network Adapters**.



Right-click the adapter you would like to disable and select **Disable**.

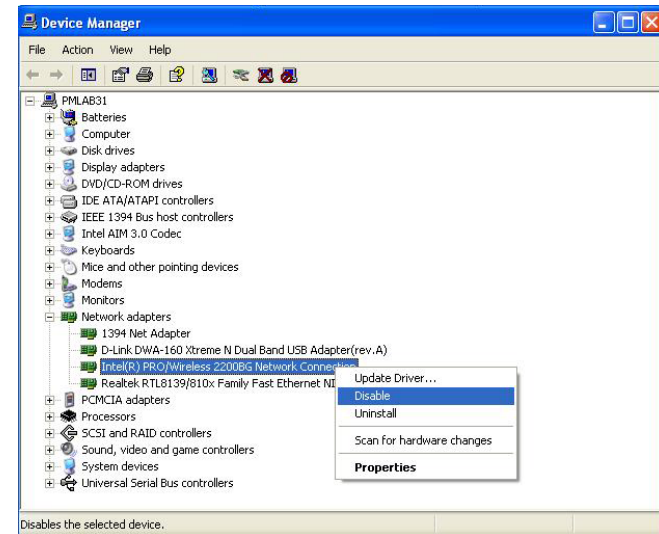


Click **Yes** to disable the adapter.



When the adapter is disabled, a down arrow or a grayed icon will be displayed.

Disabling the adapter will not remove the drivers. If you would like to use the adapter, simply right-click it and select **Enable**.



Wireless Installation Considerations

The D-Link wireless adapter lets you access your network using a wireless connection from virtually anywhere within the operating range of your wireless network. Keep in mind, however, that the number, thickness and location of walls, ceilings, or other objects that the wireless signals must pass through, may limit the range. Typical ranges vary depending on the types of materials and background RF (radio frequency) noise in your home or business. The key to maximizing wireless range is to follow these basic guidelines:

1. Keep the number of walls and ceilings between the D-Link adapter and other network devices to a minimum - each wall or ceiling can reduce your adapter's range from 3-90 feet (1-30 meters.) Position your devices so that the number of walls or ceilings is minimized.
2. Be aware of the direct line between network devices. A wall that is 1.5 feet thick (.5 meters), at a 45-degree angle appears to be almost 3 feet (1 meter) thick. At a 2-degree angle it looks over 42 feet (14 meters) thick! Position devices so that the signal will travel straight through a wall or ceiling (instead of at an angle) for better reception.
3. Building materials make a difference. A solid metal door or aluminum studs may have a negative effect on range. Try to position access points, wireless routers, and computers so that the signal passes through drywall or open doorways. Materials and objects such as glass, steel, metal, walls with insulation, water (fish tanks), mirrors, file cabinets, brick, and concrete will degrade your wireless signal.
4. Keep your product away (at least 3-6 feet or 1-2 meters) from electrical devices or appliances that generate RF noise.
5. If you are using 2.4GHz cordless phones or X-10 (wireless products such as ceiling fans, lights, and home security systems), your wireless connection may degrade dramatically or drop completely. Make sure your 2.4GHz phone base is as far away from your wireless devices as possible. The base transmits a signal even if the phone is not in use.

Adapter Installation

Warning: Do NOT connect the DWA-182 adapter to your computer before installing the driver software from the D-Link CD.

Turn on the computer and insert the D-Link DWA-182 Driver CD in the CD-ROM drive.

If the CD Autorun function does not automatically start on your computer, go to **Start > Run**. In the run box type "**D:\autorun.exe**" (where **D:** represents the drive letter of your CD-ROM drive).

When the autorun screen appears, click **Install**.



Step 1

When the Welcome screen appears, click **Next** to continue.



Step 2

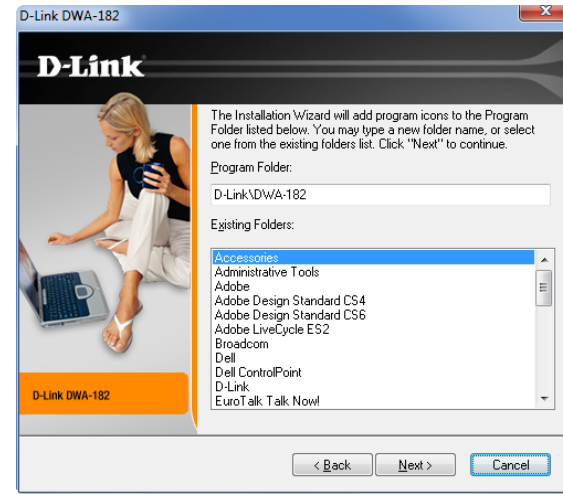
Select the installation folder and click **Next** to continue.

If you do not want to use the default location, click the **Browse** button and select a location.



Step 3

Select the location to add a program icon to a program folder and click **Next** to continue.



Step 4

Connect the DWA-182 adapter to an available USB slot on your computer. If the *Found New Hardware Wizard* appears, click **Cancel**.

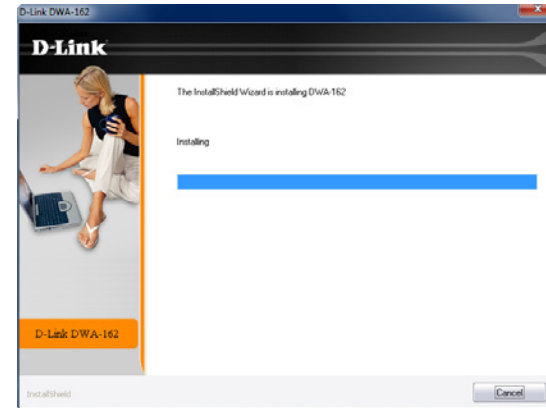
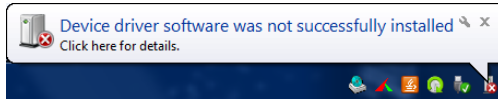
Click **Next** to continue.



Step 5

The DWA-182 drivers will now be installed. This may take up to one minute.

If you get a bubble alert stating that the adapter has not been installed, ignore it and click the **x** in the upper-right corner to close the alert.



Step 6

There are two ways to connect to a wireless network:

- A. Manual** - You can manually enter the Wi-Fi Network name (SSID) and password or select from a list of available wireless networks (Site Survey).
- B. WPS (Wi-Fi Protected Setup)** - If you have a WPS-enabled router or access point, use this method to connect. Skip to page 17.

Note: If you do not want to connect to a network at this time, click **Exit**. Your adapter and the D-Link software are installed.

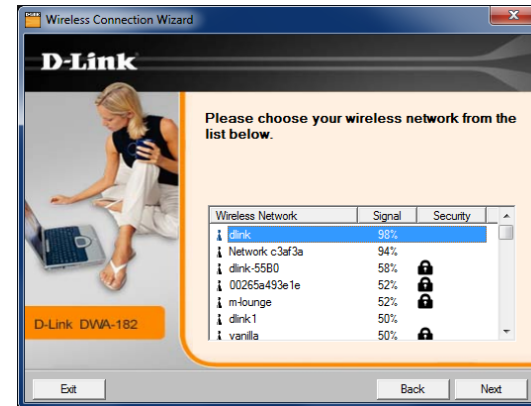

if you know the Wi-Fi Network name (SSID) of the network you want to connect to, enter the name and click **Next** to continue. If not, click the **Scan** button.

Once you click **Scan**, a list of available wireless networks will be displayed. Select a network to connect to and click **Next**.

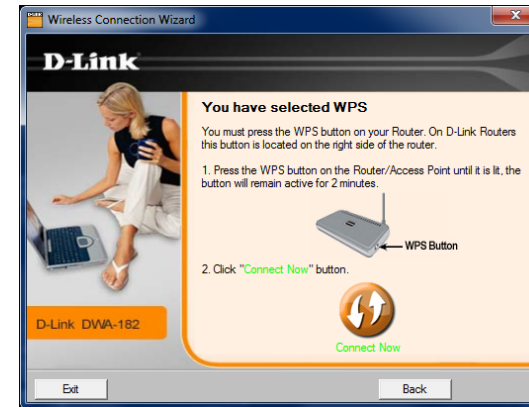
If the network you are connecting to is secure, enter the Wi-Fi Password (encryption key) and click **Next**. Skip to page 18.



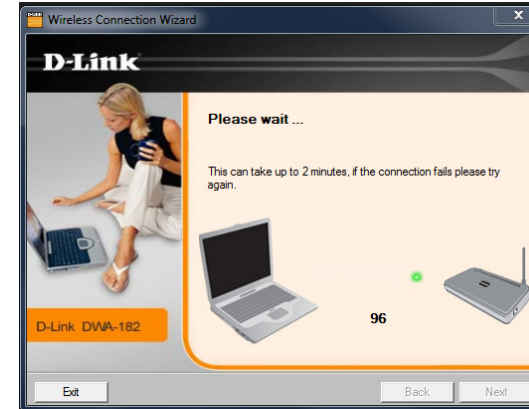
B. WPS

Press the WPS button on your router. If you do not know how to start the WPS process on your router, please refer to its manual for more information.

Within two minutes press the **Connect Now** button on the screen to start the WPS process on the adapter.



Please allow up to two minutes for the WPS process to finish.

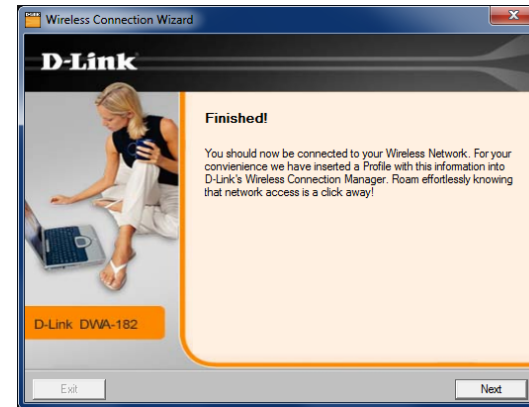


You are now successfully connected to your wireless network. Click **Finish**.



Step 7

The Wireless Connection Wizard is now completed. Click **Finish** to continue.



Step 8

The adapter installation is completed. Click **Finish**.



Connect to a Wireless Network

Wi-Fi Protected Setup (WPS)

Wi-Fi Protected Setup™ (WPS) System is designed for easy setup of security-enabled Wi-Fi networks. It is recommended to have the access point or wireless router nearby during setup.


“Push Button Configuration” (PBC) is a physical button on the DWA-182 and most wireless devices such as routers. A connection can be established by pressing the WPS button on the DWA-182 and then pushing the button on your access point or wireless router within 120 seconds.

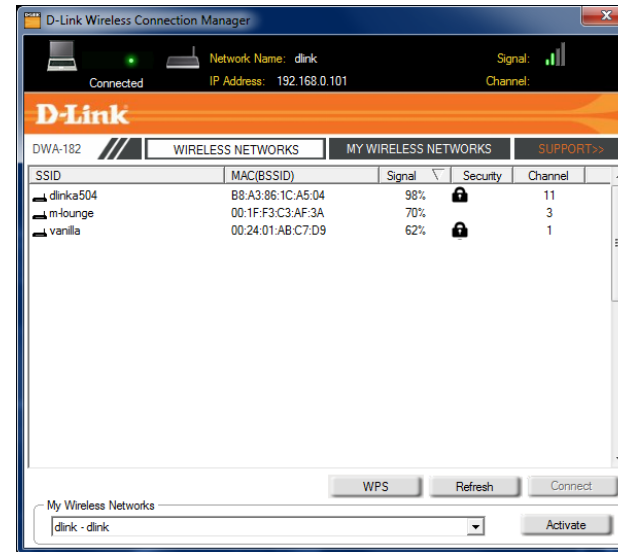
1. Press the WPS button located on your wireless router or access point. Please refer to the user manual of your router or access point if you do not know how to start the WPS process.
2. To connect to your network, press the WPS button on the adapter and hold for two seconds. Allow up to two minutes for the devices to connect.



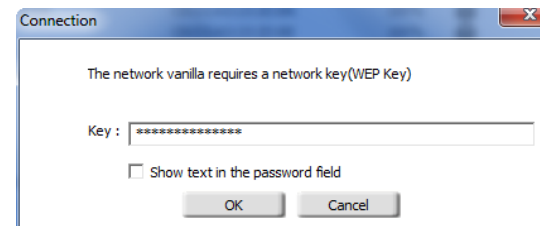
Wireless Connection Manager

To connect to a wireless network using the D-Link Wireless Connection Manager, follow the steps below:

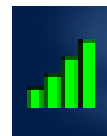
1. Launch the manager by either clicking on the  icon in the system tray or double-click the Wireless Connection Manager icon on your desktop.
2. When the utility opens, a list of wireless networks in your area will be displayed. Select the network you want to connect to and click **Connect**.



3. If the network you are connecting to is secure, enter the password/passphrase and then click **OK**.



4. Allow about a minute to connect. Once you are connected the Wireless Connection Manager icon in your system tray will turn green.

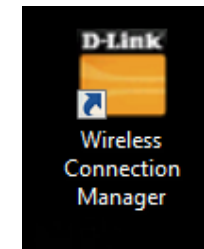


D-Link Wireless Connection Manager

This section will show you how to configure your new D-Link wireless adapter using the D-Link Wireless Connection Manager.

The DWA-182 uses the Wireless Connection Manager as the management software. The manager provides the user an easy interface to connect to any wireless network, create profiles for commonly-used wireless networks, and change any settings related to the wireless adapter.

To launch the Wireless Connection Manager, either click the wireless icon in your system tray (red or green bars) or double-click on the *Wireless Connection Manager* icon on your desktop.



Wireless Networks

The Wireless Networks (Site Survey) page will display all wireless networks that are available in your area. To connect to a network, simply highlight the wireless network (SSID) and click **Connect**.

SSID: The SSID (Service Set Identifier) is the name of the wireless network.

MAC: Displays the MAC address of the wireless device.

Signal: Displays the link quality of the wireless connection.

Security: If there is a “lock” icon, this means the wireless network is secure (encrypted). You must know the encryption key/password settings to connect.

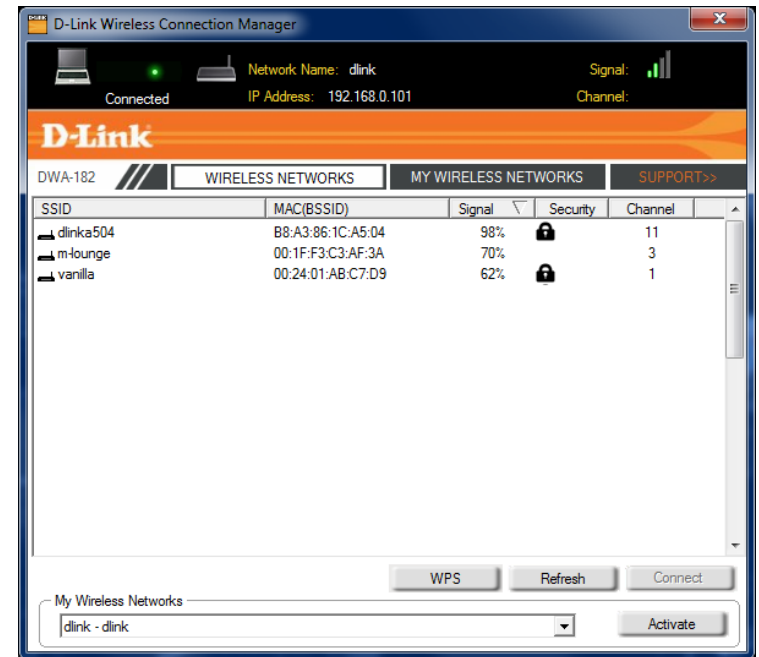
Channel: Displays the channel of the wireless network. Your adapter will automatically change to the channel of the network you connect to.

WPS: Press to connect to a wireless network using Wi-Fi Protected Setup (WPS). You can use either the push-button method or PIN method, where you enter a PIN code on your wireless router or access point and the adapter.

Refresh: Click to rescan for available wireless networks in your area.

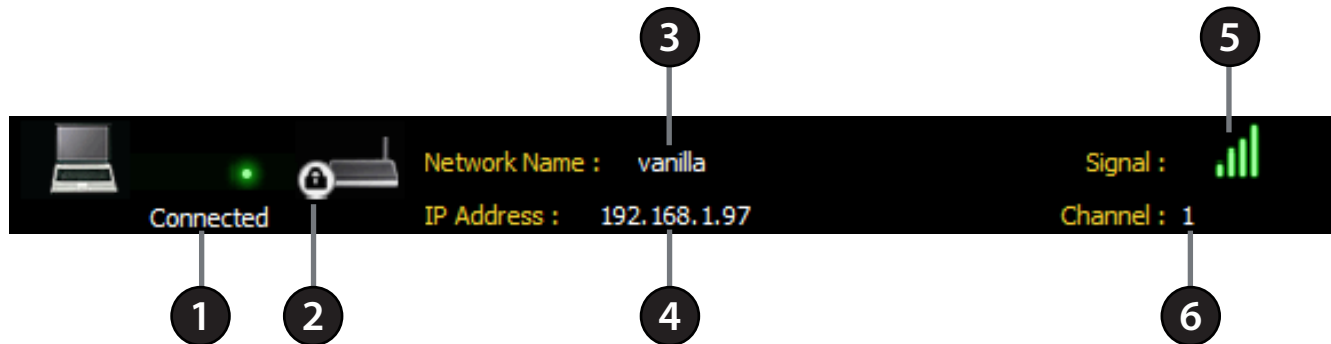
Connect: Highlight a wireless network and click the **Connect** button. If the network is secure, a pop-up window will appear. Enter the security information to connect

Activate: Select a wireless network profile from the drop-down menu and click **Activate** to connect. Allow up to 30 seconds to connect.



Status Bar

The status bar at the top of the window will display information about the network you are connected to.



1	Status	Displays if you are connected or disconnected to a wireless network.
2	Security	If there is a lock icon, this indicates that the wireless network has encryption enabled and is secure. If there isn't a lock icon, this means the wireless network is open and not secure.
3	Network Name	Displays the name (SSID) of the wireless network you are connected to.
4	IP Address	Displays the IP address of your wireless adapter.
5	Signal	Displays the signal strength of your wireless network. Four green bars indicates the best signal strength/quality.
6	Channel	Displays the current channel of your wireless network. This setting can only be changed on your wireless router or access point.

My Wireless Networks

The My Wireless Networks page will allow you to create, edit, and delete wireless network profiles. Every time you connect to a network using the *Wireless Networks* page, a profile will automatically be created.

My Wireless Networks: Displays a list of saved wireless networks. To connect to a saved network, simply select the network in the list and click **Activate** on the right side.

New Button: To create a new wireless network profile (refer to page 25).

Modify: To edit a current profile (refer to page 25).

Delete: To remove a profile, select a network from the *My Wireless Networks* list and click **Delete**.

Activate: Select a network from the *My Wireless Networks* list and click **Activate** to connect. Allow up to 30 seconds to connect.

Profile Details: The *Profile Details* section will display information about the wireless network such as the network name (SSID), network type (Infrastructure or Ad-Hoc), and if the network is secured/encrypted.



Add/Modify Profile

You may add a new network by clicking the **New** button or edit a current profile by clicking the **Modify** button from the *My Wireless Networks* page.

Profile Name: Enter a name for your profile (e.g. Home, Office, Coffee Shop).

SSID: Enter the wireless name (SSID) of the network.

Network Type: Select the network type. If you are connecting to a wireless router or access point, select **Infrastructure**. Select **Ad hoc** if you are connecting to another wireless device that is in Ad hoc mode.

Security Type: Select the type of security used on the wireless network: **None**, **WEP**, **WPA-Personal**, **WPA2-Personal**, **WPA-Enterprise**, or **WPA2-Enterprise**. Refer to the next page for more information.

OK: Click **OK** to save your settings.

If your wireless network is using WPA-Personal or WPA2-Personal (also known as WPA-PSK or WPA2-PSK), you will need to know if TKIP or AES is being used and the passphrase (also known as Wi-Fi Password or Key).

Set Security Option: Select either **WPA-Personal** or **WPA2-Personal**.

Passphrase Settings: Select if your wireless network is using **TKIP** or **AES**.

Key: Enter the wireless network passphrase.

Show text in the password field: Check to display the passphrase. Uncheck to hide the passphrase.

OK: Click **OK** to save your profile settings.

WPA/WPA2 - Enterprise

WPA and WPA2-Enterprise are for advanced users who are familiar with using a RADIUS server and setting up certificates.

Set Security Option: Select either **WPA-Enterprise** or **WPA2-Enterprise**.

Passphrase Settings: Select if your wireless network is using **TKIP** or **AES**.

Advanced Config: Click to enter your RADIUS server information.

EAP Type: Next to *EAP Type*, select **EAP-TLS**.

User Certificate: Select a user certificate from the drop-down menu.

User Information: Enter the login information required to authenticate.

Add/Remove: Click **Add** to enter the IP Address(es) of your RADIUS Server(s). Select an address and click **Remove** to delete it from the list.

OK: Click **OK** to save your profile settings.

Troubleshooting

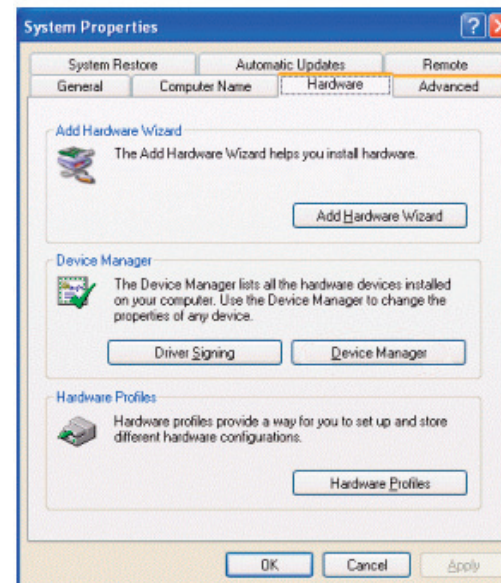
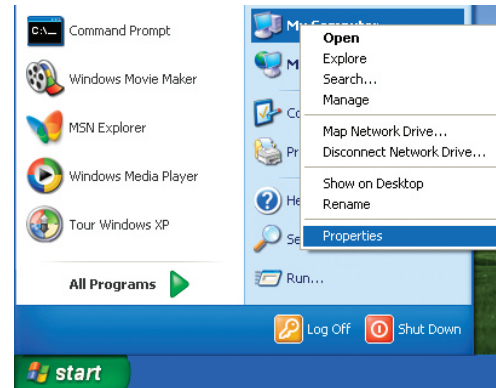
This chapter provides solutions to problems that can occur during the installation and operation of the DWA-182. Read the following descriptions if you are having problems.

1. How do I know if my adapter is installed properly?

Windows® XP - Go to **Start > My Computer > Properties > Hardware > Device Manager**.

Windows® 7/Vista® - Go to **Start > Device Manager**.

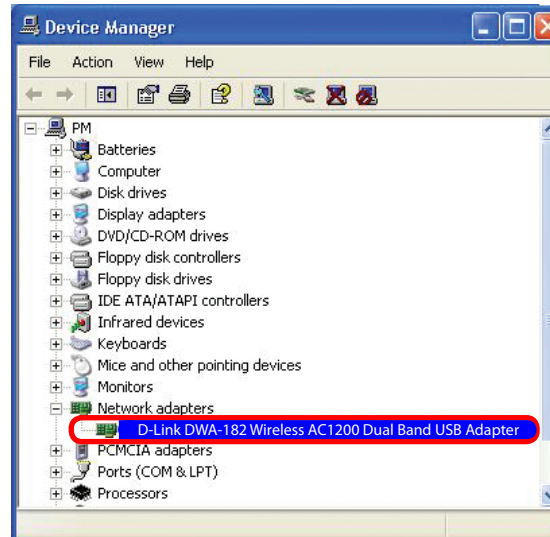
Windows® 8 - Press the **Windows key** and **X** together and then click **Device Manager**.



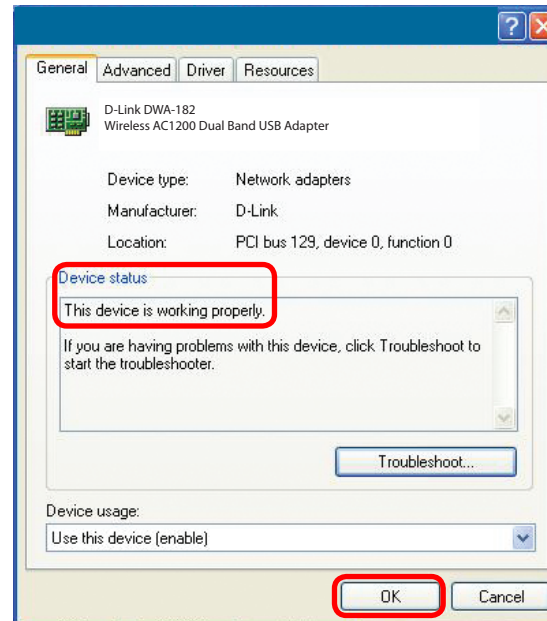
Click the + sign next to **Network Adapters**.

Right-click on **D-Link DWA-182 Wireless AC1200 Dual Band USB Adapter**.

Select **Properties** to check that the drivers are installed properly.



Look under *Device Status* to check that the device is working properly. Click **OK** to continue.



2. The computer does not recognize the DWA-182 Wireless Adapter.

Make sure that the DWA-182 Wireless Adapter is properly seated in the computer's USB port.

If Windows® does not detect the hardware upon insertion of the adapter, make sure to completely remove drivers that were previously loaded.

3. The computer with the DWA-182 installed is unable to connect to the wireless network and/or the Internet.

- Check that the LED indicators for the broadband modem are indicating normal activity. If not, there may be a problem with the broadband connection.
- Check that the LED indicators on the wireless router are functioning properly. If not, check that the AC power and Ethernet cables are firmly connected.
- Check that the IP Address, subnet mask, gateway, and DNS settings are correctly entered for the network
- In **Infrastructure** mode, make sure the same **Service Set Identifier (SSID)** is specified on the settings for the wireless clients and access points. By default, the SSID factory setting for D-Link products is blank. (Double-click on the WLAN icon in the taskbar. The *Link Info* screen will display the SSID setting.)

Wireless Basics

D-Link wireless products are based on industry standards to provide easy-to-use and compatible high-speed wireless connectivity within your home, business or public access wireless networks. Strictly adhering to the IEEE standard, the D-Link wireless family of products will allow you to securely access the data you want, when and where you want it. You will be able to enjoy the freedom that wireless networking delivers.

A wireless local area network (WLAN) is a cellular computer network that transmits and receives data with radio signals instead of wires. Wireless LANs are used increasingly in both home and office environments, and public areas such as airports, coffee shops and universities. Innovative ways to utilize WLAN technology are helping people to work and communicate more efficiently. Increased mobility and the absence of cabling and other fixed infrastructure have proven to be beneficial for many users.

Wireless users can use the same applications they use on a wired network. Wireless adapter cards used on laptop and desktop systems support the same protocols as Ethernet adapter cards.

Under many circumstances, it may be desirable for mobile network devices to link to a conventional Ethernet LAN in order to use servers, printers or an Internet connection supplied through the wired LAN. A Wireless Router is a device used to provide this link.

What is Wireless?

Wireless or Wi-Fi® technology is another way of connecting your computer to the network without using wires. Wi-Fi uses radio frequency to connect wirelessly, so you have the freedom to connect computers anywhere in your home or office network.

Why D-Link Wireless?

D-Link is the worldwide leader and award winning designer, developer, and manufacturer of networking products. D-Link delivers the performance you need at a price you can afford. D-Link has all the products you need to build your network.

How does wireless work?

Wireless works similar to how cordless phone work, through radio signals to transmit data from one point A to point B. But wireless technology has restrictions as to how you can access the network. You must be within the wireless network range area to be able to connect your computer. There are two different types of wireless networks Wireless Local Area Network (WLAN), and Wireless Personal Area Network (WPAN).

Wireless Local Area Network (WLAN)

In a wireless local area network, a device called an Access Point (AP) connects computers to the network. The access point has a small antenna attached to it, which allows it to transmit data back and forth over radio signals. With an indoor access point, the signal can travel up to 300 feet. With an outdoor access point the signal can reach out up to 30 miles to serve places like manufacturing plants, industrial locations, college and high school campuses, airports, golf courses, and many other outdoor venues.

Wireless Personal Area Network (WPAN)

Bluetooth® is the industry standard wireless technology used for WPAN. Bluetooth devices in WPAN operate in a range up to 30 feet away.

Compared to WLAN the speed and wireless operation range are both less than WLAN, but in return it doesn't use nearly as much power which makes it ideal for personal devices, such as mobile phones, PDAs, headphones, laptops, speakers, and other devices that operate on batteries.

Who uses wireless?

Wireless technology has become so popular in recent years that almost everyone is using it, whether it's for home, office, or business, D-Link has a wireless solution for it.

Home

- Gives everyone at home broadband access
- Surf the web, check email, instant message, and etc
- Gets rid of the cables around the house
- Simple and easy to use

Small Office and Home Office

- Stay on top of everything at home as you would at the office

Where is wireless used?

Wireless technology is expanding everywhere not just at home or the office. People like the freedom of mobility and it's becoming so popular that more and more public facilities now provide wireless access to attract people. The wireless connection in public places is usually called "hotspots".

Using a D-Link USB Adapter with your laptop, you can access the hotspot to connect to the Internet from remote locations like: Airports, Hotels, Coffee Shops, Libraries, Restaurants, and Convention Centers.

Wireless networks are easy to setup, but if you're installing it for the first time it could be quite a task not knowing where to start. That's why we've put together a few setup steps and tips to help you through the process of setting up a wireless network.

Tips

Here are a few things to keep in mind, when you install a wireless network.

Centralize your router or Access Point

Make sure you place the router/access point in a centralized location within your network for the best performance. Try to place the router/access point as high as possible in the room, so the signal gets dispersed throughout your home. If you have a two-story home, you may need a repeater to boost the signal to extend the range.

Eliminate Interference

Place home appliances such as cordless telephones, microwaves, and televisions as far away as possible from the router/access point. This can significantly reduce any interference that the appliances might cause since they operate on the same frequency.

Security

Don't let your next-door neighbors or intruders connect to your wireless network. Secure your wireless network by turning on WPA™/WPA2™ security features on the router. Refer to the product manual for detailed information on how to set it up.

Wireless Modes

There are basically two modes of networking:

- **Infrastructure** – All wireless clients will connect to an access point or wireless router.
- **Ad-Hoc** – Directly connecting to another computer, for peer-to-peer communication, using wireless network adapters on each computer.

An Infrastructure network contains an Access Point or wireless router. All the wireless devices, or clients, will connect to the wireless router or access point.

An Ad-Hoc network contains only clients, such as laptops with wireless USB Adapters. All the adapters must be in Ad-Hoc mode to communicate.


Networking Basics

Check your IP address

After you install your new D-Link wireless adapter and have established a wireless connection, by default, the TCP/IP settings should be set to obtain an IP address from a DHCP server (i.e., router) automatically. To verify your IP address, please follow the steps below.

Windows® 8 Users

- Press the **Windows key** and **R** together. Type **cmd** in the box and click **OK**.
- At the prompt, type **ipconfig** and press **Enter**.
- This will display the IP address, subnet mask, and default gateway of your adapter.



- Click on **Start > Run**. In the run box type **cmd** and click **OK**.
- At the prompt, type **ipconfig** and press **Enter**.
- This will display the IP address, subnet mask, and the default gateway of your adapter.

If the address is 0.0.0.0, check your adapter installation, security settings, and the settings on your router. Some firewall software programs may block a DHCP request on newly installed adapters.

Statically Assign an IP Address

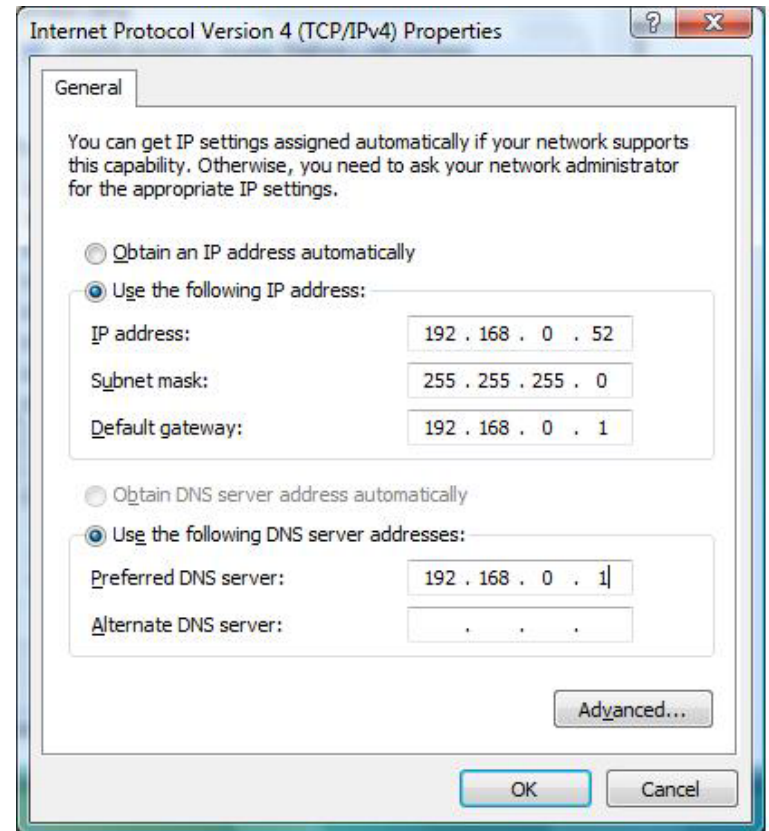
If you are not using a DHCP capable gateway/router, or you need to assign a static IP address, please follow the steps below:

Windows® 8 Users

- Press the **Windows** key and then type **IP**. Click **Settings** on the right side and then click **View Network Connections**.
- Right-click on the adapter which represents your D-Link wireless network adapter.
- Highlight **Internet Protocol Version 4 (TCP /IPv4)** and click **Properties**.

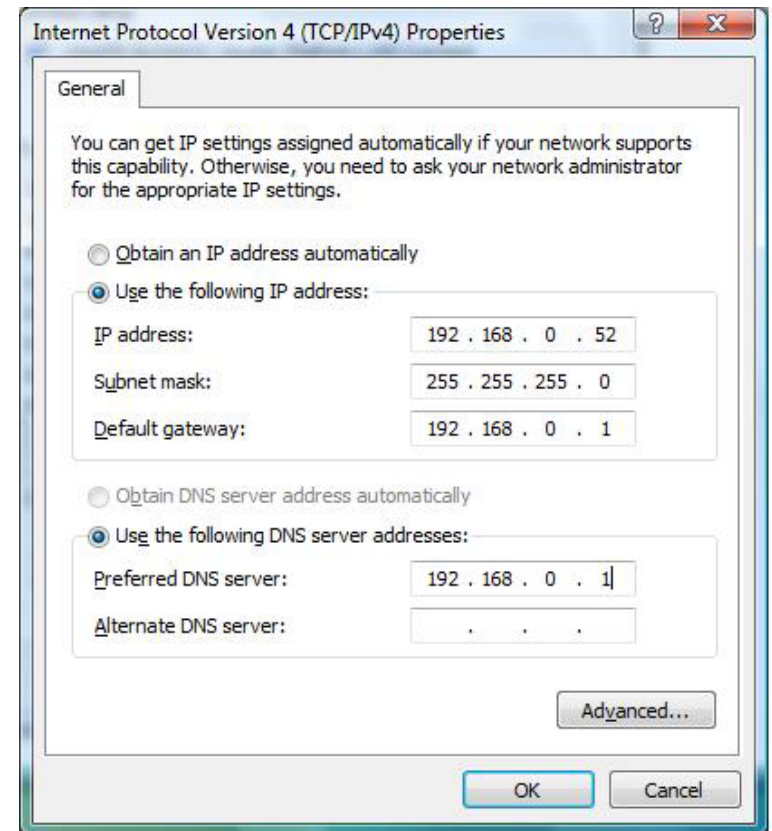

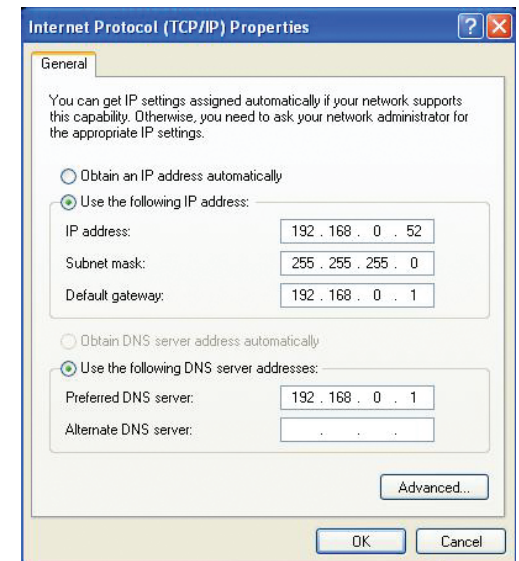
