WINTER GRILL COVERS

You may have noticed that winter grill covers, similar to the picture attached, have been appearing on the primary 911 ambulances. The purpose of these covers is to help heat up the engine, as well as to maintain higher engine operating temperature while idling on scene. The higher operating temperature is required for the heat in the patient compartment to work up to it's full efficiency.

I have heard concern that the cover will overheat the engine. However, the cover should not cause the vehicle to overheat, even while driving back from Denver in the 60+ degree temperatures that can occur during these winter months. That being said you will likely notice that the engine temperature gauge does begin to climb up to the 3rd tick mark on the gauge. This is considered normal and the vehicle IS NOT overheating. If the engine is overheating the gauge will progress towards the 4th tick mark and a "High Engine Coolant Temperature" message will display on the instrument panel. An audible chime will also be heard. If this condition occurs reduce your speed, turn the A/C off, and turn the heat on. This should help reduce the engine temperature. If the engine continues to overheat pull over immediately and let the engine idle with the heat on until the gauge returns to below the 3rd tick mark. To prevent an overheat condition from occurring it is recommended that you do not attempt to travel from Golden to Genesee at more than 65 MPH



and do not hold the accelerator to the floor.

As of today, the covers are installed on Medic 2, 4, and 10. Medic 3 will be done in the next couple weeks. Please do not remove these covers. If you have any questions or concerns please feel free to contact Logan.

Be Prepared

Remember when working outside in winter, it is important to be prepared for the weather conditions. This means wearing waterproof shoes or boots with good traction, Layering clothing, and wearing hat and gloves. You loose body heat through exposed skin so cover up as much as necessary with out compromising freedom of movement.

Relay Changes

Some of you may have noticed that we have been moving Medic 1 (or whichever ambulance the 5th crew is using on Fri and Sat) to station 2. We have been doing this to help keep as much of the ambulances indoors as we can. This makes it easier for people parking at station 1 and also helps prevent freezing.

With this come some changes. If you are working the 5th ambulance Friday and Saturday or the 2nd ambulance at station 2; you will need to grab one of the utility vehicles such as the black stallion and take that to station 2. By doing this we can help keep the parking spaces at station I open and also all the equipment inside from damage. I know this will take some time to get use to and I appreciate everyone cooperation in this change.

Thank you very much for every ones flexibility.

Reminder for scheduled transports a PCS (physician certification statement) needs to be filled out by the doctor verifying the patient can not sit, stand or walk.

If it sounds like the patient's family does not feel comfortable taking the patient by car—unfortunately Mcare will not pay for that so the family will need to pay for the transport out of pocket prior to transport.

On the Go Chicken Avocado Roll-Ups

Ingredients:

2 avocados, cubed Juice of 1 lime

1 bell peppers, seeds and cores removed, chopped

1/2 small red onion, chopped

1/2 c. Shredded Monterey Jack

1/2 c. shredded Cheddar

2 tbsp. sour cream

2 tbsp. finely chopped chives

4 large flour tortillas

Directions:

- 1. In a medium bowl, combine avocado and lime juice and mash until only small chunks of avocado remain. Add chicken, bell pepper, red onion, Monterey Jack, cheddar, sour cream and chives and stir until evenly combined.
- 2. Spread a thin layer of the chicken avocado mixture onto a large tortilla, leaving a small border around the edges. Roll the tortilla up tightly, then cut off the edges and slice into 1" rolls. Repeat with remaining ingredients

places you'll go." Dr Seuss Every month a book will be suggested. You can read paper, kindle, audible, or have your partner read to you before bed.





FLU INFORMATION

The first pediatric death in Colorado related to flu was reported on Jan. 9, 2019.

The child resided in the Denver metro area.

Influenza continues to circulate widely across Colorado and the United States, with Influenza A (H1N1) viruses predominating.

From Sept. 30, 2018, through the week ending Jan. 5, 2019, 962 influenza hospitalizations have been reported in Colorado.

At this time hospitalization rates in children younger than 5 years are the highest among all age groups. A (H1N1) virus-predominant influenza seasons are frequently associated with more illnesses in children.

There have been 11 outbreaks in long-term care and residential facilities reported statewide since Sept. 30, 2018.

Antiviral treatment is recommended for hospitalized patients; children under age 5 (and especially those under age 2); adults age 65

years and older; pregnant women and those up to two weeks postpartum; and individuals with underlying health conditions.

Antiviral chemoprophylaxis is also recommended for all eligible long-term care facility residents during a facility outbreak; regardless of whether they received influenza vaccine.



Measles in a Denver County Resident

On January 15, an adult resident of Denver County tested positive for measles after traveling internationally.

It is unclear whether or not this person was previously vaccinated. The last case of measles in Colorado was during 2017. Measles is a highly contagious viral disease that causes a distinct febrile rash illness. The incubation period for measles ranges from 7 to 21 days. Susceptible individuals exposed to this person could currently be experiencing measles symptoms and may develop symptoms up until Feb. 4, which is 21 days after the patient was infectious without airborne precautions in place.

Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) and Denver Public Health contacted people who were directly exposed to the case, but the measles virus is very contagious and unidentified exposures may exist.

Measles symptoms include a prodrome characterized by a fever (usually ≥ 101 degrees F), cough, coryza (runny nose),

and conjunctivitis, followed by a rash that usually begins on the face 2–4 days after prodrome onset and lasts at least 3 days.

The diagnosis of measles should


be considered in any person with a generalized maculopapular rash and a fever, especially if accompanied by cough, coryza or conjunctivitis (immunocompromised patients may exhibit an atypical rash or no rash), OR in a person with prodromal symptoms who re-

ports a measles exposure.


