DXing Indonesia....A Primer by Geoff Cosier



To get started in Indonesian DXing, the first thing to do is familiarise oneself with the type of programming these stations air. Listen a few times to the best signals you can find, whether it be RRI Jakarta or one of the regional stations. You'll soon see that heavy rock or heavy classical music is never played. Note also that there are regular programmed newscasts, relayed by other stations. For example, the RRI (Radio Republik Indonesia - the official government radio net) Jakarta news at 1300 and 1500 UTC are relayed by virtually every audible SW station in the country. Listen for the announcement: "Inilah Radio Republik Indonesia dengan warta berita" - "Here is Radio Rep. Indonesia with the news". If you can hear the regional stations such as RRI Surabaya (Surabaya is the capital of the Province of East Java, or Jawa Timur), listen at 1400 UTC. Then, RRI Surabaya has a provincial newscast. This is relayed by all (SW) stations in East Java; this news is preceded by a piano IS, in difference to the famous 'Love Ambon' or 'Song of the coconut islands' IS that precedes most other news relays. The correct name in Indonesian for this is 'Rayuan pulau kelapa', which literally means 'Melancholy coconut islands' or such! I remember once reporting an RRI several years ago, stating that I'd heard Love Ambon prior to the nx. The response came back that it was not that, but Rayuan Pulau Kelapa! So there seems to be a difference of opinion, hi.

So what of all this music one hears from Indonesia? Culturally, Indonesia is of a predominantly Moslim following, hence the reason for that type of music being heard (whether it be a recitation from the Holy Koran, or 'genuine' Arabic music of the instrumental variety). For the uninitiated, the Koran reading sounds like 'a man wailing'! But woe befall any DXer who uses that phrase in a reception report! As the Hindu culture had a grasp on Indonesia many many years ago, even today Indian style music is very popular there, in the form of 'lagu melayu'. This is a blend of Indian music and Indonesian popular music elements. It is most pleasant and immediately identifiable. One of the most famous Indonesian exponents of this style is Elvy Sukaesih. Indonesian 'pop' music, or 'lagu pop' (or 'lagu populer')

is probably the most widely heard music from this country. It is usually bouncy (and, dare I use the term?!), gay and happy. I suppose that if one word had to be tagged to Indonesian music, 'melodic' would be it. One of the most melodic styles is 'kroncong' music ('lagu kroncong': also spelled keroncong), similar to Hawaiian guitar tunes. Kroncong (pronounce 'c' in Indonesian as 'ch', please!) Refers to the instrument of the same name, which is not necessarily present in the music! Kroncong music can be instrumental or vocal, and is very soothing indeed! The last of the modern music styles is 'lagu hiburan' (lagu means song, but is often used to refer to music in general). 'Hiburan' means comforting, and that is exactly what this style is: Indonesian 'easy listening' music. It is similar to kroncong music, except that the Hawaiian flavour is absent. But undoubtedly the most famous musical style is Gamelan. This unique music is purely percussive, with the exception of one flute. It is mainly used for special religious occasions, or to accompany 'wayang', or live Indonesian drama. Wayang may be the form of Wayang kulit (puppet shadow plays) or one of the many other types of wayang, using live performers as the characters, or using wooden puppets, etc.

For reception reports, except in a few cases, Indonesian is a must. If you are using an Indonesian dictionary, make sure it is in the 'current' spelling. Not too many newer DXers would realise that there were revisions to the spelling in the early 1970's. Hence 'dj' became 'j' (Jakarta, not Djakarta!); 'tj' becomes 'c'; 'j' becomes 'y', and 'ch' becomes 'kh'. Reply postage does not seem mandatory, but if you can send the station some mint stamps, do so. IRCs seem to be unheard of, except in Jakarta. When reporting a station, make sure that your report period does include local programming, rather than just details of a Jakarta news relay. Otherwise, a rebuff will occur. Indonesian stations appear to maintain very accurate logs of their programming, so a QSL from an Indonesian station is usually about as 'genuine' a QSL as you will ever get. By the same token, if any major errors are present in the report, the chances of getting a QSL will be lowered considerably! Do not give SINPO ratings or detailed technical info to the station (unless it is one of the larger RRIs); the smaller stations (especially the RPD, or Radio Pemerintah Daerah - local government radio) do not understand the SINPO code.

Don't forget that most RRI stations carry advertisements; usually in blocks. If you can get any product names (Rinso, Coca-Cola, Indomilk, etc!), this is an excellent verifiable part of a report. But don't hold your breath waiting for these ads ('iklan') to appear, as they may only come up once or twice in an evening.

There are many terms that are part of Indo-DX jargon! Perhaps the short list following will clarify a few points to the uninitiated:

Riding the Magnetic Storm

It is Friday, February 4th, here in Connecticut, but already Saturday, February 5th, 0100, by Universal Coordinated Time, when I turn on the receiver for my nightly check. Immediately I know something is up.

When you've been in DXing awhile--my 15 years is certainly no record, but qualifies me as a non-beginner--you become quickly aware of unusual propagation conditions. You don't have to hear a rare station to realize it. Ordinary stations you hear day in and day out seem to jump right out at you with unusual sparkle and force. Even an every day powerhouse like Ecos del Torbes on 4980 kHz, seems determined to wreck your S-meter.

The clincher, of course, is the rarer stations. I begin to scout around the 60 meter band.

Whango! On 4697v Radio Riberalta is piling in from Bolivia. I've logged it before but not often, and never like this. At 0110 I go up to 4720 and there is another Bolivian, Radio Abaroa, equally strong. The day I first heard this on 4730 in 1974 with a SINO of 13211 it had been a struggle.

I'm convinced; something is really up. I turn to WWV for the 0118 propagation report: Solar Flux-159, A Index-75, Boulder K Index-5, a "major geomagnetic storm" is in progress.

I know what that means and I know that when the A Index is that high, get those dials moving! It was on August 5th, in 1972 when I first learned that. A magnetic storm was in progress then too.

I turned on my receiver that night in 1972 and incredibly, or so I thought, I logged for the first time Radio Arequipa in Peru at 0050 UTC on 5960 kHz with great strength, plain IDs and Coke ads. My eyebrows still raise when I look at the Sinpo rating I gave it: 44344 (purists will insist that no overall rating can be more than the lowest of its components, but I don't agree).

After Arequipa, what next? Why not Falkland Islands? It was on 3942.5 then with just 500 watts and the only one I knew in North America who had ever logged it was Don Jensen (who else?). I tuned to that area and there it was, faint but unmistakable, with a woman in English and pop music. I didn't recognize any tunes and decided I didn't have enough to report, but a DXing friend, Earle Hall in Massachusetts, logged it that same night, identified the music and got a verie.

I had those thoughts in mind this year when the February magnetic storm was in progress.

It is, I think, one of the great thrills in DXing. One of the impressions I have, and this might be my own excited imagination, is that stations are bursting through a barrier at you and come through with strength in the middle, but a little ragged at the edges. Let me compare it to the famous Lite beer commercial where John Madden comes bursting through a sheet of paper excitedly waving his arms at you. Crazy? Maybe.

Of course, it isn't all tutti-frutti ice cream. Sometimes the whole band goes dead and powerful stations are silent or strangely distorted. Sometimes one band is active and another kaput. You never know. Reception might be great one hour and poor the next. Signals might be strong from one direction and lousy from another.

I found this last observation to be true on February 5th. Signals came in strongly from the south and southeast. Hence, all of South America and most of Africa were good, but Europe and the Pacific were non-productive.

At 0300 I tuned the 90 meter band and the Africans were swarming in. Mozambique, South Africa and Swaziland were booming in on all their channels. I had logged them all before and my only disappointment was failure to hear Quelimane (Mozambique) on 3195 kHz, if still there, but at 250 watts, that was too much to ask for.

So what did I reap that was new from the magnetic storm? I heard the unidentified (at this writing) Peruvian on 6520 kHz (still is, right?-JH) with amazing strength for seven minutes, from 0238 to 0243 and later in fade but, unfortunately, all my peaks coincided with Peruvian music and I was unable to hear an ID.

I also logged another rare Peruvian, Radio Celendin, on 6499 kHz at 0317.

And, finally, as the magnetic storm continued when I came back to the receiver at 1000, I logged about 10 minutes of the Argentinian, Radio Malargue, on 6160 kHz, at sign-on.

Good, but might have been better. Too bad I hadn't been able to read Don Jensen's article in his DX series, "On To The Top", in the February

FRENDX. He spelled it all out there--the necessity in the face of a great propagational opening for having a plan of attack, of knowing just what stations you want to try for and what not. Don also points out that it is better to have a few good, verifiable loggings to show from a good propagational period than a lot of bits and pieces.

Right he is, and the next time I'm going to have a special "Magnetic Storm Target List" all ready.

Can anyone tell me when that is likely to be?

(I dunno, Si, but call me!-JH)

EMISORA ARMONIAS DEL CAQUETA, Florencia, Colombia

Emisoras Armonias del Caqueta in Florencia, Colombia, started broadcasting on November 23rd, 1982. Its goal is the evangelization of the 300,000 inhabitants of the Department of Caqueta. According to the station's director, Padre Alvaro Serna Alzante, Caqueta is very beautiful with an extraordinary future although now it is beset with a number of problems: forests covering the land, poor means of transportation and guerillas.

The director is a Catholic priest, 45 years of age with 20 years in the ministry. He is a journalist and announcer with a license for radio and television.

The station's programs include the Bible, catechism and other programs of the Catholic faith, human relations, health, folk music, programs on the family, news, and programs for the youth.

The station, according to its director, has been quite successful since it started in November. Its slogan is "a light for the religious and cultural orientation of Southern Colombia."

The station's address is quite simple:

A twist of the dial can transport you to foreign lands

There's nothing like the real thing splashing in Dunn's Falls in Jamaica. Meandering through the streets of the Casbah. Touring England's country houses.

But few of us have the opportunity to travel year-round, and I usually need something to tide me over till next year's jaunt. That's where my shortwave radio comes in handy.

With the twist of a dial, I can be in the outback of Australia or strolling down Unter den Linden in Berlin. Depending on my mood, I might touch down in Egypt or see what's doing in South Africa. On the way, I can listen to the call of Mecca, the steel-drum sounds of the Caribbean or tomorrow's weather report for Brasilia.

Shortwave radio brings you all that and more. It's a way to experience cultures and customs without ever leaving home.

For the uninitiated air-chair traveler, a quick explanation:

Shortwave radio signals bounce around the globe like a Ping-Pong ball in play. This makes it possible to hear hundreds of stations whose signals originate thousands of miles away. You can hear broadcasts from Moscow, Athens and Peking as if they were coming from down the street.

What's more, a good number of these broadcasts are destined specifically for American listeners. Many are served up in English for those who don't know enough of another language to find a bathroom.

What can you expect to hear?

For starters, try London via the British Broadcasting Corp. (BBC). What began as a service to keep expatriates in touch with the mother country has evolved into one of the best-known international broadcasters in the world.

Celebrating 50 years of service on the shortwave bands this year, the BBC boasts an audience of more than 160 million regular listeners.

The BBC World Service can be heard around the clock in the United States and almost anywhere else in the world. You can hear Big Ben tolling the hour and have a front-row seat for "News About Britain," "Radio Newsreel" (an international news summary), classical concerts, interviews and, yes, quiz shows, British style.

Theater buffs can catch a sneak preview of London's stage as well. For example, Money, the 1940 comedy revived last year by the Royal Shakespeare Company, made its radio debut on the BBC, entertaining millions worldwide.

The BBC can be heard on a dozen or more frequencies. During the day, 15.870 megahertz (MHz) and 15.260 megahertz sound best in the Philadelphia area. At night, try 6.175 MHz and 9.410 MHz.

One of my favorite stations is Spanish Foreign Radio, which broadcasts from Madrid. Its programs are a gold mine of information for would-be travelers.

As I counted down the days to my recent trip to Spain, I tuned in nightly. The broadcasts picked up

where the travel guides and my travel agent left off, giving me an up-to-the-minute picture of the political and economic scene in Spain. Not only that, I also had a radio tour of the 12th-century Alhambra fortress and a guided expedition to Ronda and the "white towns" of Spain.

In the northeast, Spanish Foreign Radio can be heard daily from about 7 to 9 p.m. on 9.430 MHz and 11.880 MHz.

Many stations, like Swiss Radio International, have special programs for would-be travelers. "Round About Switzerland," for example, is a tour of little-known points of interest. It airs the second Saturday of each month.

But there's no need to wait until then to hear Swiss Radio International. You can find it daily on 6.135 MHz from 8:45 to 9:45 p.m. ("Round About Switzerland" is heard during this time period).

New Orleans-bound vacationers might want to drop in on WRNO. Worldwide before leaving for Cajun country.

Called the Rock of New Orleans, WRNO holds the distinction of being the United States' only commercial shortwave station. It has been on the air for just over a year.

One of WRNO's goals is to give tourism a shot in the arm. During Mardi Gras, parade updates and announcements come several times an hour. With the 1984 World's Fair set to take place in New Orleans, WRNO is already spreading the word.

You can hear WRNO from 7 to 9 p.m. on 11.965 MHz. You can't miss it — transmission begins with "Way Down Yonder in New Orleans."

Learn a language

Shortwave offers the opportunity to learn a new language, or to brush up on an old one.

It won't take long to find German, French, Arabic or Russian on the dial. Serbo-Croatian, Farsi and Swahili may be harder to find, but are there for the listening, too. Radio Peking offers Chinese lessons, and Spanish Foreign Radio airs Spanish for beginners.

The airwaves offer some unusual fare, too.

Some readers will remember Tokyo Rose Update her by about 40 years. More the battle to the Falkland Islands and you have Argentine Annie. She became an instant hit among shortwave listeners who, during the Falklands war, were eager to hear a bit of radio history in the making. Argentine Annie has since left the airwaves, of course.

From WWV, time bugs can always get an accurate reading, courtesy of the nation's time-keeping station in Fort Collins, Colo. WWV is easy to

find. During the day, tune to 15.80 MHz. At night, 16.80 MHz is loudest.

The Canadian time-keeping station, CHU, can be found at 7.335 MHz, in both French and English.

Experience has shown me that it's a good idea to carry a shortwave radio along on vacation.

My wife and I were in Venezuela a couple of years ago when President Reagan was shot. We heard the news at poolside. We were told that Reagan had been killed along with several aides.

Back in our Caracas hotel room, all we could make out on the television was "Casa Blanca," the Spanish for White House. To make matters worse, we were disconnected when we tried calling the U.S. Embassy.

It wasn't until the next morning, when the English-language newspaper, The Daily Journal, hit the newsstands that we learned what had really happened back in Washington.

Much of our concern could have been alleviated if we had had our portable shortwave radio. We could have tuned in the Voice of America, which broadcasts from 15 sites around the world, or American Armed Forces Radio.

Not expensive

Many people think of shortwave radio as expensive, with monstrous antenna structures straddling the roof.

Some portable receivers with one or two shortwave bands sell for less than \$50.

My first shortwave set was an old tube model. A neighbor found it crusty and dirty, in her basement. It was an ugly thing without dial or casing, and had a separate speaker that I had to prop up with a stack of books.

Despite all that, it worked, and I could hear more than 30 countries from my basement listening post.

Tuning in a shortwave station is no more difficult than finding the Phillies or Eagles game on the clock radio. With just a little practice and patience, you can learn when and where to find the station you want to hear.

A general rule of thumb is to tune just above 6 MHz, and just below 10 and 12 MHz during the evening. During daylight hours, listen just above 15 MHz and just below 18 MHz.

And try using an outdoor antenna that's about 50 feet long. The longer the wire, the more stations you'll be likely to hear.

Of course, not all countries have shortwave broadcast facilities. And some that do are virtually impossible to hear in this country.

Computer and Electronics magazine periodically publishes lists of broadcasts being heard in North America. For an even more detailed listing, you might join one of the many clubs serving shortwave

listeners.

The North American Short Wave Association, for example, will send members a monthly newsletter listing stations, times, frequencies and reception tips. Annual membership is \$16. For further information, write the association at Box 13, Liberty, Ind. 47531.

No half-hearted listener would be without the *World Radio-TV Handbook*, the most complete guide to international broadcasting. It's crisscrossed with station information, frequencies, addresses and equipment reviews. Published in Denmark, the *World Radio-TV Handbook* can be ordered at most bookstores through Giffel Associates, Box 239, Park Ridge, N.J. 07656.

A souvenir

Souvenirists aren't happy with just hearing a far-away station like travelers. They want a souvenir or proof that, indeed, they have tuned in the Voice of Radio Belize or Radio Luxembourg.

Verification is easy enough. All it takes is a reception report sent to the station (some stations request that an International Reply Coupon, available at most post offices, accompany the report to cover return postage).

A reception report includes some basic information such as the date and time you heard the station, frequency, signal quality, amount of interference, if any, and a few program details.

In return, the listener will receive a verification card or QSL, as hobbyists call them. Verifying 25 countries is quite easy. A hundred or more requires some sophisticated know-how in tracking down the rare, hard-to-hear stations.

For starters, try some of the following stations. All times are Eastern Standard Time.

- Kol Israel, 5:30 to 6 p.m., 9.825 MHz.
- Radio Canada International, 6 to 8 p.m., 3.960 MHz.
- Radio Moscow, 7 p.m. to midnight, 9.60 MHz.
- MCJB, Ecuador, 7:30 to 8:30 p.m., 15.175 MHz.
- Vatican Radin, 8 to 8:15 p.m., 9.405 MHz.
- Radio Peking, 8 to 9 p.m., 15.120 MHz.
- Austrian Radio, 8:30 to 9 p.m., 5.945 MHz.
- Radio Nacional, Brazil, 9 to 10 p.m., 15.290 MHz.
- Radio Cairo, 9 to 10:45 p.m., 9.475 MHz.
- Radio Nederland, 9:30 to 10:30 p.m., 6.990 MHz.

Great 60 Meter Band Fire of 1971....

Seems like every convention I attend there are always a few who come up to me with the question, "Weren't you the same Ed Shaw who started the 60 meter fire about ten years ago?" Somewhat embarrassed I give the sudden and unsolicited mention of praise I admitted that I was the same. Invariably, I was always asked to recount the excitement of the benefit of newcomers to the hobby since the event. Taking a seat at the nearest table, I would sit back and squint off into space and try to remember just how it all started. Oh yes, now it all comes back to me....

It was about 0400 GMT one September night. The upper frequencies had been tied off and most of the Latins had already signed-off for the night. I was still puttering around 4473 kHz area, having just left the band not long before, when I thought I heard the muffled cry of "Fire!" I figured that some member of my own household was perhaps in trouble, so I turned the earphones away from the sides of my head and turned to listen. The house was quiet and everyone asleep, so I went back to concentrating on what I was doing. I tuned up to 4485 kHz and caught the end of a speech of a Soviet announcer speculating on corn futures. Some faint crackle, but otherwise not too much QRM. Still, I heard again that faint call, "Fire!" This time the sound seemed to emanate out of my right earpiece.

I tuned further up frequency and approached 4679. Espejo was there, but the fire cry was louder and plainer now. Somewhat confused and a warmish sensation felt in my right ear and by the obvious excitement of the cry of "Fire!", I began to crank the dial up quickly now. Once again, I was intrigued! What in Heaven's name was going on? I felt my hand jerk to one side as a rapid voice in Spanish shouldered his way across my i.f. I recognized it as Radio Bolivar, Venezuela, from the heading down frequency. Holy Heterodynes! What was it doing down here around 4700 kHz? Tuning up frequency some more I encountered Radio del Galapagos, Radio Ribamar-Brasil, and Radio Lara-Venezuela, and headed down frequency in one helluva hurry. By the time I had tuned to Radio Tachira-Venezuela, I understood what was going on. Here was a jamming station staggering down frequency, upper sideband scorched and still burning. Just a few kHz up, a roaring fire was settled right between the stations of Juventud and Emisoras Gran Colombia. Both stations were infernos! I gave a running spin on my dial knob and leaped across the damaged spectrum, landing right on top of Caracol Neiva, scraping my knuckles. As just as well I reawoke them. Having just gone off the air, their transmitter had not yet shut down. Together we tuned further up frequency and got away from the spreading flames. Everyone remaining on the air was being pushed upwards and a traffic jam was forming around WWV. With a concerted effort, we dislodged the monotonous beep to one side and most of them got away. I heard later that night that 16 stations were destroyed, their transmitters had distorted carriers and sidebands, and WWV was badly damaged. Even the lower portion of the 49 meter band was beginning to get warm and melt. Radio Canada International reportedly will file a lawsuit with the ITU in an attempt to recover barber expenses for MacFarland's singed beard. Hoping that there would be no further damage, I tuned way on up frequency in case any sparks rising might spontaneously ignite. Everything was fine as far up as 31 meters. Along the way at 9800 kHz I found Hauser feeling around for warm-spot harmonics, but otherwise no other damage was apparent. Throughout the next week, I made high phone calls and cards. I learned that several receivers had been burned, charred speaker cones, two had antenna lead-ins melted. One DXer's collection was completely incinerated because the DXer had them all mounted on the wall over his receiver. Several NASWA members reported that they had burned the tips of fingers.

Several years have intervened now. Some destroyed stations remained on the air. Others have rebuilt with new and better firefighting capabilities.

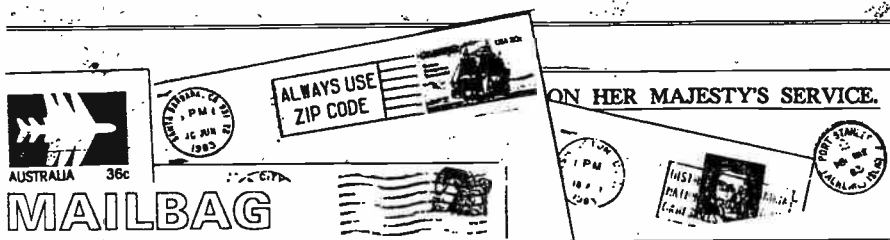

I regret that those of you who had reports out to stations between 4875 and 4930 kHz will have to resubmit since most all reports went up in smoke.

To aid in better band protection I have installed a smoke detector in my i.f. section. In case of fire anywhere in my tuning vicinity, a neon pilot on either side of my main dial indicates direction of the blaze in order that I may tune the opposite way and pass the word.

Let this be a lesson to all!

THE ANTIQUE WIRELESS ASSOCIATION

From time to time, I have given you brief glimpses of the most venerable of the antique radio clubs. This month, however, I would like to more deeply acquaint you with the Antique Wireless Association (AWA).

The Association was founded in 1952 in order to foster the preservation and historical documentation of the field of communications. It is a member of the American Assoc. of Museums and the Regional Conference of Historical Agencies. A.W.A. operates as a non-profit organization under the laws of the state of New York. There are currently over 2000 members of the Association, most of whom are quite active in various endeavors having to do with the history of "wireless".

There are several methods used by the Association in the promotion of historical research and preservation. Probably the most important means to this end is accomplished through the publishing of the quarterly bulletin, "The Old Timer's Bulletin" (OTB). The OTB is a regular source for the dissemination of members' research. More thorough efforts are published in AWA Monograph booklets. Another source of stimulation for historical research would be the meetings that are sponsored under the auspices of the Association. These convocations are held in conjunction with both museums and other amateur and professional organizations (i.e., IEEE, ARRL, SOWP, etc.). Slide shows have been presented at many of these affairs with great success.

The OTB is the most visible benefit of membership. It is published quarterly in March, June, September and December. Weighing in with a hefty 32 to 36 pages per issue, and very professionally set in print, the Old Timer's Bulletin is a bargain at two dollars per issue. Each issue brings many stories on tubes, sets, horn speakers, old stations, manufacturers histories, tips for restorers, book reviews, olde tyme ham ads (buy/sell/swap), and much more.

And, finally, what would more complement this organization than its own museum? The Electronic Communications Museum (located in East Bloomfield, N.Y.) houses and displays over 25,000 pieces of radio and wireless parts and equipment. The museum offers guided tours and demonstrations from May through October on Sundays (2 to 5 pm) and Wednesdays (7 to 9 pm). Groups may visit by appointment (Bruce Kelley, W2ICE, 716-657-7489). And remember, admission is FREE.

Those of you wishing to join, or those interested in obtaining more information, should write to Richard Ransley, 17 Sheridan St., Auburn New York, 13021. Request the AWA information packet and a membership application. Please ship them a large SASE with your request. Thank. The dues are \$8.00/year (1st class) and \$16.00/two years; \$10.00 US/year for overseas airmail. Believe me, its money very well spent. Hi.

"Contact" is special because it will reflect the members who contribute their thoughts and opinions. This is a "reader's," not an "editor's" column. If there are no contributions there will be no column. This space is yours to debate issues of interest to NASWA members. There are only a few things you will never see in "Contact": personal attacks, ad nauseum discussions concerning the phony "DXer-versus-SWL" and "QSL-Anti-QSL" debate, as well as otherwise legitimate items that simply belong somewhere else in FRENEX. As editor, I promise not to indulge in the regrettably common practice of "getting the last word," though I will correct factual errors.

This being a new venture, I will have to break my first cardinal rule this time around and toss out some topics for dialogue:

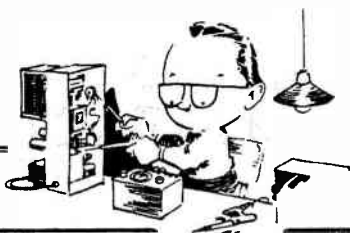
The effect of communication satellites on shortwave broadcasting has drawn quite a bit of attention. However, most writers have dealt only with direct satellite broadcasting as a substitute for terrestrial HF systems. This revolution in international broadcasting is still a ways off, but another aspect of satellite technology could have a far more immediate effect on what you hear between 1.6 and 30 MHz. Do you like to tune in small, microscopic countries like the Falklands or the Cook Islands? Satellites may spoil your fun. Stations in such areas may find they can better serve their listeners by feeding low-powered local mediumwave or VHF-FM transmitters by satellite, dropping the SW service. True, SW covers a large area more economically than either MW or VHF, but that advantage means nothing if the listening population is concentrated in bunches. Such an audience can get studio-quality, fade-free signals from local satellite-fed transmitters at a cost competitive with SW.

Satellites will not kill off domestic SW broadcasting completely, though. Countries like Australia must serve very small, widely scattered groups. The Australian Broadcasting Commission is now thinking about building new SW transmitters to serve far-flung Northern Territory listeners. Until direct satellite broadcasting arrives, SW will be the best way to reach this kind of audience.

This is but one of many technically-oriented issues we can discuss in "Contact." Others include: are home computers compatible in the radio shack? They are a notorious source of QRM. Someone must have practical hints on suppressing such noise, and turning the computer to tasks of greater import than cataloging QSLs. The Great Power Race, jamming: all are grist for the mill.

If you are as technically-retarded as I am don't worry. "Contact" will not dwell entirely on hardware. One should not concentrate on the means of transmission at the expense of the message being transmitted. I encourage all readers to share their thoughts on the vast, occasionally wonderful, more often mediocre, and sometimes downright awful area of SW programming. Why are most "DX programs" less than useless? Can we as listeners do anything about it? Should we even try? Why do all the private SW stations in the United States inflict the garbage they do on the world's airwaves? Why do some international broadcasters try so hard to distance themselves from the countries they ostensibly represent?

There are hundreds of other topics. If you would like to get an opinion on any of the above issues off your chest - or on something you think other NASWA members would find interesting - this space will be yours next month. If no one feels like writing I'm sure John can use the space for something else.

Shaw is going to be a tough act to follow. As author of "DXing to NASWA" and former publisher of FRENEX, Ed's contributions to the hobby are well documented. Not so well known are the numerous articles Ed has received over the years on a variety of subjects, each carefully answered in great technical detail, yet always offering a friendly and helpful comment. Ed, more than anyone I know, subscribes to the philosophy of "Friendship and Friendship".

Signal levels on the tropical bands during the summer months can test a man's patience, but there are a few methods by which we can alleviate this problem. First, and foremost, a good ground on the receiver should be established, consisting of a ground clamp on a cold water pipe, connected by a heavy or heavier stranded wire. Prior to fastening the clamp to the pipe, rub the area on the pipe with steel wool or fine emery cloth until it's shiny. Ground clamps can be purchased at hardware or electrical supply stores, or fashioned from perforated copper strap used to hang long runs of copper tubing.

If you are using a coax feedline for your antenna, grounding the braid to the house prior to where it enters your house will also help reduce noise. This is also true if the feedline is used on a longwire antenna, where the braid is not connected at the antenna end. Carefully strip away about 1/2" of the vinyl jacket on the coax, careful not to cut the braid. With the jacket now exposed, prepare the connection by stripping about 3" of insulation from the length of 14 ga. solid wire. Wrap about 4 or 5 turns of this stripped wire around the braid of the coax. Forego soldering this connection as heat will melt the insulation between the braid and the inner conductor. The other end of the insulated wire should be fastened to a ground rod, using a similar clamp as was used on the receiver's water pipe ground. In areas with poor ground conductivity, radials consisting of several lengths of wire driven just under the ground level, like spokes on a wheel, will help. These radials should also be connected to the ground rod. Finally, tape all connections with electrical tape. At my brother's home, we were able to reduce static and man-made noise substantially, plus effectively reduce interference from a color television located less than 15 feet from the listening post.

If the listening post is located on the second floor of my home. In an effort to ground the receiver, I used the baseboard radiant heating system which consists of two loops of copper tubing encompassing the two floors of the house. Due to the boiler being included in this system, this was not a perfect ground system, but it did alleviate some of the noise. Recently, I tried using this as an antenna and found that it resonated at 4 MHz quite nicely. Although signal strengths were down somewhat compared to those obtained with my outdoor longwire, the attenuation in noise was a considerable difference in readability. No doubt other systems could be used utilizing heat ducts. Matching devices, such as antenna tuners, could be used to resonate these systems over several bands. Preselectors could be employed to compensate for low gain.

Trying this idea a step farther, I recently put up a pair of 120 ft. wires on a 160" bearing. One antenna I terminated by connecting a piece of copper tubing and tossing it into the nearby river. At a length of 120 ft. I found that it should resonate close to 4 MHz. The unterminated wire resonated in Radio Bafoussam, Cameroon on 4000 kHz, at a good level, but

switching to the terminated wire showed no trace of the station. I first thought that the termination must be attenuating signals until I moved up into the 60 meter band. Here it became obvious that the terminated wire was providing some directivity in addition to noise suppression, as Latin signals were much stronger on this wire, while the unterminated wire showed consistently poorer Latin signals, but much better African signals. Although noise suppression was the motivation behind this experiment, I consider the resulting directivity to be a most welcome bonus. Those not fortunate enough to have a nearby river to use as a termination can use a ground rod and/or radial system at the far end of the antenna. Unlike Beverage wave antennas, which are constructed very close to the ground, all longwires should be placed as high and in the clear as possible, with a down lead at the far end for termination. More experimenting is needed to determine the amount of side rejection provided by various antenna lengths. I would be interested in hearing from anyone who tries this idea.

A spec sheet has been received from SONY describing the new ICF-2002 receiver. The accompanying memo from Mr. Jon Strom, Marketing Manager for the Consumer Audio Division says "contrary to untold false rumors, the ICF-2002 is a totally new receiver, the size of a paper-back book." The dimensions of this receiver are 4 5/8" H x 7 1/8" W x 1 1/4" D, in contrast to the 2001 which is 6 3/4" H x 11 5/8" W x 2" D. Covering 150 kHz - 30 MHz plus FM, a switchable 12/24 hour clock has been added and it has 10 memory presets while the 2001 has 6. Battery requirements are 4 AAs for the receiver section and 2 AAs for the computer/clock. Manual tuning moves up and down at the following rates; 3 kHz for LW, 10 kHz for MW (BCB) and 5 kHz for SW (100 kHz for FM). More precise frequency determination (1 kHz) is provided by the now familiar keypad entry system. I cannot see a BFO pitch control in the picture, as was utilized on the 2001, consequently I cannot ascertain if the BFO can be used in conjunction with the product detector to receive off-frequency stations (i.e. stations whose "zero beat" lies in between the 1 kHz increments provided by the keypad entry system, such as SSB utility stations.) Sensitivity is given as 1 uV for 6 dB S/N at 10 MHz. Selectivity is given as ±3 kHz at -6 dB and ±6dB. Suggested retail is \$249.95 with estimated availability in August 1983. Hopefully, more info (a hands-on review) will be available in the near future.

By the time you receive this, ANARC's convention will have occurred, with the unveiling of a couple of new entries in the receiver marketplace. Rather than speculate on what's in store for us in the near future, I'd prefer to hold off until we've had a chance to substantiate the various rumors currently circulating among the membership. If the number of new entries is as many as has been rumored, we're in for some very interesting reviews. Stay tuned!

Your editor is most anxious to receive your contributions, suggestions, comments and/or criticisms. Without this input, it will be very difficult to determine the type of information you desire, and severely limit the scope of the column.

play" or "too easy" now they've upped their transmitter power" or "just plain mashed potatoes". Sullenly dejected, you slink to the deepest, darkest recess of your radio shack and plunge your finger into the nearest available 550 volt B plus line, ending it all.

But wait! Don't despair--help is available! Before deciding to fry your frijoles ala D.C. H.V., apply this remedy at once:

THE DX COEFFICIENT/EGO REDUCING FORMULA

How does it work? Simple! Just take the transmitter power of the station that you heard, and divide it by the approximate number of statute miles that you believe the signal travelled. You wind up with what could be called, for lack of a better term (and I welcome any intelligent or unintelligent suggestion), the "DX Coefficient" (if you're really compulsive you can call it "Watt-Miles"). The smaller the figure, the better the catch.

Example: Say you've come up with the Falklands catch on 3958 kHz, known to use 3.5 kW. Well, from my QTH this comes out to about 6820 statute miles via shortpath. 3500 divided by 6820 equals .513 (rounded off to the 3rd place), so the figure is .513 for the "Coefficient".

Compare this against a catch you've had in the past--say, an Indian regional running 10 kW, approximately 9020 miles away. 10000 divided by 9020 equals 1.108.

Again, take an Irish pirate known to run 400 watts. If you estimate the signal path travel to be, say, 5280 miles, the figure works out to be .075, a relatively low number. Apparently, the Falklands is a better catch than the Indian regional, but not as good as the Irish pirate station.

One of the nice things about this arrangement is that it somewhat compensates for geographic differences between you and the fellow who may think that it's relatively easy. The drawbacks to this little device are as follows:

1. Is the transmission omnidirectional or is it beamed? 2. Is the signal propagating over land or less lossy terrain--water? 3. Is the signal coming via longpath, shortpath or both? 4. Is the transmitter operating at the advertised power, or considerably less due to age, neglect, etc? 5. Is the transmitter power known at all? 6. What frequency is it on? For instance, HCJB's 100 watt transmitter on 26010 kHz uses a cubical quad beam antenna. If it were on the tropical bands, reception would be incredibly more difficult. 7. Considerable differences in receiving gear will throw this off quite a bit. Let us consider these one by one, and then keel over, hi.

Actually, this can serve as some sort of yardstick, albeit a clumsy one, to gauge your DX catch of the month, year or whatever, against those you've made in the past; providing, of course, that the factors above (and there are probably more) are borne in mind.

In any case, it's a fun little game, and it should provide some sort of curative balm for that all too pervasive disease, DX'ers EGO TRIP! Don't let it muck up your fun!



Hopefully the high noise levels haven't completely jaded your interest in shortwave these hot summer days. I usually look for things to start picking up after Labor Day, when early morning Peruvians, and a mug of hot coffee, seem like the perfect way to start a day.

If you can bring yourself to do it, get out there and check those connections on the antenna, bring the log book up to date, make yourself a target book for the rare DX, get your shack in order, read and contribute to FRENEX and HAVE FUN!
