

Students Awarded Foundation Scholarships

Last week the 1962 Tektronix Foundation Scholarship Selection committee interviewed the 14 finalists in the 1962 scholarship program. Winners of the competitive awards are judged on courses taken, grades received, recommendations of teachers and counselors, and aptitude. Any Washington county high school student who will be a full-time student in an accredited U.S. college in the 1962 fall term, majoring in a physical science or mathematics, was eligible for consideration.

Students who were interviewed but who did not receive awards were: from Jesuit—Robert Anderson, Patrick Dorr, Roger Hennagin and Charles Owen; from Hillsboro—Paul Davis; from Forest Grove—Kenneth Noah and Tim Schauer-mann; and from Beaverton—Robert Berry.

After the scholarship winners were selected, Bill Webber commented: "In the two years we have had this competitive program, there have been excellent students applying. The decisions are very difficult in selecting first those to be interviewed and then the final six. We plan to keep in touch with our scholarship winners to follow their careers. I am sure their achievements will prove the value of our approach in 'rewarding excellence to encourage excellence'."

Credit Union Insurance Changes Due

Tektronix Federal Credit Union share insurance protection will be increased from \$1000 to \$2000 beginning June 1, according to Jim Hier (Plastics Scheduling), Credit Union Education committee chairman. This change increases the **maximum** coverage only; it does not affect administration of the insurance program. Under the new coverage, if an employee dies, leaving \$2000 in his share account, his beneficiary will receive \$2000 for the shares plus \$2000 insurance; if the employee leaves \$5000 in his share account, his beneficiary will receive \$5000 for the shares plus \$2000 insurance; if the employee leaves \$1200 in his share account, his beneficiary will receive \$1200 for the shares plus \$1200 insurance.

Jim also mentioned a change in the quarterly statement procedure. At present each shareholder receives a duplicate, posted from the posting machine, of his quarterly statement. The duplicate lists transactions in his account during that quarter, and the balances in the loan and/or savings accounts.

In the future all ledger cards will be microfilmed quarterly. An electrostatic copy of the ledger card will be made from the microfilm, and that copy will be sent to each shareholder. Although the microfilm process will cost slightly more than the present system, it will increase efficiency by mechanizing the operation. Most important, it will enable the Credit Union to store permanent microfilmed copies of ledger cards and financial records in a bank safe deposit box, eliminating the possibility of loss of records due to fire or theft.

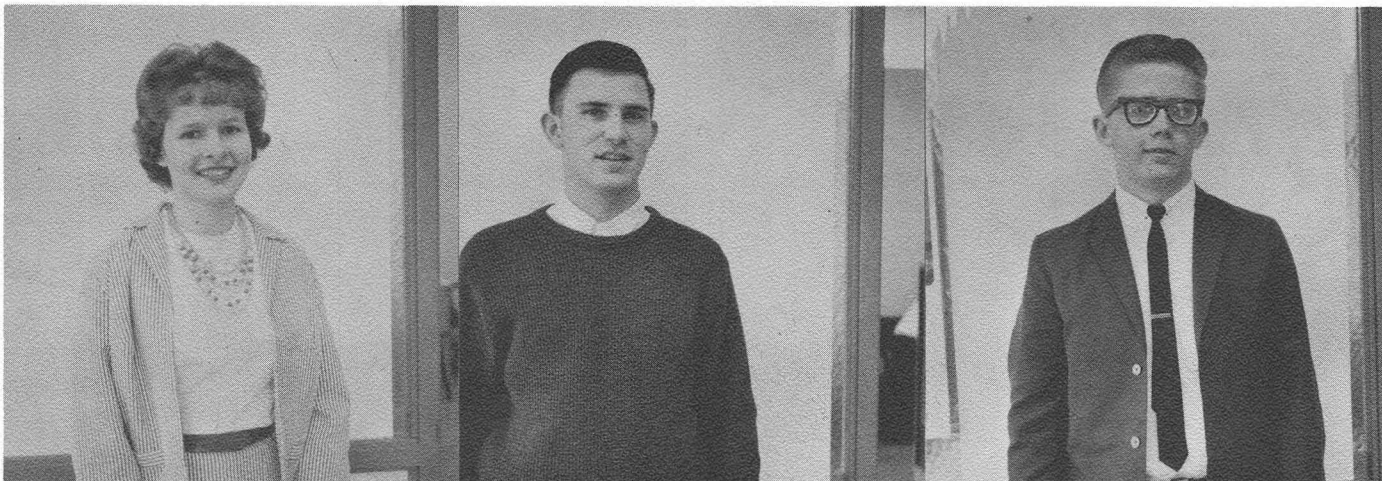

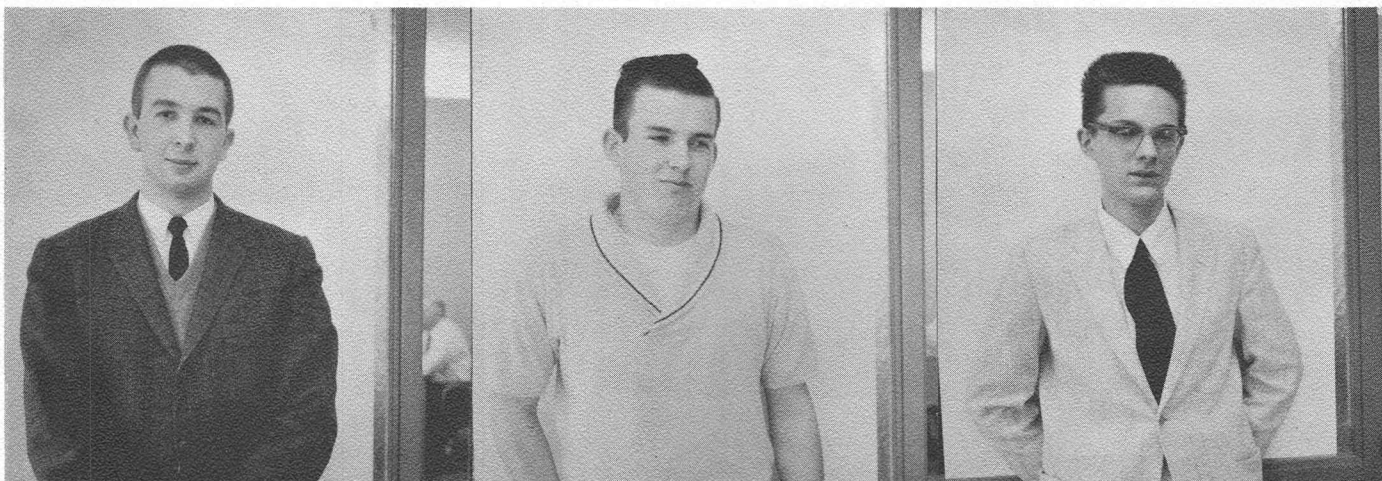
1962 Tek Foundation Scholarship Winners

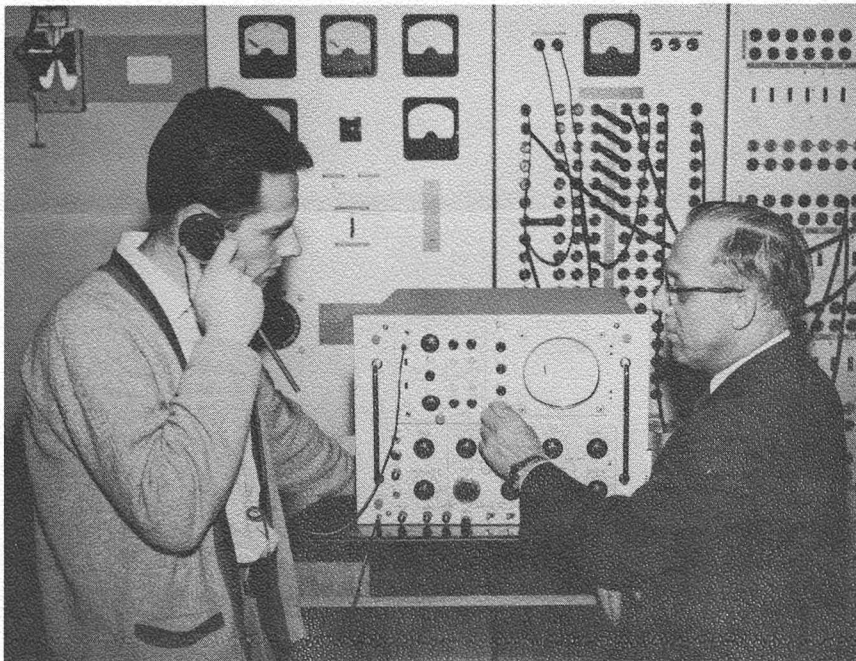
