A quick update on the Clubhouse Construction Project. We have found a way NOT to have to put the hallway in the Magnolia Room. The reason management wanted the hallway was to have a door to allow us to separate the Magnolia Room into two rooms. We can do this by putting a pocket door in the existing hallway and then make use of the partition walls when necessary.

Also, the restaurant is being extended into the lobby because we are enclosing the old bar and the area currently occupied by the two PAC doors on the left side to make more storage space for Food & Beverage

supplies. This will help get most of the supplies off the stage and out of the closet in the Magnolia Room. We will also have a waitress service station behind these walls to get the dirty dish cart out of sight. The Pasco County permitting process is moving slower than expected. I will keep you notified as this process proceeds.

In a effort to communicate with the residents and resolve problems, I sometimes make decisions quickly, when there is no need to do this. I intend to take more time in this effort so I do not give the appearance that my decisions are inconsistent. 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

Paper Recycling Program:

Get ready to recycle paper and cardboard! HPCA is in the process of signing a contract with Green Fiber, a company that turns recycled paper into high grade insulation for homes. In the next few weeks you will receive communication that the program is ready to start. You will be able to recycle the following items: phonebooks, office paper (including junk mail), cardboard, cereal and other food boxes, magazines, brown paper bags, construction paper, soft books, and newspapers. However, we would encourage you to continue to put your newspapers in the separate newspaper bin because our rebate for newspapers from a different company is greater than what we can get from Green Fiber.



A separate large collection bin will be placed in our recycling area specifically for paper products. Green Fiber will empty the bin weekly or as needed. We will receive a rebate (amount still in negotiation) for each ton. Rebates from all recycling programs are used for environmental

programs here in Heritage Pines. More information to follow.

Florida Friendly Landscaping Fair:

We are planning an event for late October in Gazebo Park that will educate all of us about Florida Friendly Landscaping. We plan to have speakers who will explain the principles and vendors who will bring Florida Friendly plants for sale. Food, music, and maybe even a game will be available. Look for specific information soon.

Hazardous Waste Collection Day:

With the help of Pasco County we hope to hold a hazardous waste collection day here January 2011. That means you will be able to bring your paint cans and other hazardous waste containers to a central location for pick-up and proper disposal. We hope to be able to have electronics pick-up, too, so you will be able to dispose of old TVs, computers, etc. There may be a small charge for electronics disposal.

We hope you are continuing or starting to recycle #1 and #2 plastic containers; clear, green, and brown glass; and metal food cans (not aluminum) in blue bags for pick-up on Mondays. Go GREEN Heritage Pines!

Notes From The Architectural Review Committee

This month we'll talk about ornaments, pots and mailbox posts. I hope this will answer some questions and clear up

some confusion. On page 24 of the Architectural Manual it says that ornaments shall not exceed 48 inches in height and 30 inches in width and no more than three (3) ornaments and three (3) potted plants. Now this means you can have up to three (3) of each in the front of the house and three (3) of each in the rear. An <u>empty</u> pot and anything attached to the wall of the house



is considered an ornament. If you live on a corner lot, you can place any of the above at the side of the house. So go take a look at your ornaments and pots just to make sure you have the right amount.

There are several mailbox posts in the community that need to be replaced. Ben Bell, 868-4261, is the guy to call. Ben is a resident and does an excellent job of installing a new



post for a very reasonable fee. Can't get much more convenient than that. Thank you Ben for providing us with this service.

From Your Board of Directors

The following is an email that was sent to members on June 24, 2010. It is repeated here for the benefit of those who do not have email capability.

Disclaimer: The following is a synopsis of what transpired at the Board of Directors (BOD) Meeting and is not intended to be official minutes of the meeting.

1. Approval of funding for projects that comprise the Clubhouse renovation/expansion program.

 - The expenditure of 13,605.47 from the capital fund to install an irrigation system at the 2^{nd} entrance.
 - The Finance Committee Charter.
 - Mr. Tom Newkirk as Chair to the Audit Committee.
 - Roles and responsibilities for liaisons to BOD Committees.

The expenditure of 43,000 from the reserve fund to replace the 20 ton dining room HVAC unit with two (2) 10 ton units.

Rumor of the Month "Sysco City"

Hello, hello... I'm at it again. I thought I'd be able to sit back and enjoy my retirement, but it seems the old rumor mill is spinning out all kinds of gobbledygook. While there are a multitude of rumors I could pick from, I'd rather choose one that will churn up the most chatter.

I am not a snowflake. I am here year round and enjoy many of the events and dining opportunities provided to me by the Clubhouse and its staff. I heard recently that there is actually no "cooking" going on, and that it's all "prepackaged" and "microwaved." I found this shocking and absolutely dissatisfying as I have been bringing my family here for years. So I got the task of finding out just what was lurking in our freezer...

Our restaurant uses Sysco, a global provider of food items, kitchen supplies, and hospitality products (according to its website). I went to those in charge, and point blank, asked

for a peek. I did not see ONE item that was pre-packaged or had any resemblance of a TV dinner. I saw fresh vegetables, fresh fruit (and canned fruit), raw meats, and an abundance of condiments and seasonings, much like those in my own kitchen (just on a larger scale). Dinner preparations were underway; and I can assure you the food was being grilled, seasoned, sautéed, simmered, broiled, steamed, baked, fried,



and all the other forms of cooking related adjectives you can think of. Sysco provides the same items to our kitchen as they do to local franchises and other clubhouses just like ours.

I will be the first to admit that not every experience I have had has been a 10 out of 10, but I've made management

aware of their shortcomings immediately rather than waiting a few days or weeks. It seems to me that many of the complaints are hit or miss, just as they would be with any franchise restaurant in existence. Our kitchen can put out great meals, evidenced by the fact that I still cannot get a table for the monthly Italian Night.

Like the old adage said "What came first... the chicken or the egg?" Notice, neither of which were pre-packaged or microwaved. Sorry all... but this rumor is FALSE.



I am well into my second month of training and fundraising for the Susan G. Komen event being held October 29, 30, and 31st. 

From Chef Matt's Cookbook...



Veal Marengo

4 1/2 pounds veal leg, cut into 1/2inch thick pieces pounded until 1/4 inch thick slices 3/4 cup Italian bread crumbs 2 large eggs slightly beaten 2 cloves garlic, peeled and crushed 2 large onions, sliced 1/2 cup COLAVITA Extra Virgin Olive Oil 2 cups dry white wine 1 (2 pound 3 ounce) can Italian plum tomatoes, with juice 2 green bell peppers, chopped 3/4 teaspoon dried thyme 3/4 teaspoon dried tarragon 1 bay leaf Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste 3/4 pound sliced mushrooms 1 tablespoon brown sugar 1/2 cup water, if needed 1/2 cup chopped fresh parsley

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Coat the yeal with the eggs then the bread crumbs. Brown the veal in 3 to 4 tablespoons oil in skillet. You will need to cook the yeal in several batches. Use extra oil, if needed. When the veal pieces are browned, remove veal from pan; deglaze the pan with the wine. Sauté the garlic and onions in the skillet with a little oil until soft. Chop the tomatoes and bell peppers, and add them to the sauté pan with the tomato juice. Add thyme, tarragon, bay leaf, salt and pepper. Stir in the mushrooms and brown sugar and 1/2 cup water if needed for juiciness. Cover and simmer for 1/2 hour. uncover and cook an additional 15 minutes. Place veal cutlets in casserole pan. Pour tomato mixture over veal and bake at 350 degree oven for 15 to 20 min. Remove from oven top with the fresh parsley, makes 10 to 12 servings. Enjoy!

The Rules Of Golf



Phil Mickelson ran into trouble on the second day of the Scottish Open in Loch Lomond and blew his chance to depose Tiger as golf's number one for at least another week. He came to grief on the 455

yard, Par-4, 18th hole, his 9th on the day, which has water all the way down the left hand side. His first drive went into the water and it seemed that his second had fared little better, so he changed his driver for a 3-wood and played a third ball, his fifth stroke, out to the right to ensure that it remained in play. In fact, as he walked down the fairway the TV commentator and previous Scottish Open winner, Wayne Riley, told Mickelson that his second ball was playable, but quite rightly the left-hander said that he had not declared his third ball to be a provisional and under the rules of golf had to play it. If he had played his second ball he would have incurred two more penalty strokes for playing a wrong ball as it was no longer in play. Presumably Phil knew that because he was virtually certain that both his first two balls were in the water hazard he did not have the option of playing a provisional ball.

In the absence of a marshal giving him information on where his second shot had finished while he was still on the teeing ground (why did this not happen?) he had chosen to put a third ball into play. Asked why he had played a third ball when his second ball might have been playable from within the hazard Phil made the reasonable point; I didn't want to walk 300 hundred yards up and 300 yards back.

Provisional Ball

a. Procedure

If a ball may be lost outside a water hazard or may be out of bounds, to save time the player may play another ball provisionally in accordance with Rule 27-1. The player must inform his opponent in match play or his marker or a fellow-competitor in stroke play that he intends to play a provisional ball, and he must play it before he or his partner goes forward to search for the original ball.

If he fails to do so and plays another ball, that ball is not a provisional ball and becomes the ball in play under penalty of stroke and distance (Rule 27-1); the original ball is lost.

Note: If a provisional ball played under Rule27-2a might be lost outside a water hazard or out of bounds, the player may play another provisional ball. If another provisional ball is played, it bears the same relationship to the previous provisional ball as the first provisional ball.

b. When Provisional Ball Becomes Ball in Play

The player may play a provisional ball until he reaches the place where the original ball is likely to be. If he makes a stroke with the provisional ball from the place where the original ball is likely to be or from a point nearer the hole than that place, the original ball is lost and the provisional ball becomes the ball in play under penalty of stroke and distance (Rule 27-1)

If the original ball is lost outside a water hazard or is out of bounds, the provisional ball becomes the ball in play, under penalty of stroke and distance (Rule 27-1).

Reminders

If you have signed up to play in the Men's Club event on Wednesday, and you find out beforehand that you will not be able to play, please call the Pro Shop as soon as possible so that other arrangements can be made with pairings.

Please repair all ball marks, divots and adhere to the 90 degree rule. When filling divots with sand, step on the sand to compact it.

shows for REH and STRAZ CTR are finalized. Show Palace requires full payment 30 days before the show.



Road Trips with Fido & Felix: Tips for Traveling with Pets

Pets make great traveling companions, but require special handling. If you're considering taking a dog or cat on your next road trip, these tips can help ensure that the journey will be safe and fun for everyone in the vehicle!

Create a paper trail. Always carry a complete set of medical records, medications and health certificate for your animal companion. Vaccination records (including rabies and bordetella/kennel cough) are particularly important if your trip involves crossing state or national borders.

Create the "Pet to Go Kit." This might include water and food bowls from home, two bottles of water per day reserved for the pet, food and treats, an extra leash, cuddly toys, blankets and beds, and sedatives that you can purchase, if needed. On your pet's identification tag, include information for reaching you while you are traveling, including your cell phone number, e-mail address or other contact info in case you become separated. You may want to include a current color photo of your pet if something happens to them.

Create a pet first-aid kit. Essential items may include antiseptic cream, assorted bandages, tweezers, eye drops, gauze, tape, etc.

Suggestions for pets on the road:

- Safely secure you pet while traveling.
- Dogs can be restrained with a vehicle pet harness, seatbelt, or pet car seat.
- Cats should be contained in a pet crate or cage that is secured with a seatbelt. Never allow a cat to roam freely in the vehicle.
- Stop every two to three hours and give your pet and you a chance to run and stretch. Remember to keep them on their leashes so they don't become scared in unfamiliar surroundings and run away or become curious and go exploring.
- Cats can be fussy travelers. Offer them their own litter box at each rest stop. Try getting the cat accustomed to walking on a leash or riding in a pet backpack before the road trip, so you can get them out of the car or motel room often without the risk of losing them.

The Kitty Coalition

Is It Possible To Tame A Feral?

Working with a feral cat requires a great deal of love, patience and commitment. Kittens trapped between the ages of four to six weeks are quite easy to tame. Older kittens take longer; by ten or twelve weeks of age your success will depend more and more on the individual personality of the kitten, the amount of time you spend with them, and the number of different people handling them. Older kittens and adults you tame may never trust anyone but you. Adults may never fully trust even you.

If you adopt a feral kitten, here are the basic steps:

- 1. Depending on its age, an initial vet visit can determine general health of the kitten. The vet will advise you on what is appropriate for the kitten. Take a stool sample with you if possible to check for parasites.
- 2. Keep the kitten in a small, seldom used room such as the guest bath or bedroom. Keep windows closed, block any possible escape routes, such as pipe openings. Provide fresh food/water and a litter box. Keep your other pets away from the new kitty, even if both are curious.
- 3. Visit the kitten often, no more than 15 minutes each time. Talk softly, handle him gently, and begin to play with him. Wear gloves until you think the kitten has adjusted to your presence.
- 4. For older kittens and adults, avoid eye contact eye contact is made by predators or challengers, and it is a danger signal to a feral. Turn your head and blink slowly when you must look at him. Especially look away as you attempt to touch him.

Adults: The neutering and vaccination should be done immediately, while the cat is still in the trap. Getting an adult feral into a pet carrier later may be impossible for a long time. Most feral adult cats can never tamed to be a "normal" cat, and it can be dangerous to try if you are inexperienced. If you choose to allow an adult feral into your home, use the same steps as above, but much more reserved and careful. Make your visits shorter, do not attempt to touch for at least a week, and speak softly to him/her as you feed and clean the litter box. Look directly at him/her only while you are speaking softly and without moving near him. Sometimes, just sit quietly on the floor in his room. Children and other pets should not be allowed access to his area. Eventually, he will begin to explore and become curious to be let out of the room. At that point, and depending on your circumstances, you may leave his door open. If you have other pets, expect some issues. The adult feral will learn to trust at his pace, NOT yours!

Conclusion

Feral cats tend to bond to one person, and proper introduction to a new home is essential. Helping feral cats can be a timeconsuming, frustrating, emotionally draining and rewarding experience simultaneously. Each situation presents a whole new sphere of learning experiences. It is your love, concern, and active involvement that prevents further suffering, unwanted litters, and makes a better life for one of God's creatures.
