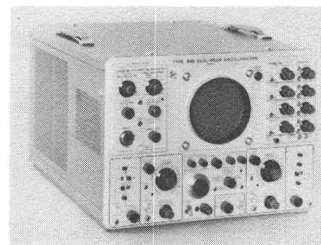

Oral Polio Vaccine Clinics Scheduled At Tri-County High Schools

The first of a series of three Sabin oral polio vaccine clinics will be held Saturday, March 31, and Sunday, April 1, from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. at all public high schools in Multnomah, Washington and Clackamas counties.

According to Dr. Richard M. Bernard, member of the board of directors for the Tri-county Sabin oral vaccine program, the vaccine is taken orally by swallowing a cube of sugar on which the vaccine has been placed. He emphasized that Sabin vaccine is more effective than Salk vaccine in preventing Type 3 polio. In addition, it provides intestinal immunity, thus checking the spread of polio (persons inoculated with Salk vaccine can still transmit the virus to others). He also mentioned that Sabin oral vaccine remains effective indefinitely, while Salk vaccine requires booster shots at least every two years to provide continued immunity.

Persons who have been inoculated with Salk vaccine are urged to take the Sabin vaccine also, since it will provide more complete protection against all types of polio.

The clinic this weekend will provide Type 1 immunization. A second clinic, scheduled for April 28-29, will provide Type 2 vaccine, and a third clinic will be set to provide Type 3 vaccine.

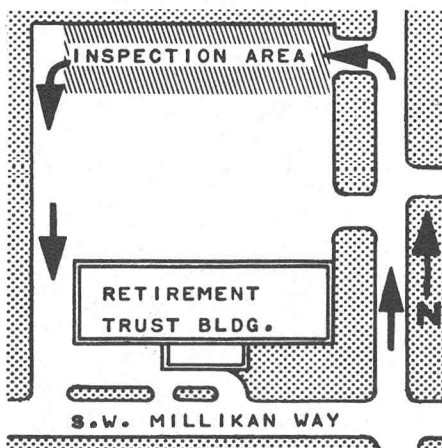
The cost for the series of three doses is \$1; maximum cost per family is \$5. Coupon books can be obtained at pharmacies throughout the tri-county area.

Only one series of public clinics for the Sabin oral vaccine is scheduled; however, the vaccine will be available from private physicians.

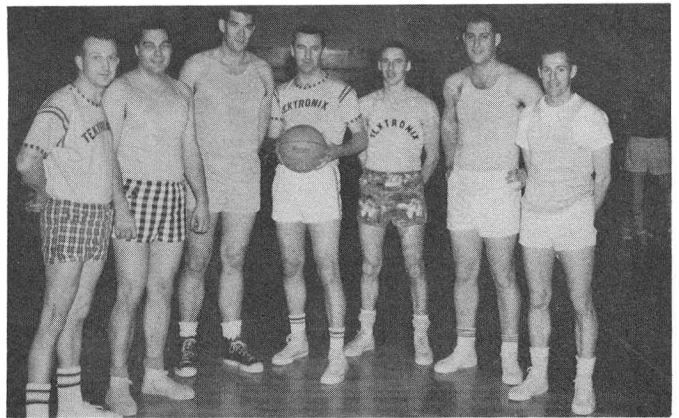
