### 1.1 Matching of DD and Instruments

Before using a HART configuration tool, confirm that the DD for the instrument is installed in the configuration tool.

The device revision of the transmitter and DD can be confirmed as shown below. If the correct DD is not installed in the configuration tool, download it from the official web site of HART Communication Foundation.

- (1) Confirmation of device revision for the transmitter
- Confirmation on integral indicator (A case of integral indicator code D is specified) Refer to the section 2.1
- Confirmation by using HART configuration tool a) Connect the configuration tool to the transmitter.
  - b) Confirm numerical number displayed on "Fld dev rev" column.
- Procedure to call up the display Device Setup → Detailed Setup → Device Information → Revision#'s → Fld dev rev

## (2) Confirmation of device revision for the configuration tool

Confirm the device revision from the installed DD file name according to the procedure provided for the configuration tool. The first two digits indicate the device revision and the next two digits indicate the DD revision.



# 2. Connection

### 2.1 Integral Indicator Display When Powering On

For models with the integral indicator code "D", the display shows all segments in the LCD and then changes to the displays shown below sequentially.



### 2.2 Interconnection between YTA and HART Configuration Tool




Figure 2.1 Connecting the HART Configuration Tool

The HART configuration tool can interface with the transmitter from the control room, the transmitter site, or any other wiring termination point in the loop. To communicate, the tool must be connected to the signal line in parallel with the transmitter; the connections are non-polarized. The HART digital signal is superimposed on the analog signal. Figure 2.1 illustrates the wiring connections for direct interface at the transmitter site for the YTA. The HART configuration tool can be used for remote access from any terminal strip as well.

When configuring the loop, make sure that the external load resistance is within the range in the figure below.



# 3. Parameter Setting

## IMPORTANT

Do not turn off the power to the transmitter immediately after transfer of the data from HART Communicator. If the transmitter is turned off in less than 30 seconds after parameters has been set, the setting data will not be stored and the transmitter will return to the previous settings.

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### 3.2 Parameter Description

The followings outline the functions of the HART parameters for YTA.

- Review (→ 3.3) Before starting operation, review all the configuration of the transmitter to confirm that it meets the current application.
- Sensor Configuration (→ 3.4.1) When changing the sensor type from the current setting to another, it is necessary to change some parameter settings.
- Process variable mapping (→ 3.4.2) Process variable is to be assigned as primary (PV), secondary (SV), tertiary (TV) and fourth (QV) Variable and can be monitored on the Integral indicator or Handheld terminal. Primary variable (PV) is output as the 4 to 20mA analog signal.
- Unit (→ 3.4.3)

Choose the engineering unit for the process variables assigned as PV,SV, TV, QV and the device variables from °C, Kelvin, °F and °R. When mV or ohm is specified as an input type, the unit is automatically set as mV or ohm.

### • PV Range (→ 3.4.4)

Change the range of PV to be output as the 4 to 20mA DC. There's two ways to set the range value.

<a> Setting by keypad <b> Setting by applying value

- Damping time constant (→ 3.4.5) Setting the response time of the transmitter smooths the output with rapid changes in input.
- Device Information (→ 3.5.1) Set data in Tag, Message, and Descriptor parameters.
- Test Output (→ 3.5.2) Make the transmitter output a fixed current from -2.5 through 110 % in 0.1% increments for loop checks.
- Burnout Function (→ 3.5.3) Configure the current output value in sensor failure. Select from High, Low and User setting value.

- Integral Indicator Display Mode (→ 3.5.4) To change items to be displayed on the Integral Indicator.
- Write Protect (→ 3.5.5) To enable / disable write protection of parameters.
- Sensor trim (→ 3.5.6) The trim adjustment function allows the user to add a compensation to the factory set

characterization curve to more closely match the input signal.

- Analog Output trim (→ 3.5.7) Adjust the output value.
- Sensor Backup Function (→ 3.5.8) Configure a transmitter to automatically transfer the input from Sensor1 to Sensor2 when Sensor1 fails.
- Burst Mode (→ 3.5.9) In the burst mode, a transmitter continuously sends a selected set of data.
- Multidrop Mode (→ 3.5.10) Up to 63 transmitters can be connected when set in the multidrop mode.
- Sensor Matching Function (→ 3.5.11) This function is available only when optional specification /CM1 is specified.
- CJC Selection (→ 3.5.12) For thermocouple input, the terminal temperature measured by an internal sensor is used for Cold Junction Compensation function.
- TC User Table (→ 3.5.13)
   This function enables users to calculate temperature by creating their own table for TC sensors for the conversion between temperature and electromotive force.
- Simulation ( $\rightarrow$  3.5.14)

Using the simulation function, the output signal can be confirmed by setting any value and status to the selected device variable. Test device variable and Test status are available.

Squawk (→ 3.5.15)
 This feature can be used to identify the communication transmitter by remetable

communicating transmitter by remotely causing LCD to display the particular pattern.

### 3.3 Review

Before starting operation, review all the configuration of the transmitter to confirm that it meets the current application.

Select Device Set up  $\rightarrow$  Review. Parameters are grouped by type and listed in review display of each group. Call up each review display, and scroll through the list to check each variable. If a change is necessary, refer to the "3.4 Basic Setup" and "3.5 Detailed Setup" in this manual.




Figure 3.1 Wire connection and sensor type

### 3.4 Basic Setup

### 3.4.1 Sensor Configuration

When changing sensor type, it is necessary to change the parameters related to the sensor type. Figure 3.1 shows the wire connections to the input terminals of the transmitter and sensor type selections for the parameters in each connection case. Note that TCs and mV are categorized as Group A and RTDs and ohm are as Group B. Check the connections between the input terminals and temperature sensors and set the correct sensor type and the number of wire connections for the parameters.

The setting method is as described below.

- (1) Selecting the sensor type/Setting the number of wires
- Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Basic setup → Sensor Basic Setup → Sensor1 Basic Setup → set Sns1 Probe (M) Set the sensor probe type and set the number of wires according to the message on display.

### (2) Setting the sensor unit

Set the sensor unit.

 Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Basic setup → Sensor Basic Setup → Sensor1 Basic Setup → Sensor1 Others → Sns1 Unit

In case of 3 wire RTD or ohm connection, if actual connection and connection setting is imbalance, unforeseen alarm may be generated.

### 3.4.2 Process Variable Mapping

Process variable can be assigned as primary (PV), secondary (SV), tertiary (TV) or fourth (QV) variable and can be monitored on Integral indicator or Handheld terminal. The primary variable (PV) is output as a 4 to 20mA analog signal, and thus it is necessary to map the variable as PV. Other variable can be left as "Terminal" when they are not required. Configuration of Sensor 1 (and Sensor 2) must be done before changing the process variable mapping. (See 3.4.1)

Call up the "Device Variables" display and carry out the process variable mapping to PV, SV, TV, and QV.

 Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Process variables → Dynamic Variables → PV (SV, TV or QV) → PV (SV, TV or QV) is

Set process variables below.

Sensor1: Sensor1 input

Sensor1-Terminal: Temperature difference between sensor1 input and terminal temperature

Terminal: Terminal temperature

- Sensor2: Sensor2 input
- Sensor2-Terminal: Temperature difference between sensor2 input and terminal temperature
- Sensor1-Sensor2: Difference between sensor1 input and sensor2 input
- Sensor2-Sensor1: Difference between sensor2 input and sensor1 input
- Average: Average of sensor1 input and sensor2 input
- Sensor Backup




Figure 3.2 Process variable mapping



- When "Sensor1-Sensor2", "Sensor2-Sensor1", "Average", "Sensor1-Terminal", or "Sensor2-Terminal" is selected, the sensor types to be set for Sensor1 and Sensor2 should be selected from any one of the following three groups; Temperature sensor (T/C and RTD), DC voltage or resistance. The combination (for example, temperature sensor and DC voltage input) would cause an incorrect computation due to the different unit system and is not allowed.
- When "Sensor1-Terminal" or "Sensor2-Terminal" is selected, Temperature sensor should be set for Sensor1 or Sensor 2.

### 3.4.3 Unit

The unit for PV is set at the factory before shipment. When Sensor1 (or Sensor2) or Terminal temperature is mapped as PV, SV, TV or QV, the unit that is selected for Sensor1 (or Sensor2) or Terminal temperature is automatically referred as a unit for these process variables. (See 3.4.1 Sensor Configuration) When PV, SV, TV, or QV unit is set , the unit is set the sensor value unit mapped PV, SV, TV, or QV automatically.

- \* Procedure to call up the display. Device setup  $\rightarrow$  Process variables  $\rightarrow$  Device Variables
  - $\rightarrow$  Sensor1  $\rightarrow$  Sns1 Unit
  - $\rightarrow$  Sensor2  $\rightarrow$  Sns2 Unit
  - $\rightarrow$  Terminal  $\rightarrow$  Term Unit Set the Unit

Procedure to call up the display.
 Device setup → Process variables → Dynamic Variable → PV (SV, TV or QV)
 Set the Unit

When process variable is mV input, unit is automatically selected mV and ohm input, unit is automatically selected ohm.



When PVis is changed from Sensor1 to Sensor2, PV unit is automatically changed from Sensor1 unit to Sensor2 unit.

### 3.4.4 PV Range

The range for PV corresponding to the 4 to 20mA output signal is set at the factory before shipment. Followings are the procedures to change the range.

(1) Changing the range with Keypad – LRV, URV –

Setting LRV and URV

 Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Basic setup → PV Basic Setup → PV Re-range → Range values Set the LRV and URV.

It is possible to set LRV>URV. This setting reverses the 4 to 20 mA output signal. Setting Conditions:  $LSL \le LRV \le USL$   $LSL \le URV \le USL$  $|URV - LRV| \ge$  Recommended Min. span

# (2) Changing the range while applying an actual input – Apply values –

- a) Procedure to call up the display Device setup  $\rightarrow$  Basic setup  $\rightarrow$  PV Basic Setup  $\rightarrow$  PV Re-range  $\rightarrow$  Apply values
- b) Apply the input corresponds to 4mA.
- c) After obtaining stable input, determine the 4mA output.
- d) Select 20mA and set same as 4mA setting.

### 3.4.5 Damping Time Constant

### (1) Setting the device variable damping

Setting the response time of each process variable makes it very slowly with a rapid change in input. Set the value from 0 to 100 seconds. If the time constant is set to 2 seconds, transmitter calculates a reading every cycle time using the damping equation, to make the output 63 percent of the input range after 2 seconds.

This damping time constant is normally set to work when the temperature makes a step change within 2 percent of the output range. Following are the procedures to change the damping time constant of Sensor1.  Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Basic setup → Sensor Basic Setup → Sensor1(2) Basic Setup → Sensor1(2) Others → Sns1(2) Damp → Term Basic Setup → Term Damp Set the damping time constant.

### (2) Setting the analog output damping

Damping time constant of analog output can be set.Procedure to call up the display

Device setup  $\rightarrow$  Basic setup  $\rightarrow$  AO Basic Setup  $\rightarrow$  AO Damping

Set the damping time constant.

## (3) Setting the damping threshold of analog output

Set the % of the output range. When the amount of variation is larger than the set value, it does not perform the dumping process. (Only for analog damping) This damping time constant is normally set to work when the temperature makes a step change within 2 percent of the output range upon factory shipping. Following are the procedures to change the damping threshold.


 Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Basic setup → AO Basic Setup → AO Damp Point


Set the damping threshold.

Output change in case of AO Damp Point is 10% (Range: 0 to 100°C)

Input variation is 10% or less

Input variation is 10% or more

### 3.5 Detailed Setup

### 3.5.1 Device Information

Following device information can be set by below procedures.

- Procedure to call up the display
   Device setup → Detailed setup → Device
  - information
  - Set the device information.
  - $\rightarrow$  Tag: Up to 8 characters
  - $\rightarrow$  Long Tag: Up to 32 characters
  - $\rightarrow$  Descriptor: Up to 16 characters
  - $\rightarrow$  Message: Up to 32 characters
  - $\rightarrow$  Date

### 3.5.2 Test Output

### (1) Loop Test

This feature can be used to output a fixed current from 3.6 mA (-2.5%) to 21.6 mA (110%) for loop checks.

 Procedure to Call up the "exec Loop Test" parameter

Device setup  $\rightarrow$  Diag/Service  $\rightarrow$  Test Device  $\rightarrow$  exec Loop Test

Select below.

- 4mA: Outputs 4 mA current
- 20 mA: Outputs 20 mA current
- Other: Sets a desired output in mA using alphanumeric keys.

End: Exits

## 

- Test output is held for approximately 10 minutes (depends on Auto Release Time setting), and then released automatically after the time has elapsed. If the HART communicator power supply is turned off or communication connector is disconnected during the test output operation, it is held for approximately 10 minutes.
- Select "End" to release the test output immediately.
- If the temperature transmitter power supply is turned off, test output is released.
- If you abort the method by pressing the close button at the top right corner of the dialog during the method is still running, you may not be able to return to normal. If you abort the method by this procedure, please re-run the method and return to normal.

### (2) Auto Release Time

This parameter can be used to set the auto release time of Loop Test and Simulation (See 3.5.14).

 Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Diag/Service → Test Device → Auto Release Time Select from 10 minutes, 30 minutes, 60 minutes, 3 hours, 6 hours or 12hours. Default setting is 10 minutes.

If the transmitter is equipped with the integral indicator, the LCD displays F.O.

### 3.5.3 Burnout Function

### (1) Sensor burnout

Configure the burnout mode in the case of sensor failure or disconnection.

 Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Basic setup → AO Basic Setup → AO Sensor BO Dir: Select High, Low, User Config or Off.

→ AO Sensor BO Unit: Select mA or % → AO Sns BO Usr Val: Outputs user set value within 3.6 to 21.6 (mA) or -2.5 to 110 (%) When the sensor failure is detected, the transmitter outputs one of the following values.

Low: Outputs 3.6mA

High: Outputs 21.6mA

User (mA): Outputs user set value in mA. Settable within 3.6 to 21.6 mA.

User (%): Outputs user set value in %. Settable within -2.5 to 110 %. Off: The burn out output is NOT defined



When sensor burnout is set to "off", the transmitter's output will go undefined at sensor failure. It is necessary to understand this point well when setting "off".

During sensor burn out time, any of AL.09, AL.10 to 13 or AL.22 alarm message is generated. (See Chapter 4 for details.)

#### (2) Burnout in hardware failure

The output status of the transmitter in hardware failure is set using a slide switch on the MAIN assembly. The current setting can be checked in parameter "PV Alrm type".



    - Lo: Less than -5% output (3.2mA)

### 3.5.4 Integral Indicator Display Mode


When an integral indicator is specified with the transmitter, the display items and display cycle can be configured.

### (1) Process Variable Display

Process variables that can be displayed in YTA are shown in the Table 3.1. A cycle of up to four displays (Disp Out1, Disp Out2, Disp %, Disp mA) can be shown by assigning variables to the parameters. Indicate values of process variables with the indication limits –99999 to 99999.

  - $\rightarrow$  Disp1 Variable: Select from Table3.1.
  - $\rightarrow$  Disp2 Variable: Select from Table3.1.
  - $\rightarrow$  % Display On/Off: Select On/Off.
  - $\rightarrow$  mA Display On/Off: Select On/Off.
  - $\rightarrow$  Bar Graph On/Off: Select On/Off.

### (3) Display Resolution

- Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Detailed setup → Display Setup
  - $\rightarrow$  Disp1 Decimal Point
  - $\rightarrow$  Disp2 Decimal Point
  - $\rightarrow$  % Decimal Point
  - → mA Decimal Point
  - Select the decimal point from 0, 1, 2 or 3.

### (4) Setting Display Cycle

### 3.5.5 Write Protect

### (1) Software write protect

The transmitter configured data is saved by using a write protection function. The write protection status is set to "Yes" when 8 alphanumeric characters are entered in the New password field and transferred to the transmitter. When write protection is set to "Yes," the transmitter does not accept parameter changes. When the same eight alphanumeric string

entered in the New password field is also entered in the Enable wrt 10 min field and transferred to the transmitter, it will be possible to change transmitter parameters during a 10 minute period. To change the transmitter from the write protection "Yes" status back to write protection "No" status, use Enable wrt 10min to first release the write protection function and then enter eight spaces in the New password field.

- Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Detailed setup → Device information → Write Protect
  - → Write protect: Display current write protect mode (Yes: protected, No: not protected)
  - → release WP Mode: Release the write protect function for 10 min.
  - → set New Password: Set the new password or change the password.

### (2) Software seal

When the joker password has been used to release write protection, this parameter displays "Break," and when protection is cancelled using the password set using "set New Password", it returns to "Keep."

If you should forget your password, the joker password can be used to temporarily release write protection function. To obtain the joker password, please contact your nearest YOKOGAWA sales office.

### (3) Hardware write protect

See IM 01C50G01-01EN, section 3.2 "Hardware Error Burnoat and Hardware Write Protect Switch."

### 3.5.6 Sensor Trim





Figure 3.4 Trim function images

Each YTA transmitter is factory-characterized based on the standard sensor curve, and uses this information to produce a process variable output. The sensor trim function is used to make an adjustment to the internal interpretation of the input signal and the factory characterization in the transmitter. (See Figure 3.4) Since the factory characterization is kept even after applying the trim operation, it is possible to recover factory characterization.





### 3.5.7 Analog Output Trim

Fine current output adjustment is carried out with AO trim.

AO trim is to be carried out if the calibration digital ammeter does not exactly read 4.000 mA and 20.000 mA with an output signal of 0% and 100%.

 Procedure to call up the AO trim display Device setup → Diag/Service → Calibration → AO Trim → set AO Trim

Follow the message to adjust analog output.

If you abort the method by pressing the close button at the top right corner of the dialog during the method is still running, you may not be able to return to normal. If you abort the method by this procedure, please re-run the method and return to normal.

## 3.5.8 Sensor Backup (For dual input type only)

The sensor backup function sets the transmitter to automatically use Sensor2 as output if Sensor1 fails. When the sensor backup mode is activated, map Sensor backup as PV. If sensor1 fails, the transmitter starts Sensor Backup operation and Sensor2 is output in place of Sensor1 to PV. There's no disruption in 4 to 20 mA output. Alarm message "Backup Sns1 Fail" is sent to the integral indicator and HART communicator. In backup operation, even if the Sensor1 recovers, the transmitter will continue to use Sensor2 until the backup operation is reset by parameter or power is turned off. If Sensor2 fails during backup operation, the transmitter will send "Backup Sns2 Fail" to the integral indicator and HART communicator and output the "Sensor burnout" value.

Specifications: Dual input only

Sensor Type: Any type available

But two sensors should be same type. Sensor value: Display in Backup

- (1) To enable Sensor backup function
- a) Set the sensor type, wire and unit for Sensor1 and 2. (See 3.4.1) Any Sensor type except "Non-connection" can be selected.

### 3.5.9 Burst Mode

When the Burst mode is enabled, the transmitter continuously sends up to three data listed in Table 3.2. When the Burst mode is set to "ON", transmitter continuously sends alarm signal also. When changing the setting of Burst mode, set "Off" to the Burst mode. Default setting is "Off".

### (3) Event Notification record

This function detects setting change and a change of the Self-diagnostics as event and can transmit alarm signal continuously. Up to five events that occurred can be stored. When using this function, set to any of the Burst Message of "Detailed Burst Mode" to ON,

### (3-1) Set Event Notification

Setting parameter for event notification is listed below. Set these parameters according to the method.

- Device status that detects event (Event Mask)
- Transmission interval Event Notification Retry Time Max Update Time (In case of no event) Event Debounce Interval
- Procedure to call up the display Detailed setup → Burst Setup → Event Setup → set Event

### (3-2) Stop Event Notification

This function stops the event notification.

### (3-3) Acknowledge Event Notification

This function acknowledges the Event notification.

 Procedure to call up the display Detailed setup → Burst Setup → Event Setup → Acknowledge Event

Acknowledge the Event Notification according to the method.

### (3-4) Event Notification Function Flow

When the Event Notification is enabled, a status change caused by the self-diagnosis of the equipment will alarm Event1. Event1 is continuously transmitted at the Retry Time interval until Event1 is acknowledged. If Event1 is acknowledged, Event1 disappears. Status which is acknowledged the last is continuously transmitted at the Max Update Time interval. If the other status change occurred before Event1 acknowledgement, Event2 keeps internal and Event1 is continuously transmitted. Acknowledgement is carried out in this state, Event1 is disappeared and Event2 is transmitted. In addition the acknowledgement is carried out, all events are disappeared. Status which is acknowledged the last is continuously transmitted at the Max Update Time interval.

### 3.5.10 Multidrop Mode

"Multidropping" transmitters refer to the connection of several transmitters to a single communication transmission line. Up to 63 transmitters can be connected when set in the multidrop mode. To activate multidrop communication, the transmitter address must be changed to a number from 1 to 63. If it sets to multidrop mode, in order to transmit all the data in digital one, it is necessary to change a setup of the analog output signal of 4 to 20 mA.

### Setting of Multidrop Mode

- (1) Polling address
  - Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Detailed setup → HART setup → Poll addr: Enter the number from 1 to 63.

# 

When the same polling address is set for two or more transmitters in multidrop mode, communication with these transmitters is disabled.

### (2) Analog Output Signal Setting

Set Disabled to Loop current mode and fix an analog output signal to 4mADC. It becomes impossible in this case, to also use a burnout output. However, in the case of the application which receives and operates an analog output signal, an analog output signal can be used for one loop. In this case, set Enabled to Loop current mode.

 Procedure to call up the display Device Setup → Detailed Setup → AO Setup → AO Basic Setup → Loop current mode → Enabled: Loop current mode is enabled (4 to 20mA output)
 Disabled: Loop current mode is disabled (4mA fixed)

### (3) Enabling the Multidrop Mode of Configuration Tool

About the procedure to call up the Polling display, please refer to the User's Manual of each configuration tool.

## (4) Communication when set in multidrop mode

- The HART configuration tool searches for a transmitter that is set in multidrop mode when it is turned on. When the HART configuration tool is connected to the transmitter, the polling address and the tag will be displayed.
- Select the desired transmitter. After that, normal communication to the selected transmitter is possible. However, the communication speed will be slow.

### (5) Release the multidrop mode

To release multidrop mode, call up the Poll addr display and set the address to "0." Return Loop current mode to Enabled.

### 3.5.11 Sensor Matching Function

This function is available only when optional specification /CM1 is specified. Significant temperature measurement accuracy improvement can be obtained using a temperature sensor that is matched to a transmitter.

### (1) Sensor Matching function

Applicable sensors: Pt100, Pt200, Pt500 and Pt1000 The properties of the RTD sensor for the YTA comply with the standard specified in IEC60751. Although their variations are within the range allowed by the standard, they may cause measurement errors. The Sensor Matching function improves the precision of temperature measurement by programming the Callendar-Van Dusen constants, specific numbers defined for each RTD sensor, into the transmitter.

## 

Before setting the Sensor Matching function, perform the Sensor Type to "Calibrated RTD". (see 3.4.1)

The following relation exists between the resistance (Rt) of a RTD sensor and the temperature (t) at that time.

Rt=R0{1+ $\alpha$ (1+0.01 $\delta$ )t -  $\alpha\delta$ /10<sup>4</sup>t<sup>2</sup> -  $\alpha\beta$ /10<sup>8</sup>(t -100)t<sup>3</sup>} where: Rt=Resistance (ohms) at Temperature t (°C) R0=Sensor -specific constant (Resistance at t=0°C)  $\alpha$  (alpha)=Sensor-specific constant

 $\delta$  (delta)=Sensor-specific constant

 $\beta$  (beta)=Sensor-specific constant

(0 at t>0°C)

Although the sensor curve is standardized, the exact values for R0,  $\alpha$ ,  $\delta$  and  $\beta$  are specific to each RTD sensor and are obtained by testing each individual sensor at various temperatures. These constants are known as Callender-van Dusen constants. Generally, the constants R0, A, B, and C are also used as the characteristic coefficients of the RTD instead of R0,  $\alpha$ ,  $\delta$  and  $\beta$ . These are derived from IEC Standard Curve and the relationship is described as followings;

Rt = Ro {1 + At - Bt<sup>2</sup> + C (t -100) t<sup>3</sup>} where: Rt=Resistance (ohms) at Temperature t (°C) R0 = Sensor-specific constant (Resistance at t=0°C) A = Sensor-specific constant B = Sensor-specific constant C =Sensor-specific constant (0 at t > 0°C)

These two equations are equivalent. A model YTA can cope with either case as above-mentioned.

## 🛕 IMPORTANT

Note the following restrictions when inputting values for the R0,  $\alpha$ ,  $\delta$ ,  $\beta$ , A, B, and C constants in the YTA.

- Values must be normalized ones with an exponential part determined for respective constants (see the table below).
- Values must be rounded off so that they have the digits after the decimal point determined for respective constants (see the table below).
- Values with three digits after the decimal point may be changed to values with four digits after the decimal point, which are equivalent to the original value when rounded off.

- b) For Setting up two sensors
   If using the sensor2, repeat the procedures for the Sensor1.
- Procedures to call up the display Device setup → Basic setup → Sensor Basic Setup → Sensor2 Basic Setup → Sensor2 Probe Setup → set Sns2 Matching



When the co-efficient of sensor matching is set incorrectly, inverse caluculation alarm may be generated.

### 3.5.12 CJC Selection

For thermocouple input, the terminal temperature measured by an internal sensor is used for Cold Junction Compensation function. In YTA, constant value set by users can be used for the compensation function in place of the measured terminal temperature. a) Procedure to call up the parameter "CJC" Device setup → Basic setup → Sensor Basic Setup → CJC Setup → set CJC Type Set the CJC type and set the CJC function by following the message shown.
In case of using Terminal temperature, select "Internal CJC Temperature Measurement".
In case of using constant value set by users, select "Fixed CJC Temperature".

### 3.5.13 TC User Table

This function enables users to calculate temperature by creating their own table for TC sensors for the conversion between temperature and electromotive force.

Specifications

Number of tables: 1 (common for Sensor1 and Sensor2)

Sensor type: TC User Table (TC only) Input items: Temperature and electromotive force Number of valid points: 5 to 50 points

Input the values of temperature and electromotive force in ascending order from the top of the table. This function determines the end of the table as being where the value of either temperature or electromotive force is not in ascending order.

Measuring range: -10 to 120 mV



### 3.5.14 Simulation

Using the simulation function, the output signal can be confirmed by setting any value and status to the selected device variable. Call up the parameter and follow the message shown.

After completing "(2) Test status" setting, the simulation starts. Integral indicator shows output value.

#### (1) Test device variable

 Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Diag/Service → Test Device → Device Variable Test → enable Dev Var Sim or disable Dev Var Sim Set the parameters according to the method.

#### (2) Test status

 Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Diag/Service → Test Device → Device Status Test → en/ds Dev Sts Sim Set the parameters according to the method

### IMPORTANT

- Test output is held for approximately 10 minutes (depends on Auto Release Time setting), and then released automatically after the time has elapsed. If the HART communicator power supply is turned off or communication connector is disconnected during the test output operation, it is held for approximately 10 minutes.
- Select "Disable" to release the test output immediately.
- If the temperature transmitter power supply is turned off, test output is released.


### 3.5.15 Squawk

This feature can be used to identify the communicating transmitter by remotely causing LCD to display the particular pattern as shown in the Figure 3.7.

 Procedure to call up the Squawk display Device setup → Diag/Sercice → Test Device → exec Squawk

Select On, Off or Once.

Once: "SQUAWK" continues for approximately 15 seconds, then is released automatically.

# 4. Diagnostics

### 4.1 Self-Diagnostics

The YTA monitors its own performance during operation. Upon detecting any abnormality, the YTA displays and records the abnormality in parameters, outputs out-of-range values, and in the case of a type with an integral indicator, it displays an alarm number corresponding to the abnormality.

### 4.1.1 Checking for Problems

### (1) Identifying Problems with the HART Communicator

Self-diagnostics of the transmitter and check of incorrect data settings can be carried out with the HART communicator. There are two methods for self-diagnosis of the transmitter; self-diagnosis for every transmission and manually executing the Self test command.

When an alarm message appears, see Table 4.1 "List of Alarms" for details.

- a) Procedure to call up the display
- b) Device setup → Diag/Service → Test Device → exec Self test Select "Perform"
- c) If there is no alarm detected, "Self test OK" will be displayed. When an alarm occurs, an alarm message appears, and the results of selfdiagnostics appear in the Status item.
- d) Procedure to call up the Status display
   Device Setup → Diag/Service → Device Status
   → Current Dev Status
- e) If no alarm is detected, the result of diagnostics is indicated as "Off". If "ON" is indicated, a countermeasure for that alarm is necessary. The HART configuration tool diagnoses at each communication.

When an improper operation is performed, the alarm message is displayed.

### (2) Checking with the Integral Indicator

If an alarm is detected in the self-diagnostic, an alarmcode is displayed on the digital indicator. If there is more than one alarm, the alarm codes appear in turns.

Refer to "Table 4.1 List of Alarms" to check the alarm contents and the countermeasure.

### 4.1.2 Status Information

#### (1) Device Status

Device status indicates the current operating status of the device.

Table 4.5 indicates the relation between alarm and device status.

• Procedure to call up the display

Device specific status indicates the current alarm status.

### (4) Data quality and Limit status

The transmitter can handle PV, SV, TV, QV, and etc. Each variable contains data quality and limit status for providing useful status about the data value. The data quality is normally "Good". However, in the case of a sensor failure or out of measurement range, it turns to "Bad" or "Poor Accuracy" The limit status indicates whether the data value is limited. (i.e., not responding to the process).

When the limit status is "Constant", the value will not to be changed.

 Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Process variables → Dynamic Variable → PV
 → PDQ: PV data quality
 → LS: PV limit status
 Device setup → Process variables → Device
 Variables → Sensor1
 → Sns1 PDQ: Sensor1 data quality
 → Sns1 LS: Sensor1 limit status
 Above procedure is the same about other variables.

### 4.2 Logging Functions

The YTA series have the capability to store the data useful for diagnosis of the problems.

### (1) Alarm log

Up to four alarm histories are stored in the transmitter memory, and can be seen using the following procedures.

Call up the display: Device setup  $\rightarrow$  Diag/Service  $\rightarrow$  Status Log

### (2) Max/Min log

Minimum value and Maximum value of the process variables are stored in the transmitter memory and can be checked.

- a) Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Diag/Service → Sensor Max/ Min Log
- b) To clear the logged data for Process variables except Term variables, select reset Sns Max/ Min.

These values may become big by disconnection of the sensor, etc. Please reset in this case.

### (3) Operation Time

Transmitter's operation time from the first power-on is counted. Call up the "Operation Time" display to check the time.

### 4.3 Diagnostics Function

The YTA has the following diagnostic functions.

### (1) Hardware Failure

This function detects Failures of CPU, AD converter, memory, etc.

### (2) Sensor Failure

This function detects any disconnection of sensors. When the current is applied and the resistance of a sensor is above the threshold, the function outputs a disconnection alarm.

Parameter setting: Not necessary

Alarm output: When the resistance is above the threshold, the function outputs the alarm of Sensor1 Failure (AL.10) or Sensor2 Failure (AL.11).

### (3) Terminal block Failure

This function detects any disconnection at CJC. When it detects that the resistance of CJC is above the threshold, the function outputs an alarm. Parameter setting: Not necessary

Alarm output: When the resistance is above the threshold, the function outputs the alarm of Terminal Sensor Fail (AL.22).

### (4) TC Short (only for YTA710)

This function detects any short circuit at TC sensors. When the current is applied and the resistance of a sensor is (S1 RP23, S2 RP43 in Sensor Diagnostics Information) below the threshold, the function outputs the Short alarm.

- Parameter setting: Set the thresholds at "S1 TC Short Thrshld" and "S2 TC Short Thrshld" (for the 2-input specification).
- Alarm output: When the resistance is below the threshold, the function outputs the alarm of Sensor1 short (AL.12) or Sensor2 short (AL.13).
- Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Diag/Service → Diagnostics → Sensor Diag → Sensor Diag Setting → S1(2) TC Short Thrshld Set thresholds.

Release the Device Status mask in order to output the Sensor1 (2) Short alarm. (Initial value is set in the mask)

## (5) RTD Short (only for 3-wire and 4-wire, only for YTA710)

This function detects any short circuit at the sensor during the RTD or Ohm measurement. When the resistance of the Sensor (S1 RC1 to S1 RC4, S2 RC3, S2 RC4 in Sensor Diagnostics Information) is below the threshold, the function outputs a short circuit alarm.

Parameter setting: Not necessary

Alarm output: When the resistance is below the threshold, the function outputs the alarm of Sensor1 short or Sensor2 short.



- Release the Device Status mask in order to output the Sensor1 (2) Short alarm. (Initial value is set in the mask)
- In case of 3 wire RTD or ohm connection, if actual connection and connection setting is imbalance, unforeseen alarm may be generated.

## (6) RTD Corrosion (only for 3-wire and 4-wire, only for YTA710)

This function detects any corrosion at the terminals and along the measurement cables. When the resistance of the terminals and cables (S1 RC1 TO S1 RC4, S2 RC3, S2 RC4 in sensor diagnostics information.) is above the threshold, the function outputs a corrosion alarm (AL.14 and AL.15). Parameter setting:

Device Setup  $\rightarrow$  Diag/Service  $\rightarrow$  Diagnostics  $\rightarrow$  Sensor Diag  $\rightarrow$  Sensor1(2) Diag setting  $\rightarrow$  S1(S2) RTD Corr Thrshld,

Release the Device Status mask in order to output the Sensor1 (2) Corrosion alarm. (Initial value is set in the mask)

### (7) Sensor Drift

When the difference between Sensor1 and Sensor2 temperatures becomes larger than the threshold, this function outputs an alarm. This indicates that there is some problem at either Sensor1 or Sensor2. The function can be enabled when Sensor type is set to TC and RTD.

Parameter setting: Set a threshold for the temperature difference between Sensor1 and Sensor2 at Sns Drift thrshld. When the threshold is 0.0, the function is not enabled.

- Alarm output: When the temperature difference is larger than the threshold, the function outputs the alarm of Sensor Drift.
- Procedure to call up the display Device setup → Diag/Service → Diagnostics → Sensor Diag →Sensor Diag Setting → Sns Drift Thrshld Set thresholds.

Release the Device Status mask in order to output the Sensor Drift alarm. (Initial value is set in the mask)

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## (8) Temperature Cycle Diagnostics (only for YTA710)

This function displays the number of temperature fluctuations that may cause failure of the sensor. The function is enabled only when Sensor type is set to TC or RTD, and indicates how many times the temperature alternately hits (or crosses) the upper and lower limits. When the number of times exceeds the threshold, an alarm will be issued. When the threshold is set to 0 the function is not enabled.

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# Appendix A. Safety Instrumented Systems Installation

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The contents of this appendix are cited from exida. com safety manual on the YTA series temperature transmitters specifically observed for the safety transmitter purpose. When using the YTA for Safety Instrumented Systems (SIS) application, the instructions and procedures in this section must be strictly followed in order to preserve the transmitter for that safety level.

## A.1 Scope and Purpose

This section provides an overview of the user responsibilities for installation and operation of the YTA in order to maintain the designed safety level for Safety Instrumented Systems (SIS) applications. Items that will be addressed are proof testing, repair and replacement of the transmitter, reliability data, lifetime, environmental and application limits, and parameter settings.

# A.2 Using the YTA for an SIS Application

## A.2.1 Safety Accuracy

The YTA has a specified safety accuracy of 2%. This means that the internal component failures are listed in the device failure rate if they will cause an error of 2% or greater.

## A.2.2 Diagnostic Response Time

The diagnostic test interval of YTA is less than 60 seconds and the diagnosis response time (time to detect and notify an interval failures) is less than 2 seconds.

## A.2.3 Setup

Set the ranges and units by the HART configuration toll. After configuration, make sure that the ranges and units are set correctly. The calibration of the YTA must be performed after parameters are set.

## A.2.4 Required Parameter Settings

The following parameters need to be set in order to maintain the designed safety integrity. Table A.2.1 describes the setting of the hardware error burnout and hardware write protect switch. Table A.2.2 describes the parameter setting by software.

## A.2.5 Proof Testing

The objective of proof testing is to detect failures within the transmitter that are not detected by the diagnostics of the transmitter. Of main concern are undetected failures that prevent the safety instrumented function from performing its intended function. See table A.2.3 for proof testing method.

The frequency of the proof tests (or the proof test interval) is to be determined in the reliability calculations for the safety instrumented functions for which the YTA is applied. The actual proof tests must be performed more frequently or as frequently as specified in the calculation in order to maintain required safety integrity of the safety instrumented function. The following tests need to be specifically executed when a proof test is performed. The results of the proof test need to be documented and this documentation should be part of a plant safety management system. Failures that are detected should be reported to Yokogawa.

The personnel performing the proof test of the transmitter should be trained in SIS operations including bypass procedures, YTA temperature transmitter maintenance, and company management of change procedures.

## A.2.6 Repair and Replacement

If repair is to be performed with the process online, the YTA will need to be bypassed during the repair. The user should setup appropriate bypass procedures.

In the unlikely event that the YTA has a failure, the failures that are detected should be reported to Yokogawa.

When replacing the YTA, the procedure in the installation manual should be followed.

The personnel performing the repair or replacement of the YTA should have a sufficient skill level.

## A.2.7 Startup Time

The YTA generates a valid signal within 7 seconds of power-on startup.

## A.2.8 Firmware Update

In case firmware updates are required, they will be performed at factory. The replacement responsibilities are then in place. The user will not be required to perform any firmware updates.

## A.2.9 Reliability Data

A detailed Failure Mode, Effects, and Diagnostics Analysis (FMEDA) report is available from Yokogawa with all failure rates and failure modes.

The YTA is certified up to SIL2 for use in a simplex (1001) configuration, depending on the PFDavg respectively PFH calculation of the entire Safety Instrumented Function.

The development process of the YTA is certified up to SIL3, allowing redundant use of the transmitter up to this Safety Integrity Level, depending the PFDavg respectively PFH calculation of the entire Safety Instrumented Function.

When using the transmitter in a redundant configuration, the use of a common cause factor ( $\beta$ -factor) of 5% is suggested. If the owner-operator of the plant would institute common cause failure training and more detailed maintenance procedures for avoiding common cause failure, a beta factor of 2% would be applicable.

## A.2.10 Lifetime Limits

The expected lifetime of the YTA is 50 years. The reliability data listed in the FMEDA report is only valid for this period. The failure rates of the YTA may increase sometime after this period. Reliability calculations based on the data listed in the FMEDA report for YTA lifetimes beyond 50 years may yield results that are too optimistic, i.e. the calculated Safety Integrity Level will not be achieved.

## A.2.11 Environmental Limits

The environmental limits of the YTA are specified in the user's manual IM 01C50G01-01EN.

## A.2.12 Application Limits

The application limits of the YTA are specified in the user's manual IM 01C50G01-01EN. If the transmitter is used outside of the application limits, the reliability data listed in A.2.9 becomes invalid.
