If you select a metal Christmas tree, remember that while they are nonflammable, they do conduct electricity. The National Fire Protection association recommends the use of indirect lighting rather than string lights.

Plastic and metalized plastic trees will burn; use only those which are clearly marked as made of slow-burning material. Those with built-in electrical systems should carry the Underwriters' should carry Laboratory label to show they have been tested for electrical safety.
