ANNUAL CATALOGUE.

SESSION OF 1881-82.

The Medical Department of the University of Wooster is located at Cleveland, to secure the advantages for clinical and anatomical instruction that are found only in large cities. The Faculty labors to utilize these advantages for the students' greatest good, and in this work has the coöperation of the largest charities in the city.

COLLEGIATE YEAR.

The College Year extends from the sixth of April, 1881, to the first of March, 1882. It embraces a special *Spring* and a regular *Winter Term*.

The Spring Term of 1881 opens Wednesday, April 6th, and continues twelve weeks; the regular Winter Term opens Wednesday, September 14th, 1881, and continues twenty-four weeks, ending March 1st, 1882.

PLAN OF INSTRUCTION.

The plan of instruction includes Lectures, Clinics, Recitations, Quizzes, and Practical Demonstrations.

LECTURES.

During the Winter Term, five to six Didactic Lectures are given daily. These are illustrated by models, diagrams, preparations and experiments.

THEORY AND PRACTICE OF MEDICINE AND PATHOLOGY.—Daily lectures are given in this branch, in which are described all the phenomena of disease, the principles of Physical Diagnosis, and all topics essential for an adequate understanding of the subject.

Obstetrics and Gynecology.—These subjects are taught by didactic lectures, in addition to clinics, and are illustrated by plates and models sufficient to elucidate every point. Students are instructed in Operative Obstetrics, and made familiar with all the necessary instruments and operations.

PRINCIPLES OF SURGERY.—Instruction in this branch is by lectures. These are illustrated by splints, orthopedic apparatus, and all surgical appliances. This course includes also the discussion of questions of Surgical Pathology, Antiseptic Surgery, and kindred themes.

ANATOMY.—This subject is taught, in addition to dissection, by didactic lectures, which are illustrated by the cadaver, plates, and fresh, dried and osseous specimens. The Faculty deems a thorough knowledge of Anatomy a prerequisite to medical success, and makes instruction in it specially prominent.

MATERIA MEDICA.—Lectures in this department explain particularly the physiological and therapeutical action of medicines. Specimens of the drugs are exhibited, and efforts made to acquaint the student with their physical properties. To make this more effectual, a cabinet of the *Materia Medica* is now forming.

Physiology and Histology.—These subjects are taught chiefly by lectures. The microscope is extensively employed, and the student instructed in the use of the instrument. Plates, experiments and microscopic specimens illustrate the subject.

CHEMISTRY.—This branch is taught by lectures and experiments. It is too commonly neglected by students. Special opportunities are, therefore, offered in laboratory work, where the student can secure practical knowledge in Applied and Analytical Chemistry.

Nervous Diseases.—A feature in the coming course will be a series of lectures on diseases of the nervous system, by Dr. Jamin Strong, Superintendent of the Northern Ohio Asylum for the Insane. The lectures will be amply illustrated with pathological specimens and charts, of which the distinguished lecturer has many. The reputation of Dr. Strong as a specialist in this department bespeaks for the subject a faithful and interesting presentation.

OPTHALMOLOGY.—An Eye and Ear Clinic is held weekly, and furnishes abundant material for thorough instruction in this department.

CLINICS.

Medical subjects are so subtle and complex that no teaching can be effectual that does not include a certain amount of personal experience. Clinical teaching has, therefore, been made a prominent part of the plan of instruction. By it the student is brought in personal contact with the patient, and learns practically the arts of Diagnosis, Symptomatology and Therapeutics. Of the out-patients he receives certain ones for his special treatment, on which he must report from time to time.

The Hospitals under control of the Faculty are particularly well adapted for this method of teaching.

CLINICS ARE HELD DAILY.

CHARITY HOSPITAL.

This is a large, commodious edifice, built on recent and improved plans for hospital construction. It accommodates about two hundred beds, has airy wards and rooms, tramways and elevators for the transportation of patients, and is in every respect finely appointed. In connection with it is an amphitheatre, with three hundred and fifty sittings, from any of which the arena for operations is clearly in view. The hospital is under the management of the Sisters of Charity, who act as nurses, and admirably second the work of the physician. The building is located on Perry street, corner of Garden, within three minutes walk of the college.

In conjunction with Charity Hospital is a Maternity Department, for the care of women in labor, and of children.

All these various departments are under the medical supervisement of physicians connected with the college, and are made to subserve the interests of its students. All clinics, Medical, Surgical and Gynecological, are conducted exclusively by members of the Faculty.

CLEVELAND CITY HOSPITAL.

The Cleveland City Hospital is now partly under the medical control of this college; one-half the Visiting and Consulting Board are from the Faculty. The privileges of the hospital are thus utilized for the benefit of students. The building is commodious and is now made more so by a pavilion erected in the campus. The amphitheatre is now built and ready for occupancy. Prof. Weber is returned with health recovered, and will hold surgical clinics henceforth in the amphitheatre twice a week, throughout the year.

RECITATIONS.

A system of recitations is arranged, whereby each Professor meets the class once a week, and reviews his lectures in the form of oral examinations. Attendance on this part of the curriculum fixes the subject matter of the lectures. It is a plan too obviously important to need discussion. The course is free, and is made a regular college exercise.

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DISSECTIONS.

SPECIAL DEMONSTRATION.

PRACTICAL ANATOMY.

Considering the study of Practical Anatomy of great importance, the Faculty insists that every student, senior and junior, shall take out the Demonstrator's ticket and attend demonstrations and dissections throughout the term.

Dissecting material is abundant. During the past session more than could be used was at hand, and was furnished to students less than cost. The Anatomical Rooms are large, well lighted and ventilated, and supplied with everything requisite for the instruction, comfort and convenience of the students. The Rooms are opened early in November, and remain so until the close of the term. They are under the direction of the Professor of Anatomy, who devotes a large part of his time to demonstrations.

OPERATIVE SURGERY.—This course embraces lectures and operations on the cadaver, and instructions in the use of instruments. Students perform the operations, and acquire a certain proficiency in operating. The instruction is under the supervision of the chair of Clinical Surgery, and is made to supplement the other branches of Surgery.

MINOR SURGERY.—Lectures are given once a week on this subject by Dr. G. B. Case, in which are exhibited numerous plates and appliances, illustrative of surgical dressings. Bandages are discussed and demonstrated, and the student required to familiarize himself with them.

OPERATIVE OBSTETRICS.—In addition to the regular Winter work in Midwifery, further attention is given to operative proceedings in Obstetrics during the *Spring Term*, under a special instructor. Unusual facilities are thus offered for work in this department.

MICROSCOPY.—In connection with the Physiological Laboratory now forming, special instruction will be given in the practical working of the microscope, as well as in the preparation and mounting of histological and pathological specimens.

During the *Spring Term* additional lectures and demonstrations will be given on this subject by a special instructor.

Practical and Analytical Chemistry.—The laboratory is well appointed, lighted and ventilated. Each student is supplied with a work-table and set of apparatus and reägents, for the care of which he is responsible, and forms, as it were, a class by himself, performing personally, under the supervision of the teacher, all the experiments, manipulations, etc., irrespective of others in the laboratory.

The course includes analysis by the dry and wet methods; special attention is given to the detection of poisons in organic mixtures, and examinations and analyses of secretions, food, etc.

PHARMACEUTICAL WORK.—Demonstrations are made in Manipulative Pharmacy of a character to enable students to become familiar with pharmaceutical methods.

SPRING TERM.

The Spring Session is yearly acquiring more importance. One-third of the regular class attended at the last session. The advantages of this term are apparent from the obvious precedence of its matriculates over other students during the winter. Two or three lectures or recitations are held daily. The aim is to guide the students' work, and to supply a want known to exist in a course devoted alone to lectures, by more intimately supervising the students. All students should attend.

Fee is \$10.00, \$5.00 of which applies on the following Winter Term.

EXAMINATIONS.

Examinations are both written and oral. They are held at the end of the session, and are open to all who have attended two sessions of lectures. Students who are not candidates for graduation can also enter for final examinations in Anatomy, Physiology and Chemistry. The examinations are before the Faculty, and in addition, a Board of Censors, who are eminent medical men from this and adjoining States. Three of this Board are elected by the Alumni, from their own number, each year.

GRADUATION.

This College is a member of the American College Association, and adopts the Association's regulations for graduation.

The candidate must have a good English education.

He must be twenty-one years of age and have studied medicine three years under a regular physician.

He must have attended two full courses of lectures, of which the last must have been in this institution.

He must deposit with the Dean, two weeks prior to his examination, a thesis on some medical subject, written on thesis paper, in his own handwriting, together with testimonials of age, moral character, and time of study.

The Matriculation Fee is required of all. All fees must be paid in advance, except that for Graduation, which must be paid when the thesis is presented.

Students are admitted to special courses, and pay in accordance with the number of branches they pursue.

Graduates of three years standing of recognized schools are admitted to the full course on payment of Matriculation and Hospital Fees.

Students who have attended two full courses of lectures in any other recognized school will receive the General Ticket on payment of \$20.

Students who have attended two full courses of lectures in this school will receive the General Ticket for the third course free.

LIVING EXPENSES.

Good day-board may be had from \$2.50 to \$5.00 per week; good accommodations for board and lodging, \$4.00 per week and upwards.

Students applying to the Janitor, at the College Building, as soon as they reach the city, will be directed by him to reliable boarding-houses, of which he has a carefully prepared list.

COLLEGE BUILDING.

The College Building is located on Brownell street, corner of Ohio, near the Hospitals, on the line of the Garden street cars. It is easy of access, commodious and convenient. It contains an Amphitheatre, with capacity for 350 students, Chemical and Physiological Laboratories, Anatomical Rooms and Museums. The appointments and facilities for teaching are good.
